2 MESSAGE FROM HER EXCELLENCY'S DEPUTY BY THE USHER OF THE BLACK ROD

The following message was delivered by the Usher of the Black Rod:

Honourable Members,

The Deputy of Her Excellency the Governor-General desires your attendance in the Senate Chamber.

Accordingly Members of the House of Representatives went to the Senate Chamber, where the Deputy addressed the Members of both Houses as follows:

Members of the Senate and Members of the House of Representatives:

Her Excellency the Governor-General has appointed me as her Deputy to declare open the Parliament of the Commonwealth. The Clerk of the Senate will now read the instrument of appointment.

The instrument was read as follows:

I, QUENTIN ALICE LOUISE BRYCE AC CVO, Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, acting under section 126 of the Constitution and Clause IV of the Letters Patent dated 21 August 2008 relating to the office of Governor-General, appoint THE HONOURABLE ROBERT SHENTON FRENCH AC, Chief Justice of the High Court of Australia, to be my deputy to declare open the Parliament of the Commonwealth at the time and place appointed by the Proclamation published in the *Commonwealth of Australia Gazette* on 4 November 2013.

Members of the Senate and Members of the House of Representatives:

3 THE HONOURABLE ROBERT SHENTON FRENCH TO ADMINISTER THE OATH OR AFFIRMATION OF ALLEGIANCE TO MEMBERS

The Honourable Robert Shenton French AC, Chief Justice of Australia, having been ushered into the Chamber and conducted by the Serjeant-at-Arms to the Chair, handed to the Clerk at the Table an authority, which was read and is as follows:

I, QUENTIN ALICE LOUISE BRYCE AC CVO, Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, under section 42 of the Constitution, authorise THE HONOURABLE ROBERT SHENTON FRENCH AC, Chief Justice of the High Court of Australia, to administer the oath or affirmation of allegiance to Members of the House of Representatives.

Mr Abbott (Prime Minister), addressing himself to the Clerk, proposed to the House for its Speaker Mrs B. K. Bishop, and moved—That she do take the Chair of this House as Speaker, which motion was seconded by Mr Pyne (Leader of the House).

Mrs B. K. Bishop informed the House that she accepted nomination.

Mr K. J. Thomson, addressing himself to the Clerk, proposed to the House for its Speaker Mr Mitchell, and moved—That he do take the Chair of this House as Speaker, which motion was seconded by Mr Perrett.

Mr Mitchell informed the House that he accepted nomination.

There being no further proposal—

The House proceeded to ballot; and the ballot being concluded, the Clerk reported the result, as follows:

Mrs B. K. Bishop.....93 votes

Mr Mitchell.....56 votes

Mrs B. K. Bishop was thereupon declared elected as Speaker, and Mr Abbott and Mr Pyne conducted her to the Chair.

Mrs B. K. Bishop returned her acknowledgments to the House for the honour it had been pleased to confer upon her by choosing her to be its Speaker, and thereupon sat down in the Chair.

Then the Mace, which before lay under the Table, was laid upon the Table.

11 LEADERSHIP AND WHIPS OF THE AUSTRALIAN LABOR PARTY

Mr Shorten, as Leader of the Opposition, informed the House that the Parliamentary Labor Party had elected him as its Leader and Ms Plibersek as its Deputy Leader. Mr Hayes had been elected Chief Opposition Whip and Ms Hall and Ms Ryan had been elected as Opposition Whips.

12 LEADERSHIP AND WHIPS OF THE NATIONALS

Mr Truss (Deputy Prime Minister) informed the House that the Parliamentary Party of The Nationals had elected him as its Leader and Mr Joyce (Minister for Agriculture) as its Deputy Leader. Mr Coulton had been appointed as Chief Nationals Whip and Mr Christensen as Nationals Whip.

13 VETERANS' AFFAIRS LEGISLATION AMENDMENT BILL 2013

Mr Abbott (Prime Minister) presented a Bill for an Act to amend the law relating to veterans' affairs, and for related purposes.

Document

Mr Abbott presented an explanatory memorandum to the bill.

Bill read a first time.

Ordered—That the second reading be made an order of the day for the next sitting.

14 HER EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S SPEECH

Madam Speaker reported that the House had that day attended Her Excellency the Governor-General in the Senate Chamber, when Her Excellency was pleased to make a speech to both Houses of the Parliament. *(Text of the speech appears in Hansard)*

15 ADDRESS IN REPLY TO HER EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S SPEECH

Mr Abbott (Prime Minister) moved—That a committee, consisting of Mr Nikolic, Ms Henderson and the mover, be appointed to prepare an Address in Reply to the speech delivered by Her Excellency the Governor-General to both Houses of the Parliament and that the committee report at the next sitting.

Question—put and passed.

16 REGISTRAR OF MEMBERS' INTERESTS

The House was informed that Madam Speaker, in accordance with resolution (3) of the House of Representatives relating to the registration of Members' Interests, had appointed Mr David Elder, Deputy Clerk of the House of Representatives, as Registrar of Members' Interests in the 44th Parliament.

Suspension of sitting

At 4.10 pm, Madam Speaker left the Chair.

Resumption of sitting

At 5 pm, Madam Speaker resumed the Chair.

17 ELECTION OF DEPUTY SPEAKER AND SECOND DEPUTY SPEAKER

Mr Truss (Leader of The Nationals) moved—That Mr B. C. Scott be elected Deputy Speaker of this House, which motion was seconded by Mr Coulton.

Mr Thomson moved—That Mr Mitchell be elected Deputy Speaker of this House, which motion was seconded by Mr Perrett.

There being no further proposal—

The House proceeded to ballot and the ballot being concluded, Madam Speaker reported the result, as follows:

Mr B. C. Scott.....91 votes

Mr Mitchell.....56 votes

Mr B. C. Scott was thereupon declared elected as Deputy Speaker and Mr Mitchell was declared elected as Second Deputy Speaker.

Mr Abbott (Prime Minister), Mr Shorten (Leader of the Opposition), Mr Truss, Ms Plibersek (Deputy Leader of the Opposition), Mr Bandt and Mr Katter congratulated Mr B. C. Scott and Mr Mitchell, who made their acknowledgments to the House.

18 DEATHS OF FORMER MEMBER (MICHAEL JOHN MAHER) AND FORMER SENATOR (JANET FRANCES POWELL)

Madam Speaker informed the House of the death, on 29 September 2013, of Michael John Maher OAM, a Member of this House for the Division of Lowe from 1982 to 1987 and the death, on 30 September 2013, of Janet Frances Powell AM, a Senator for the State of Victoria from 1986 to 1993.

As a mark of respect to the memory of the deceased all Members present stood, in silence.

19 DEATH OF FORMER MEMBER (THE HONOURABLE DAVID SCOTT THOMSON)

Mr Abbott (Prime Minister) referred to the death of the Honourable David Scott Thomson MC, and moved—That the House express its deep regret at the death on 13 October 2013 of the Honourable David Scott Thomson MC, a former Minister and Member of this House for the Division of Leichhardt from 1975 to 1983, place on record its appreciation of his long and meritorious public service, and tender its profound sympathy to his family in their bereavement.

Mr Truss (Deputy Prime Minister) having seconded the motion, and Mr Shorten (Leader of the Opposition) Mr Katter, Mr Entsch and Mr Ruddock (Chief Government Whip) having addressed the House in support thereof, and all Members present having risen, in silence—

Debate adjourned (Mr Pyne—Leader of the House), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- (1) notes that the:
 - (a) Prime Minister committed to lead a Government which is transparent and open and the Coalition’s Real Solutions platform stated that the Coalition would “restore accountability and improve transparency measures”;
 - (b) Leader of the House on 30 January 2013 committed himself to a parliamentary practice in Government to “allow any Member of any political party who has serious questions to answer, time to explain themselves through the Parliament to the Australian people”; and
 - (c) Prime Minister and Minister for Immigration have adopted a new culture of secrecy and are hiding information from the Australian people. The Minister has repeatedly refused to answer questions at weekly Operation Sovereign Borders briefings. That failure to answer questions has led the Australian people to rely on the Jakarta Post for information about their own Government. Questions remain relating to attempted so-called turn backs of boats, buy back of boats and to the state of negotiations between Australia and Indonesia about a people swap arrangement with Indonesia; and
- (2) calls on the Minister for Immigration to attend the House immediately and explain for a period not exceeding thirty minutes:
 - (a) the status of all discussions with Indonesia about the progress of Operation Sovereign Borders, including those discussions relating to a people swap arrangement with Indonesia;
 - (b) how the Government intends to pursue its election commitment to turn back boats to Indonesia and buy back boats in fishing villages; and
 - (c) whether any of the measures which have been effective in reducing the flow of asylum seeker vessels to Australia are now in jeopardy as a result of the Minister’s chaotic handling of his portfolio including the Regional Resettlement Arrangements with Papua New Guinea and Nauru and the abolition of visa on arrival arrangements in Indonesia for Iranians.

13 When Deputy Speaker and Second Deputy Speaker elected

- (a) The Deputy Speaker and Second Deputy Speaker shall be elected at the beginning of each Parliament, or at any time the respective office becomes vacant. Whenever the two offices are vacant at the same time, elections for both offices shall be conducted together.

- (b) The Speaker shall conduct the elections under *standing order 14*, and may not vote in an ordinary ballot.
- (c) Only a non-government Member may be elected as Second Deputy Speaker.
- (d) A Member shall propose the nomination of a Member to the vacant office by moving, without notice, that such Member 'be elected Deputy Speaker (or Second Deputy Speaker)'.

29 Set meeting and adjournment times

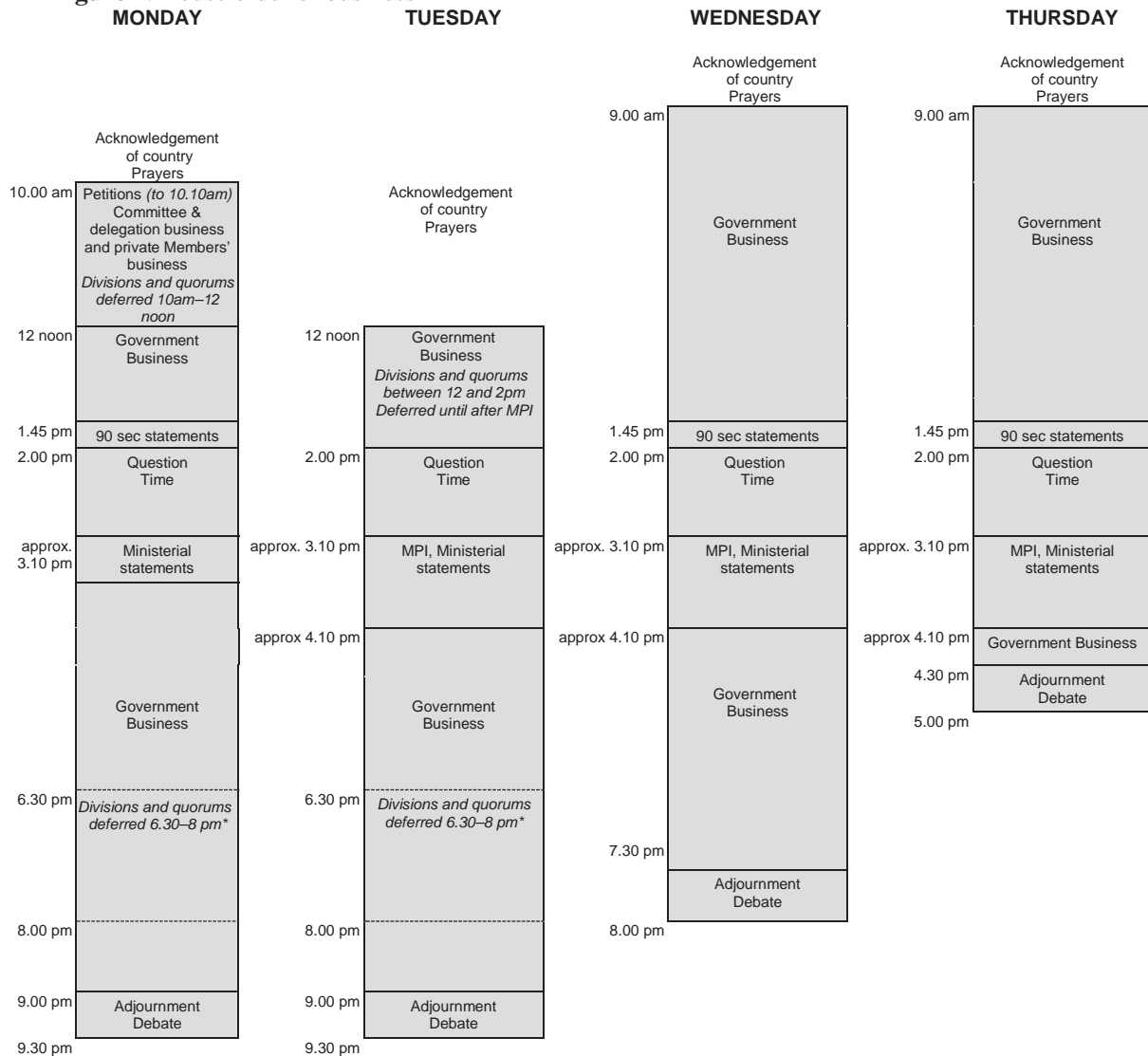
- (a) The House shall meet each year in accordance with the program of sittings for that year agreed to by the House, unless otherwise ordered and subject to *standing order 30*.

39 Announcements concerning inquiries and presentation of reports

- (a) The Chair or deputy Chair of a committee may make a statement to inform the House of matters relating to an inquiry during the periods for committee and delegation business on Mondays (*standing order 34*). The Selection Committee shall recommend time limits for such statements.
- (b) Members may present reports of committees or delegations:
 - (i) as determined by the Selection Committee, during the periods for committee and delegation business on Mondays in the House and Federation Chamber (*standing orders 34 and 192*); or
 - (ii) in the House at any time when other business is not before the House.
- (c) Members may make statements in relation to these reports:
 - (i) during the periods for committee and delegation business on Mondays in the House and Federation Chamber (*standing orders 34 and 192*); the Selection Committee shall determine time limits for statements, of not more than 10 minutes for each Member; or
 - (ii) in the House at any other time, by leave.

- (d) The Member presenting a report may move without notice, a specific motion in relation to the report. Debate on the question shall be adjourned to a future day and the resumption of the debate may be referred to the Federation Chamber.
- (e) Unless otherwise ordered, a committee report presented in accordance with this standing order shall be made a Parliamentary Paper.

41 Private Members' business

- (a) In the periods set for committee and delegation business and private Members' business under *standing orders 34 and 192*, private Members' notices and orders of the day shall be considered in the order shown on the Notice Paper. When the time set by *standing orders 34 or 192* or determined by the Selection Committee ends, the Speaker shall interrupt proceedings and the matter shall be listed on the Notice Paper for the next sitting.

Private Members' bills—priority

- (b) The Selection Committee, in making determinations:
 - (i) shall give priority to private Members' notices of intention to present bills over other notices and orders of the day; and
 - (ii) shall set the order in which the bills are to be presented.

First and second reading

- (c) Subject to this standing order, the first and second reading shall proceed in accordance with *standing orders 141 and 142*. The Member who has presented the bill may speak to the second reading for no longer than 10 minutes at the time of presentation and 5 minutes on resumption of the debate. The Selection Committee may determine times for consideration of the remainder of the second reading debate.

Priority following second reading

- (d) If the motion for the second reading is agreed to by the House, further consideration of the bill shall be accorded priority over other private Members' business and the Selection Committee may determine times for consideration of the remaining stages.

Alternation of notices

- (e) Subject to paragraph (b)(i), the Selection Committee shall provide for the consideration of private Members' notices to alternate between those of government and non-government Members.

Participation of Speaker and Deputy Speaker

- (f) The Speaker and Deputy Speaker may participate in private Members' business.

45 Order of government business and programming declarations

- (a) The Leader of the House may arrange the order of notices and orders of the day for government business on the Notice Paper as he or she thinks fit.
- (b) The Leader of the House or the Chief Government Whip may make a programming declaration in the House in relation to one or more items of government business.

The declaration may refer a government business order of the day to the Federation Chamber, or may require a government business order of the day to be returned from the Federation Chamber for further consideration in the House. The matter must be set down for consideration at a later hour that day.

55 Lack of quorum

- (a) When the attention of the Speaker is drawn to the state of the House and the Speaker observes that a quorum is not present, the Speaker shall count the Members present in accordance with *standing order 56*.
- (b) On Mondays, if any Member draws the attention of the Speaker to the state of the House between 10 am and 12 noon, the Speaker shall announce that he or she will count the House at 12 noon, if the Member then so desires.
- (c) On Mondays and Tuesdays, if any Member draws the attention of the Speaker to the state of the House between the hours of 6.30 pm and 8 pm, the Speaker shall announce that he or she will count the House at 8 pm, if the Member then so desires.

- (d) On Tuesdays, if any Member draws the attention of the Speaker to the state of the House prior to 2 pm, the Speaker shall announce that he or she will count the House after the discussion of the matter of public importance, if the Member then so desires.
- (e) If a quorum is in fact present when a Member draws attention to the state of the House, the Speaker may name the Member in accordance with *standing order 94(b) (sanctions against disorderly conduct)*.

66A Interventions

During consideration of any order of the day a Member may rise and, if given the call, ask the Speaker whether the Member speaking is willing to give way. The Member speaking will either indicate his or her:

- (a) refusal and continue speaking; or
- (b) acceptance and allow the other Member to ask a short question or make a brief response immediately relevant to the Member's speech, for a period not exceeding 30 seconds—

Provided that, if, in the opinion of the Speaker, it is an abuse of the orders or forms of the House, the intervention may be denied or curtailed.

68 Personal explanation

A Member may explain how he or she has been misrepresented or explain another matter of a personal nature whether or not there is a question before the House. The following conditions shall apply:

- (a) the Member must rise and seek permission from the Speaker;
- (b) the Member must not interrupt another Member addressing the House; and
- (c) the matter must not be debated.

If a Member has given a personal explanation to correct a misrepresentation and another Member subsequently repeats the matter complained of, the Speaker may intervene.

101 Speaker's discretion about questions

The Speaker may:

- (a) direct a Member to change the language of a question asked during Question Time if the language is inappropriate or does not otherwise conform with the standing orders; and
- (b) change the language of a question in writing if the language is inappropriate or does not otherwise conform with the standing orders.

133 Deferred divisions on Mondays and Tuesdays

- (a) On Mondays, any division called for between the hours of 10 am and 12 noon shall be deferred until 12 noon.
- (b) On Mondays and Tuesdays, any division called for between the hours of 6.30 pm and 8 pm shall be deferred until 8 pm.
- (c) On Tuesdays, any division called for prior to 2 pm shall be deferred until after the discussion of the matter of public importance.
- (d) The Speaker shall put all questions on which a division has been deferred, successively and without amendment or further debate.
- (e) This standing order does not apply to a division called on a motion moved by a Minister on Mondays and Tuesdays, during the periods specified in this standing order.

138 Initiation of bills

A House bill may be initiated:

- (a) by the calling on of a notice of intention to present a bill;
- (b) by an order of the House; or
- (c) without notice by a Minister under *standing order 178 (Appropriation Bill or bill dealing with taxation)*;

A bill not prepared according to the standing orders of the House shall be ordered to be withdrawn.

140 Signed copy of bill presented

- (a) A Member presenting a bill must sign a legible copy of the bill and give it to the Clerk at the Table.

- (b) The title of a bill must agree with the notice of intention to present it, and every clause must come within the title.

141 First reading and explanatory memorandum

- (a) When a bill is presented, or a Senate bill is first received, the bill shall be read a first time without a question being put.
- (b) For any bill presented by a Minister, except an Appropriation or Supply Bill, the Minister must present a signed explanatory memorandum. The explanatory memorandum must include an explanation of the reasons for the bill. For other bills, the Member presenting the bill may present an explanatory memorandum.

142 Second reading

- (a) If copies of the bill are available to Members, the Member presenting the bill may move immediately after the first reading, or at a later hour—

That this bill be now read a second time.

At the conclusion of the Member's speech the debate on the question must then be adjourned to a future sitting.

- (b) If copies of the bill are not available, a future sitting shall be appointed for the second reading and copies of the bill must then be available to Members.

143 Bill referred to Federation Chamber or committee

After the first reading but before the resumption of debate on the motion for the second reading:

- (a) a motion may be moved without notice to refer a bill to the Federation Chamber for further consideration as provided by *standing order 183*; or
- (b) a motion may be moved without notice or a determination may be made by the Selection Committee as provided by *standing order 222* to refer a bill to a committee for an advisory report. The motion or determination may specify a date by which the committee is to report to the House. After an advisory report has been presented to the House, the bill may then be referred to the Federation Chamber under paragraph (a).
- (c) If, having considered a bill referred to it for an advisory report, a committee finds no issues requiring a formal report, the Chair or Deputy Chair may make a statement to the House to that effect. The statement, with the presentation of the relevant minutes of proceedings, discharges the committee's obligation to report on the bill.

146 Amendment to dispose of bill

An amendment may be moved to the question—

That this bill be now read a second time—

by omitting 'now' in order to insert 'not', which, if carried, shall finally dispose of the bill. No amendment may be moved to this amendment.

155 Question for third reading

- (a) When a bill has been agreed to, the House may grant leave for the motion for the third reading to be moved immediately, or a future sitting may be set for the motion.

The question shall be proposed on the motion—

That this bill be now read a third time.

- (b) The only amendment which may be moved to this question is by omitting 'now' in order to insert 'not', which, if carried, shall dispose of the bill.
- (c) After the third reading the bill has passed the House and no further question may be put.

183 Establishment of Federation Chamber

The Federation Chamber shall be established as a committee of the House to consider matters referred to it as follows:

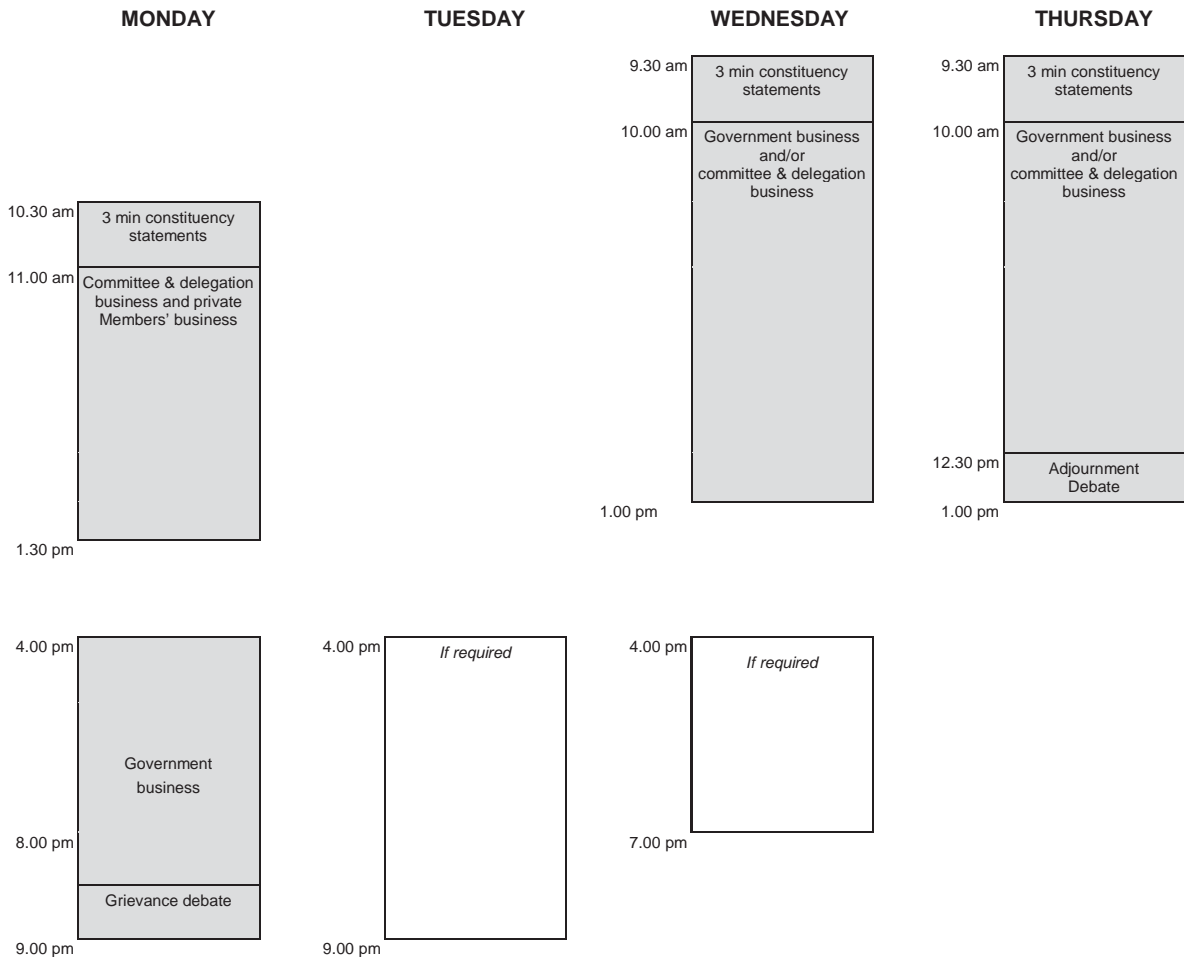
- (a) proceedings on bills to the completion of the consideration in detail stage;
- (b) orders of the day for the resumption of debate on any motion;

- (c) subject to paragraph (a), private Members’ notices and other items of private Members’ and committee and delegation business referred in accordance with a Selection Committee determination pursuant to *standing order 222*;
- (d) further statements on a matter when statements have commenced in the House; and
- (e) items of government business referred from the House by a programming declaration made in accordance with *standing order 45*.

192 Federation Chamber’s order of business

The normal order of business of the Federation Chamber is set out in figure 4.

Figure 4. Federation Chamber order of business



The meeting times of the Federation Chamber are fixed by the Deputy Speaker and are subject to change. Times shown for the start and finish of items of business are approximate. Adjournment debates can occur on days other than Thursdays by agreement between the Whips.

197 Return of matters to the House

The Federation Chamber may return a matter to the House before its consideration is completed.

- (a) A matter may be returned to the House on a motion moved without notice at any time by a Minister—

That further proceedings be conducted in the House.

The motion shall be put without amendment or debate. If the Federation Chamber agrees to, or is unable to resolve, this question, the bill or order of the day shall be returned to the House. Consideration in the House must continue from the point reached in the Federation Chamber and the House must resolve any issues that the Federation Chamber reports.

- (b) The House may at any time require a matter to be returned for further consideration, on a motion moved without notice by a Minister. The matter must be set down for consideration at a later hour that day.
- (c) An item of government business may be returned to the House by a programming declaration made in accordance with *standing order 45*.

198 Report to the House

- (a) When the Federation Chamber has fully considered a bill referred to it, a final question shall be put immediately and resolved without amendment or debate—
That this bill be reported to the House, with[out] [an] amendment[s] [and with (an) unresolved question(s)].
- (b) The Clerk of the Federation Chamber shall certify a copy of the bill or other matter to be reported to the House, together with any schedules of amendments and unresolved questions. Unless otherwise provided, the Speaker shall report the matter at a later hour that day when other business is not before the House.

215 General purpose standing committees

- (a) The following general purpose standing committees shall be appointed:
 - (i) Standing Committee on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Affairs;
 - (ii) Standing Committee on Agriculture, Resources, Fisheries and Forestry;
 - (iii) Standing Committee on Climate Change, Environment and the Arts;
 - (iv) Standing Committee on Economics;
 - (v) Standing Committee on Education and Employment;
 - (vi) Standing Committee on Health and Ageing;
 - (vii) Standing Committee on Infrastructure and Communications;
 - (viii) Standing Committee on Social Policy and Legal Affairs; and
 - (ix) Standing Committee on Regional Australia.
- (b) A committee appointed under paragraph (a) may inquire into and report on any matter referred to it by either the House or a Minister, including any pre-legislation proposal, bill, motion, petition, vote or expenditure, other financial matter, report or document.
- (c) A committee may make any inquiry it wishes to make into annual reports of government departments and authorities and reports of the Auditor-General presented to the House. The following qualifications shall apply to these inquiries:
 - (i) Reports shall stand referred to committees under a schedule presented by the Speaker to record the areas of responsibility of each committee.
 - (ii) The Speaker shall determine any question about responsibility for a report or part of a report.
 - (iii) The period during which an inquiry into an annual report may be started by a committee shall end on the day the next annual report of the department or authority is presented to the House.
 - (iv) If a committee intends to inquire into all or part of a report of the Auditor-General, the committee must notify the Joint Committee of Public Accounts and Audit of its intention, in writing.
- (d) Each committee appointed under paragraph (a) shall consist of seven members: four government Members and three non-government Members, provided that if a non-aligned Member is appointed to a committee, such committee shall consist of eight members: four government Members, three non-government Members, and one non-aligned Member. Each committee may have its membership supplemented by up to four members for a particular inquiry, with a maximum of two extra government and two extra opposition or non-aligned Members. Supplementary members shall have the same participatory rights as other members, but may not vote.

222 Selection Committee

- (a) A Selection Committee shall be appointed to:
 - (i) arrange the timetable and order of committee and delegation business and private Members' business for each sitting Monday in accordance with *standing orders 39 to 41*;

- (ii) select private Members' notices and other items of private Members' and committee and delegation business for referral to the Federation Chamber, or for return to the House;
 - (iii) select bills that the committee regards as controversial or as requiring further consultation or debate for referral to the relevant standing or joint committee in accordance with *standing order 143*; and
 - (iv) subject to *standing order 1*, set speaking times for second reading debates.
- (b) The committee shall consist of eleven members: the Speaker, or in the absence of the Speaker the Deputy Speaker, the Chief Government Whip or his or her nominee, the Chief Opposition Whip or his or her nominee, the Third Party Whip or his or her nominee, and four government Members, and three non-government Members. The Speaker shall be the Chair of the committee. A quorum shall be three members of the committee.
 - (c) For committee and delegation business and private Members' business, the committee may determine the order of consideration of the matters, and the times allotted for debate on each item and for each Member speaking.
 - (d) In relation to committee and delegation business and private Members' business the committee must report its determinations to the House in time for its decisions to be published on the Notice Paper of the sitting Thursday before the Monday being considered. In relation to bills the committee must report its determinations as soon as practical in respect of each bill or each group of bills.
 - (e) Reports of the committee under paragraph (d) shall be treated as having been adopted when they are presented. Reports shall be published in Hansard.
 - (f) A referral by determination of the Selection Committee pursuant to paragraph (a)(ii) or (a)(iii), once the determination has been reported to the House, is deemed to be a referral by the House.

227 ★ ★ ★ ★

229 Appointment of committee members

- (a) Members shall be appointed to or discharged from a committee by motion moved on notice.
- (b) Special arrangements are required for a change in membership when the House is not sitting and is not expected to meet for at least two weeks. The relevant whip must nominate any appointment or discharge of a member of a committee in writing to the Speaker. The change in membership shall take effect from the time the Speaker receives the written nomination. At the next sitting, the Speaker shall report the change to the House and the House shall resolve the membership of the committee.
- (c) If a committee is considering a bill referred under *standing order 143*, one or more members of the committee may be replaced by other Members by motion moved on notice. This does not affect the ability of a general purpose standing committee to have its membership supplemented under *standing order 215(d)*.

232 Appointment of committee Chair and deputy Chair

- (a) Before the start of business and at any time a vacancy occurs, a committee shall be informed of the name of the member who has been appointed by the Prime Minister to be its Chair. The Chair shall have a casting vote only.
- (b) A committee shall also be informed of the name of the member who has been appointed by the Leader of the Opposition to be its deputy Chair. The deputy Chair shall act as Chair of the committee whenever the Chair is not present at a meeting. If neither the Chair nor deputy Chair is present at a meeting, the members present shall elect another member to act as Chair at the meeting.

235 Proceedings and sittings of committee

- (a) A committee or a subcommittee may conduct proceedings using any means approved by the House and in the following manner:
 - (i) in private meeting;
 - (ii) by hearing witnesses, either in public or in private; and
 - (iii) in the form of any other meeting, discussion or inspection conducted under the practice of committees of the House.

- (b) A committee may conduct proceedings using audio visual or audio links with members of the committee or witnesses not present in one place. If an audio visual or audio link is used, committee members and witnesses must be able to speak to and hear each other at the same time regardless of location. A committee may resolve for a subcommittee to use audio visual or audio links.
- (c) A committee or a subcommittee may conduct proceedings at any time or place as it sees fit, and whether or not the House is sitting.

257 Admission of Senators and visitors

- (a) Only the Speaker shall have the privilege of admitting visitors into the lower galleries, and may admit distinguished visitors to a seat on the floor of the Chamber.
- (b) No Member may bring a visitor into any part of the Chamber, or that part of the room where the Federation Chamber is meeting, which is reserved for Members.
- (c) Senators shall have the privilege of being admitted into the Senators' gallery without invitation. When present in the Chamber or galleries they must observe the Speaker's instructions regarding good order.

Proposed resolution

Procedures for dealing with witnesses

That, in their dealings with witnesses, committees of the House shall observe the following procedures:

- (1) A witness shall be invited to attend a committee meeting to give evidence. A witness shall be summoned to appear (whether or not the witness was previously invited to appear) only where the committee has made a decision that the circumstances warrant the issue of a summons.
- (2) Where a committee desires that a witness produce documents or records relevant to the committee's inquiry, the witness shall be invited to do so, and an order that documents or records be produced shall be made (whether or not an invitation to produce documents or records has previously been made) only where the committee has made a decision that the circumstances warrant such an order.
- (3) A witness shall be given notice of a meeting at which he or she is to appear, and shall be supplied with a copy of the committee's terms of reference and an indication of the matters expected to be dealt with during the appearance. Where appropriate a witness may be supplied with a transcript of relevant evidence already taken in public.
- (4) A witness may be given the opportunity to make a submission in writing before appearing to give oral evidence.
- (5) A witness shall be given reasonable access to any documents or records that the witness has produced to a committee.
- (6) A witness shall be offered, before giving evidence, the opportunity to make application, before or during the hearing of the witness's evidence, for any or all of the witness's evidence to be heard in camera, and shall be invited to give reasons for any such application. The witness may give reasons in camera. If the application is not granted, the witness shall be notified of reasons for that decision.
- (7) Before giving any evidence in camera a witness shall be informed whether it is the intention of the committee to publish or present to the House all or part of that evidence, that it is within the power of the committee to do so, and that the House has the authority to order the production and publication of undisclosed evidence. Should the committee decide to publish or present to the House all or part of the evidence taken in camera, the witness shall be advised in advance. A member, in a protest or dissent added to a report, shall not disclose evidence taken in camera unless so authorised by the committee.
- (8) The Chair of a committee shall take care to ensure that all questions put to witnesses are relevant to the committee's inquiry and that the information sought by those questions is necessary for the purpose of that inquiry.

- (9) Where a witness objects to answering any question put to him or her on any ground, including the grounds that it is not relevant, or that it may tend to incriminate him or her, he or she shall be invited to state the ground upon which he or she objects to answering the question. The committee may then consider, in camera, whether it will insist upon an answer to the question, having regard to the relevance of the question to the committee's inquiry and the importance to the inquiry of the information sought by the question. If the committee determines that it requires an answer to the question, the witness shall be informed of that determination, and of the reasons for it, and shall be required to answer the question in camera, unless the committee resolves that it is essential that it be answered in public. Where a witness declines to answer a question to which a committee has required an answer, the committee may report the facts to the House.
- (10) Where a committee has reason to believe that evidence about to be given may reflect on a person, the committee shall give consideration to hearing that evidence in camera.
- (11) Where evidence is given which reflects upon a person, the committee may provide a reasonable opportunity for the person reflected upon to have access to that evidence and to respond to that evidence by written submission or appearance before the committee.
- (12) A witness may make application to be accompanied by counsel or an adviser or advisers and to consult counsel or the adviser(s) in the course of the meeting at which he or she appears. If such an application is not granted, the witness shall be notified of reasons for that decision. A witness accompanied by counsel or an adviser or advisers shall be given reasonable opportunity to consult with counsel or the adviser(s) during a meeting at which he or she appears.
- (13) A departmental officer shall not be asked to give opinions on matters of policy, and shall be given reasonable opportunity to refer questions asked of him or her to superior officers or to the appropriate Minister.
- (14) Witnesses shall be treated with respect and dignity at all times.
- (15) Reasonable opportunity shall be afforded to witnesses to request corrections in the transcript of their evidence and to put before a committee additional written material supplementary to their evidence. Witnesses may also request the opportunity to give further oral evidence.
- (16) Where a committee has any reason to believe that any person has been improperly influenced in respect of evidence which has been or may be given before the committee, or has been subjected to or threatened with any penalty or injury in respect of any evidence given or in respect of prospective evidence, the committee shall take all reasonable steps to ascertain the facts of the matter. Where the committee considers that the facts disclose that a person may have been improperly influenced or subjected to or threatened with penalty or injury in respect of evidence which may be or has been given before the committee, the committee shall report the facts and its conclusions to the House.
- (17) That the foregoing provisions of this resolution, so far as they are inconsistent with the standing orders, have effect notwithstanding anything contained in the standing orders.

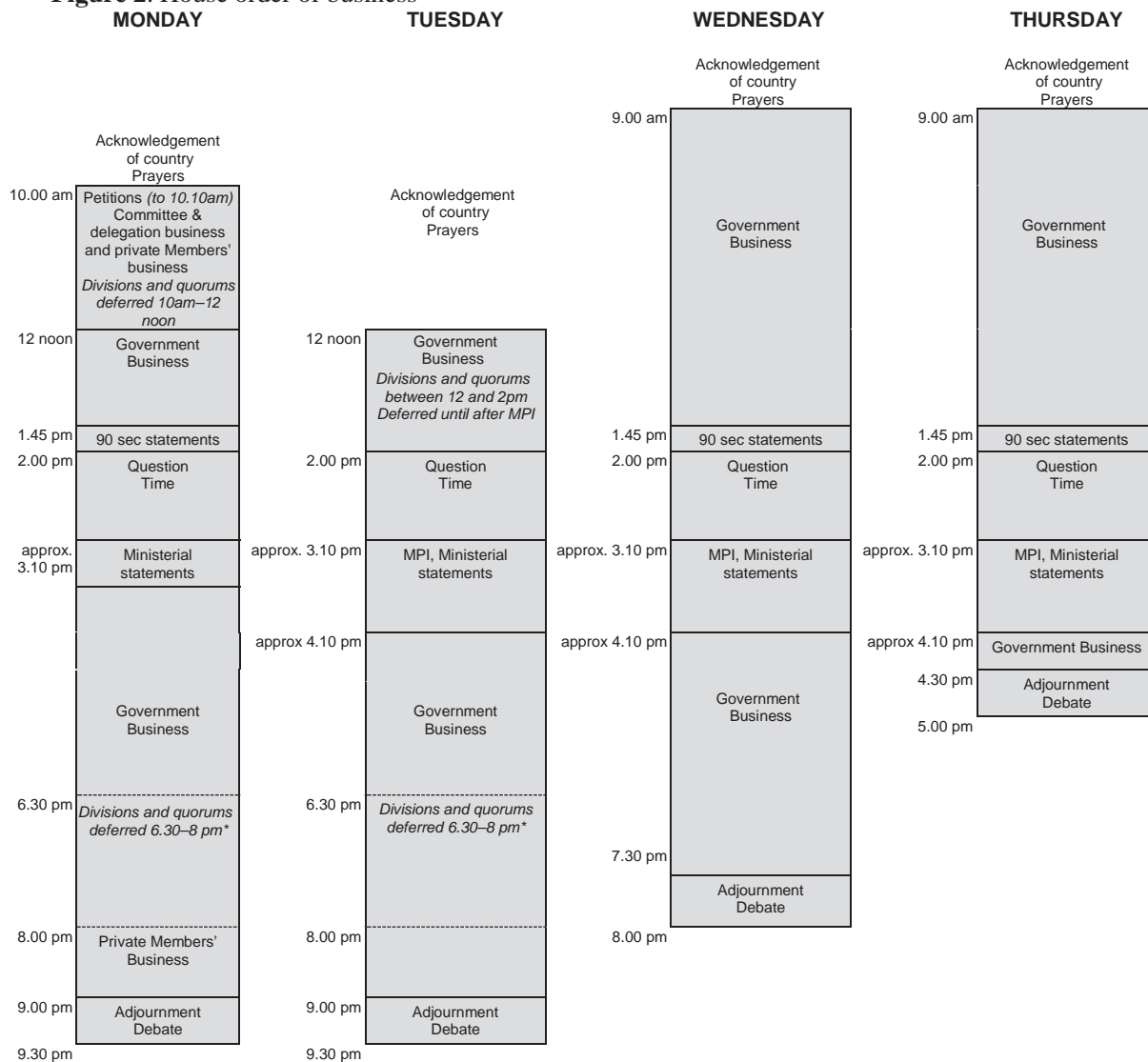

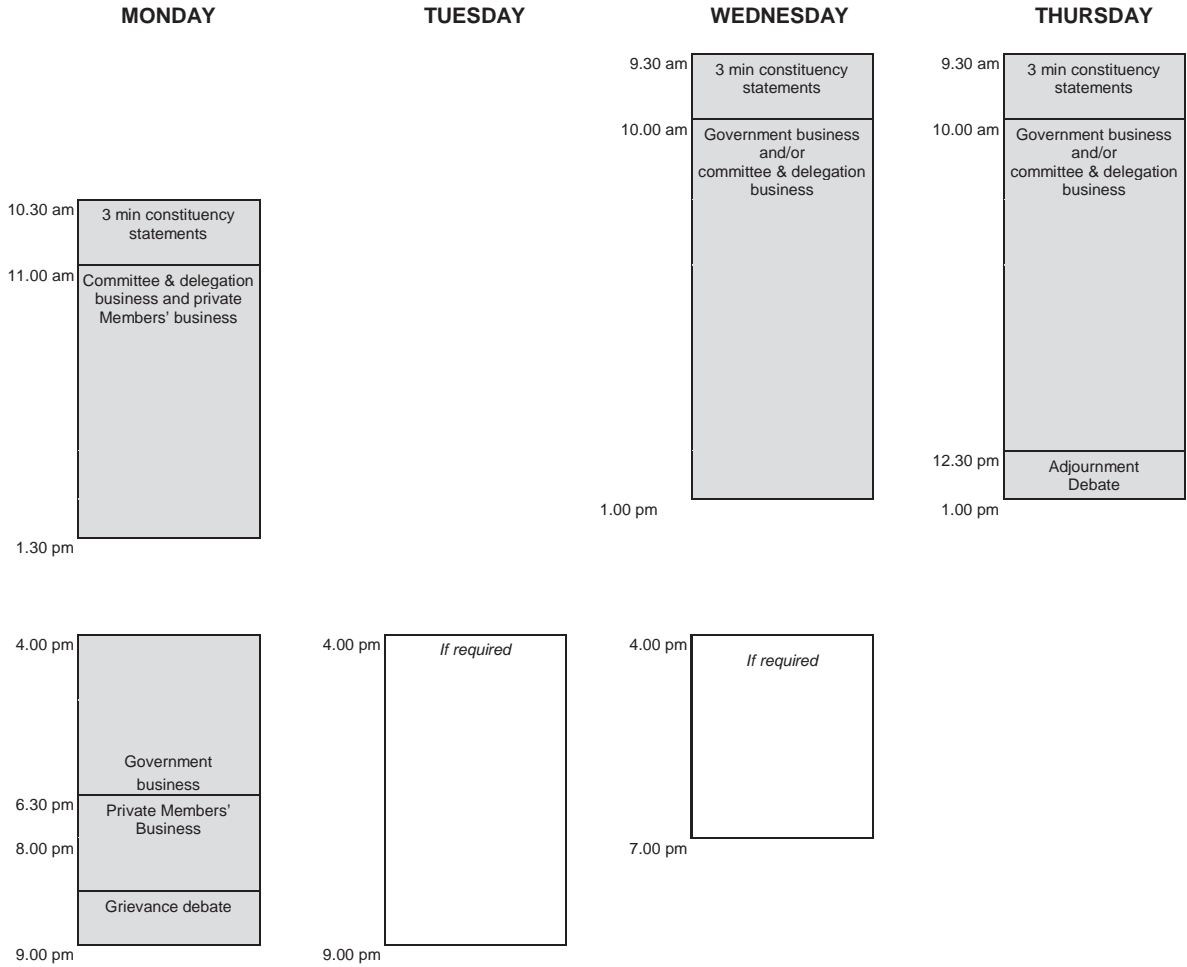

- (3) at the conclusion of the second reading debate, not including a Minister speaking in reply, or at 7 pm on Wednesday, 13 November 2013, whichever is the earlier, a Minister being called to sum up the second reading debate and then without delay the immediate question before the House to be put, then any question or questions necessary to complete the second reading stage of the bill to be put;
- (4) if the second reading has been agreed to a Governor-General's message recommending an appropriation for the bill being announced and the bill then being taken as a whole during consideration in detail for a period not exceeding 60 minutes, and notwithstanding the automatic interruption for proposing the question that the House do now adjourn, at which time any Government amendments that have been circulated shall be treated as if they have been moved together with:
 - (a) one question being put on all the Government amendments;
 - (b) one question being put on any amendments which have been moved by non-Government Members, and
 - (c) any further questions necessary to complete the remaining stages of the bill being put;
- (5) the House being adjourned immediately after the conclusion of the proceedings on the bill; and
- (6) any variation to this arrangement to be made only by a motion moved by a Minister.

 - (v) Standing Committee on Health;

 - (ix) Standing Committee on Tax and Revenue.

- (c) A committee may make any inquiry it wishes to make into annual reports of government departments and authorities and reports of the Auditor-General presented to the House. The following qualifications shall apply to these inquiries:
 - (i) Reports shall stand referred to committees under a schedule presented by the Speaker to record the areas of responsibility of each committee.
 - (ii) The Speaker shall determine any question about responsibility for a report or part of a report.

- (iii) The period during which an inquiry into an annual report may be started by a committee shall end on the day the next annual report of the department or authority is presented to the House.
- (iv) If a committee intends to inquire into all or part of a report of the Auditor-General, the committee must notify the Joint Committee of Public Accounts and Audit of its intention, in writing.
- (d) Each committee appointed under paragraph (a) shall consist of ten members: six government Members and four non-government Members. Each committee may have its membership supplemented by up to four members for a particular inquiry, with a maximum of two extra government and two extra opposition or non-aligned Members. Supplementary members shall have the same participatory rights as other members, but may not vote.

Reasons of the House of Representatives for disagreeing to the amendment of the Senate

Senate Amendment Number (1)

The former Government's Economic Statement in August 2013 and the 2013 Pre-Election and Fiscal Outlook, showed that the face value of Commonwealth Government Securities on issue which are subject to the statutory limit, is projected to continue to increase over the forward estimates and reach \$370 billion by 2015-16. In addition, the Australian Office of Financial Management has advised that it is prudent to maintain a buffer of \$40 to \$60 billion above peak debt projected in any one year.

This amendment seeks to limit the increase in the legislative debt limit to \$400 billion rather than \$500 billion proposed by the bill.

The amendment passed by the Senate, limits the Commonwealth's financing capacity to be able to meet its current and future financial obligations.

Accordingly, the House of Representatives does not accept this amendment.

On the motion of Mr Ciobo, the reasons were adopted.

3 EAST TIMORESE SUPPORT OF AUSTRALIAN TROOPS

Mr Ruddock, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that in East Timor between December 1941 and January 1943, 700 Australian troops engaged some 20,000 Japanese troops through guerrilla warfare, and:

 - (iii) the incidental music in the series throughout most of the 1960s and 1970s, written by Australian composer Dudley Simpson;
 - (iv) Australian actress Janet Fielding, playing an Australian character Tegan Jovanka in the series (alongside the Doctor as portrayed by Peter Davison);
 - (v) actress Katy Manning, playing the character Jo Grant in the series (alongside the Doctor as portrayed by Jon Pertwee), and becoming an Australian citizen in 2004;

4 **ELECTORAL MATTERS—PROPOSED JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE**

Mr Pyne (Leader of the House), pursuant to notice, moved—That:

- (1) a Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters be appointed to inquire into and report on such matters relating to electoral laws and practices and their administration as may be referred to it by either House of the Parliament or a Minister;
- (2) annual reports of government departments and authorities presented to the House shall stand referred to the committee for any inquiry the committee may wish to make and reports shall stand referred to the committee in accordance with a schedule tabled by the Speaker to record the areas of responsibility of each committee, provided that:
 - (a) any question concerning responsibility for a report or a part of a report shall be determined by the Speaker; and
 - (b) the period during which an inquiry concerning an annual report may be commenced by a committee shall end on the day on which the next annual report of that department or authority is presented to the House;
- (3) the committee consist of 10 members, 3 Members of the House of Representatives to be nominated by the Government Whip or Whips, 2 Members of the House of Representatives to be nominated by the Opposition Whip or Whips or by any minority group or independent Member, 2 Senators to be nominated by the Leader of the Government in the Senate, 2 Senators to be nominated by the Leader of the Opposition in the Senate and 1 Senator to be nominated by any minority group or independent Senator;
- (4) every nomination of a member of the committee be notified in writing to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- (5) the members of the committee hold office as a joint standing committee until the House of Representatives is dissolved or expires by effluxion of time;

- (6) the committee elect a:
 - (a) Government member as its chair; and
 - (b) non-Government member as its deputy chair who shall act as chair of the committee at any time when the chair is not present at a meeting of the committee;
- (7) at any time when the chair and deputy chair are not present at a meeting of the committee the members present shall elect another member to act as chair at that meeting;
- (8) in the event of an equally divided vote, the chair, or the deputy chair when acting as chair, have a casting vote;
- (9) three members of the committee constitute a quorum of the committee, provided that in a deliberative meeting the quorum shall include one Government member of either House and one non-Government member of either House;
- (10) the committee:
 - (a) have power to appoint subcommittees consisting of three or more of its members and to refer to any subcommittee any matter which the committee is empowered to examine; and
 - (b) appoint the chair of each subcommittee who shall have a casting vote only;
- (11) at any time when the chair of a subcommittee is not present at a meeting of the subcommittee, the members of the subcommittee present shall elect another member of that subcommittee to act as chair at that meeting;
- (12) two members of a subcommittee constitute a quorum of that subcommittee, provided that in a deliberative meeting the quorum shall include one Government member of either House and one non-Government member of either House;
- (13) members of the committee who are not members of a subcommittee may participate in the proceedings of that subcommittee but shall not vote, move any motion or be counted for the purpose of a quorum;
- (14) the committee or any subcommittee have power to:
 - (a) call for witnesses to attend and for documents to be produced;
 - (b) conduct proceedings at any place it sees fit;
 - (c) sit in public or in private;
 - (d) report from time to time; and
 - (e) adjourn from time to time and sit during any adjournment of the Senate and the House of Representatives;
- (15) the committee or any subcommittee have power to consider and make use of:
 - (a) submissions lodged with the Clerk of the Senate in response to public advertisements placed in accordance with the resolution of the Senate of 26 November 1981 relating to a proposed Joint Select Committee on the Electoral System; and
 - (b) the evidence and records of the Joint Committees on Electoral Reform and Electoral Matters appointed during previous Parliaments;
- (16) the provisions of this resolution, so far as they are inconsistent with the standing orders, have effect notwithstanding anything contained in the standing orders; and
- (17) a message be sent to the Senate acquainting it of this resolution and requesting that it concur and take action accordingly.

Question—put and passed.

5 FOREIGN AFFAIRS, DEFENCE AND TRADE—PROPOSED JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE

Mr Pyne (Leader of the House), pursuant to notice, moved—That:

- (1) a Joint Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade be appointed to inquire into and report on such matters relating to foreign affairs, defence and trade as may be referred to it by:
 - (a) either House of the Parliament;
 - (b) the Minister for Foreign Affairs;
 - (c) the Minister for Defence; or

- (d) the Minister for Trade and Investment;
- (2) annual reports of government departments and authorities and reports of the Auditor-General presented to the House shall stand referred to the committee for any inquiry the committee may wish to make and reports shall stand referred to the committee in accordance with a schedule tabled by the Speaker to record the areas of responsibility of each committee, provided that:
 - (a) any question concerning responsibility for a report or a part of a report shall be determined by the Speaker; and
 - (b) the period during which an inquiry concerning an annual report may be commenced by a committee shall end on the day on which the next annual report of that department or authority is presented to the House;

- (4) every nomination of a member of the committee be notified in writing to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- (5) the members of the committee hold office as a joint standing committee until the House of Representatives is dissolved or expires by effluxion of time;
- (6) the committee elect a:
 - (a) Government member as its chair; and
 - (b) non-Government member as its deputy chair who shall act as chair of the committee at any time when the chair is not present at a meeting of the committee;
- (7) at any time when the chair and deputy chair are not present at a meeting of the committee the members present shall elect another member to act as chair at that meeting;
- (8) in the event of an equally divided vote, the chair, or the deputy chair when acting as chair, have a casting vote;

 - (ii) the Minister responsible for the administration of the Territory of Cocos (Keeling) Islands; the Territory of Christmas Island; the Coral Sea Islands Territory; the Territory of Ashmore and Cartier Islands; the Australian Antarctic Territory, and the Territory of Heard Island and McDonald Islands, and of Commonwealth responsibilities on Norfolk Island;

- (2) annual reports of government departments and authorities presented to the House shall stand referred to the committee for any inquiry the committee may wish to make and reports shall stand referred to the committee in accordance with a schedule tabled by the Speaker to record the areas of responsibility of each committee, provided that:

 - (b) the period during which an inquiry concerning an annual report may be commenced by a committee shall end on the day on which the next annual report of that department or authority is presented to the House;

- (5) the members of the committee hold office as a joint standing committee until the House of Representatives is dissolved or expires by effluxion of time;

 - (a) Government member as its chair; and
 - (b) non-Government member as its deputy chair who shall act as chair of the committee at any time when the chair is not present at a meeting of the committee;

- (19) the provisions of this resolution, so far as they are inconsistent with the standing orders, have effect notwithstanding anything contained in the standing orders; and
- (20) a message be sent to the Senate acquainting it of this resolution and requesting that it concur and take action accordingly.

9 PARLIAMENTARY LIBRARY—PROPOSED JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE

- (2) the Committee consist of 13 members, 4 Members of the House of Representatives nominated by the Government Whip or Whips, 3 Members of the House of Representatives nominated by the Opposition Whip or Whips or by any minority group or independent Member, 3 Senators nominated by the Leader of the Government in the Senate, 2 Senators nominated by the Leader of the Opposition in the Senate and 1 Senator nominated by any minority group or independent Senator;
- (3) every nomination:
 - (a) of a member of the committee be notified in writing to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and
 - (b) from a minority group in the Senate or an independent Senator shall be determined by agreement between them, and, in the absence of agreement duly notified to the President, any question of the representation on the committee shall be determined by the Senate;
- (4) the members of the committee hold office as a joint standing committee until the House of Representatives is dissolved or expires by effluxion of time;
- (5) the committee elect two of its members to be joint chairs, one being a Senator or Member, on an alternating basis each Parliament, who is a member of the government parties and one being a Senator or Member, on an alternating basis each Parliament, who is a member of the non-government parties, provided that the joint chairs may not be members of the same House;
- (6) the joint chair nominated by the Government parties shall chair meetings of the committee, and the joint chair nominated by the non-Government parties shall take the chair whenever the other joint chair is not present;
- (7) each of the joint chairs shall have a deliberative vote only, regardless of who is chairing the meeting;
- (8) when votes on a question before the committee are equally divided, the question shall be resolved in the negative;

 - (b) every nomination of a member of the committee be notified in writing to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
 - (c) the committee elect a:
 - (i) Government member as its chair; and
 - (ii) non-Government member as its deputy chair who shall act as chair of the committee at any time when the chair is not present at a meeting of the committee;
 - (d) at any time when the chair and deputy chair are not present at a meeting of the committee the members present shall elect another member to act as chair at that meeting;
 - (e) in the event of an equally divided vote, the chair, or the deputy chair when acting as chair, have a casting vote;

16 NORTHERN AUSTRALIA—PROPOSED JOINT SELECT COMMITTEE

- (3) as soon as practicable after 30 June 2014, the committee present an interim report to Parliament on the activities of the committee, which should include particular reference to the outcomes of public hearings held across Northern Australia, and any specialist knowledge emanating from the public submissions process;
- (4) the committee deliver its final report and recommendations to the Parliament on or before 6 September 2014;
- (5) the committee consist of 12 members, 4 Members of the House of Representatives to be nominated by the Government Whip or Whips, 3 Members of the House of Representatives to be nominated by the Opposition Whip or Whips or by any minority group or independent Member, 2 Senators to be nominated by the Leader of the Government in the Senate, 2 Senators to be nominated by the Leader of the Opposition in the Senate, and 1 Senator to be nominated by any minority group or independent Senator;
- (6) participating members may be appointed to the committee on the nomination in the House of Representatives, of the Government or Opposition Whip or Whips, or any minority group or independent Member, and in the Senate, of the Leader of the Government or Opposition, or any minority group or independent Senator, and such participating member:
 - (a) shall be taken to be a member of the committee for the purposes of forming a quorum if a majority of members of the committee are not present; and
 - (b) may participate in hearings of evidence and deliberations of the committee and have all rights of a committee member except that a participating member may not vote on any questions before the committee;

3 ECONOMIC GROWTH PLAN FOR TASMANIA

Mr Nikolic, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House notes:

- (1) with concern that Tasmania has the lowest gross state product per capita in Australia, the nation's highest unemployment rate, the lowest proportion of adults in the nation who have attained a year 12 qualification, one of the lowest retention rates to year 12, the lowest population growth, and the highest proportion of Australians without superannuation coverage;
- (2) that Tasmania has enormous potential with productive land, a skilled and willing work force and people with a strong commitment to improve the state's economy by endeavour and hard work; and
- (3) that the Federal Coalition's Economic Growth Plan for Tasmania, promised in the election campaign and reiterated in Her Excellency the Governor-General's speech opening the 44th Parliament, will provide the architecture to help turn Tasmania's economy around and encourage long term, sustainable employment.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

4 URBAN PUBLIC TRANSPORT PROJECTS

Mr S. P. Jones, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House notes that:

- (1) as identified by Infrastructure Australia, we are an urban nation with four-fifths of our population and economic activity occurring in our cities;
- (2) Australia's growing cities have a strategic need for greater public transport capacity to meet the growing transport task, ease urban road congestion and ensure improved national productivity;
- (3) this urban transport task is a joint Australian and state government responsibility;
- (4) recognising this, Labor in government invested \$13 billion—more Commonwealth funding for public transport than all other governments since Federation—and this investment in urban transport projects, put forward and assessed through Infrastructure Australia, resulted in a significant boost to the strategic development of Australia's public transport network; and
- (5) urban public transport projects including the Brisbane Cross River Rail project, the Perth Public Transport Package and the Tansley Park Public Transport Package in Adelaide are nationally significant projects and are not guaranteed to proceed without Australian Government funding.

 - (b) students undertaking training in rural locations have academic results that are equal to or better than their metropolitan counterparts;
 - (c) published data from public universities show high rates of RCS graduates working in, or intending to work in rural areas; and
 - (d) the information gathered through an independent project tracking all Australian and New Zealand medical students—Medical Schools Outcomes Database—demonstrates that long term placements in a rural setting through RCS have a significant impact on the vocational choice and intention to practice in a rural or remote setting as well as future career specialty focus; and
- (3) calls on the Government to:
 - (a) continue its support for these excellent initiatives; and
 - (b) examine opportunities to increase intern and postgraduate training places in rural locations to enhance the future of specialty medical service delivery with a focus on general practitioners in rural and regional Australia.

MONDAY, 2 DECEMBER 2013

1 The Federation Chamber met at 10.30 am.

2 MEMBERS' CONSTITUENCY STATEMENTS

Members' constituency statements were made.

3 LUNG CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

Ms Rishworth, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that November is Lung Cancer Awareness Month;
- (2) acknowledges that more than 9,100 Australians are diagnosed with lung cancer every year;
- (3) recognises that lung cancer claims the lives of more Australians than any other cancer with only 14 out of 100 Australians surviving five years beyond their initial diagnosis; and
- (4) calls on Australian and state and territory governments to work together to improve the survival rates of Australians diagnosed with lung cancer by encouraging early detection and providing access to high quality health care treatment and support.

Debate ensued.

Debate adjourned, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

4 WORLD AIDS DAY

Ms O'Dwyer, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that 1 December 2013 is World AIDS Day;
- (2) recognises that:
 - (a) more than 35 million people now live with HIV/AIDS worldwide, and almost 10 per cent of these are under the age of 15;
 - (b) every day nearly 6,300 people contract HIV—nearly 262 every hour;
 - (c) in Australia in 2012 there were 25,000 people living with HIV and 1,253 new diagnoses of HIV infection—a 10 per cent increase from previous years;
 - (d) in 2012, 1.6 million people died from AIDS-related illnesses;
 - (e) in some communities HIV rates are as high as 40 per cent;
 - (f) since the beginning of the epidemic in the 1980s, more than 75 million people have been infected with HIV and nearly 36 million have died of AIDS-related illnesses;
 - (g) there are now outstanding antiviral treatments available to people living with HIV; and
 - (h) although a lot of work has been done and many medical advances have been made, there is no cure and no vaccine, so a lot of research and work still needs to be done before we see the end of HIV;
- (3) acknowledges that:
 - (a) in July 2014, Melbourne will host the 20th International AIDS Conference (AIDS 2014);

- (b) the conference will bring together 14,000 delegates from around 200 countries, which will be the largest medical conference ever held in Australia; and
 - (c) the conference will be chaired by Nobel Laureate, Professor Françoise Barre-Sinoussi, and Professor Sharon Lewin; and
- (4) calls on the Parliament to:
- (a) continue Australia's strong commitment to an enduring effective partnership between government, scientists and the community to meet the needs of people living with HIV;
 - (b) continue Australia's strong commitment to medical health and research; and
 - (c) foster and cultivate Australia's medical health and research community and researchers to ensure we stay at the forefront of all aspects of treatment, care and research in HIV.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

5 HUMAN RIGHTS IN VIETNAM

Mr Hayes, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that:
- (a) 10 December is International Human Rights Day and also marks the 20th anniversary of the establishment of the High Commissioner for Human Rights;
 - (b) on 12 November 2013, the Socialist Republic of Vietnam gained a seat on the United Nations Human Rights Council and also signed the United Nations Convention Against Torture; and
 - (c) despite Vietnam being a signatory to the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, there remains a concerning number of human rights violations in that country including the:
 - (i) treatment of 14 Vietnamese Catholics who were arrested and sentenced to four to eight years imprisonment in January 2013 for protesting in support of land rights, freedom of religion and the release of previously convicted activists;
 - (ii) arrest in October 2012 of Nguyen Phuong Uyen and Dinh Nguyen Kha, charged under Article 88 of the Vietnamese Penal Code for distributing leaflets protesting against China's claims to the Paracel and Spratly islands in the South China Sea; and
 - (iii) seven year imprisonment of trade union organiser Do Thi Minh Hanh, for national security charges relating to her involvement in organising workers at a shoes factory in October 2010; and
- (2) calls on the Australian Government to:
- (a) take all appropriate steps to encourage the Vietnamese Government to honour its obligations as a signatory to the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights;
 - (b) consider issues of human rights in Vietnam when assigning funding under Australia's overseas development aid program; and
 - (c) continue Australia's engagement in bilateral and multilateral contexts with Vietnam on human rights.

Debate ensued.

Debate adjourned, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

6 AUSTRALIA POST

Ms King, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that:
- (a) Australia Post as per its Community Service Obligations, is required to achieve timely mail deliveries in all parts of Australia, not just the major capital cities;
 - (b) residents in regional towns and cities across Australia are not receiving mail for up to six days, with mail routes routinely left unprocessed due to insufficient staff at regional mail centres; and

- (c) constituents have contacted the offices of regional Members, citing regular occurrences of late mail affecting people who depend on reliable mail services; and
- (2) calls on the Minister for Communications to:
 - (a) ensure that the current cuts by attrition at regional mail centres are reversed, suspending moves by Australia Post and the Government to abandon regional Australia by transferring mail sorting services to capital cities;

7 NATIONAL APOLOGY FOR FORCED ADOPTIONS AND REMOVAL POLICIES AND PRACTICES

Mr Pyne (Leader of the House), by leave, moved—That today, this Parliament, on behalf of the Australian people, takes responsibility and apologises for the policies and practices that forced the separation of mothers from their babies, which created a lifelong legacy of pain and suffering.

We acknowledge the profound effects of these policies and practices on fathers.

And we recognise the hurt these actions caused to brothers and sisters, grandparents, partners and extended family members.

We deplore the shameful practices that denied you, the mothers, your fundamental rights and responsibilities to love and care for your children. You were not legally or socially acknowledged as their mothers. And you were yourselves deprived of care and support.

To you, the mothers who were betrayed by a system that gave you no choice and subjected you to manipulation, mistreatment and malpractice, we apologise.

We say sorry to you, the mothers who were denied knowledge of your rights, which meant you could not provide informed consent. You were given false assurances. You were forced to endure the coercion and brutality of practices that were unethical, dishonest and in many cases illegal.

We know you have suffered enduring effects from these practices forced upon you by others. For the loss, the grief, the disempowerment, the stigmatisation and the guilt, we say sorry.

To each of you who were adopted or removed, who were led to believe your mother had rejected you and who were denied the opportunity to grow up with your family and community of origin and to connect with your culture, we say sorry.

We apologise to the sons and daughters who grew up not knowing how much you were wanted and loved.

We acknowledge that many of you still experience a constant struggle with identity, uncertainty and loss, and feel a persistent tension between loyalty to one family and yearning for another.

To you, the fathers, who were excluded from the lives of your children and deprived of the dignity of recognition on your children's birth records, we say sorry. We acknowledge your loss and grief.

We recognise that the consequences of forced adoption practices continue to resonate through many, many lives. To you, the siblings, grandparents, partners and other family members who have shared in the pain and suffering of your loved ones or who were unable to share their lives, we say sorry.

Many are still grieving. Some families will be lost to one another forever. To those of you who face the difficulties of reconnecting with family and establishing on-going relationships, we say sorry.

We offer this apology in the hope that it will assist your healing and in order to shine a light on a dark period of our nation's history.

To those who have fought for the truth to be heard, we hear you now. We acknowledge that many of you have suffered in silence for far too long.

We are saddened that many others are no longer here to share this moment. In particular, we remember those affected by these practices who took their own lives. Our profound sympathies go to their families.

To redress the shameful mistakes of the past, we are committed to ensuring that all those affected get the help they need, including access to specialist counselling services and support, the ability to find the truth in freely available records and assistance in reconnecting with lost family.

We resolve, as a nation, to do all in our power to make sure these practices are never repeated. In facing future challenges, we will remember the lessons of family separation. Our focus will be on protecting the fundamental rights of children and on the importance of the child's right to know and be cared for by his or her parents.

With profound sadness and remorse, we offer you all our unreserved apology.

 - (d) Radio broadcasting of parliamentary proceedings - general principles, adopted 20 September 1994; and
 - (e) Broadcasting of proceedings - conditions for broadcasters, adopted 1 May 1996; and
- (2) in their place, adopt the following resolution:

1 Provision of broadcast

- (a) The House authorises the broadcast and re-broadcast of the proceedings and excerpts of proceedings of the House, its committees and of the Federation Chamber in accordance with this resolution.
- (b) The House authorises the provision of sound and vision coverage of proceedings of the House, its committees, and of the Federation Chamber, including records of past proceedings, through the House Monitoring Service and through the Parliament of Australia website.
- (c) Access to the House Monitoring Service sound and vision coverage of the proceedings of the House, its committees and the Federation Chamber is provided to persons and organisations as determined by the Speaker, on terms and conditions determined by the Speaker which must not be inconsistent with this resolution.
- (d) The Speaker shall report to the House on persons and organisations in receipt of the service and on any terms and conditions determined under paragraph 1(c).
- (e) Use of sound and vision coverage of proceedings of the House, its committees and the Federation Chamber, including records of past proceedings, published on the Parliament of Australia website is subject to conditions of use determined by the Speaker.

2 Broadcast of House of Representatives and Federation Chamber proceedings – House Monitoring Service

Access to proceedings provided through the House Monitoring Service is subject to compliance with the following conditions:

- (a) Only the following broadcast material shall be used:
 - (i) switched sound and vision feed of the House of Representatives, its committees and the Federation Chamber provided by the Parliament that is produced for broadcast, re-broadcast and archiving; and
 - (ii) official broadcast material supplied by authorised parliamentary staff.
- (b) Broadcast material shall be used only for the purposes of fair and accurate reports of proceedings, and shall not be used for:
 - (i) political party advertising or election campaigns; or
 - (ii) commercial sponsorship or commercial advertising.
- (c) Reports of proceedings shall be such as to provide a balanced presentation of differing views.
- (d) Excerpts of proceedings which are subsequently withdrawn may be broadcast only if the withdrawal is also reported.
- (e) The instructions of the Speaker or his or her delegates, which are not inconsistent with these conditions or the rules applying to the broadcasting of committee proceedings, shall be observed.

3 **Broadcast of committee proceedings**

The following conditions apply to the broadcasting of committee proceedings:

- (a) Recording and broadcasting of proceedings of a committee is subject to the authorisation of the committee.
- (b) A committee may authorise the broadcasting of only its public proceedings.
- (c) Recording and broadcasting of a committee is not permitted during suspensions of proceedings, or following an adjournment of proceedings.
- (d) A committee may determine conditions, not inconsistent with this resolution, for the recording and broadcasting of its proceedings, may order that any part of its proceedings not be recorded or broadcast, and may give instructions for the observance of conditions so determined and orders so made. A committee shall report to the House any wilful breach of such conditions, orders or instructions.
- (e) Recording and broadcasting of proceedings of a committee shall not interfere with the conduct of those proceedings, shall not encroach into the committee's work area, or capture documents (either in hard copy or electronic form) in the possession of committee members, witnesses or committee staff.
- (f) Broadcasts of proceedings of a committee, including excerpts of committee proceedings, shall be for the purpose only of making fair and accurate reports of those proceedings, and shall not be used for:
 - (i) political party advertising or election campaigns; or
 - (ii) commercial sponsorship or commercial advertising.
- (g) Where a committee intends to permit the broadcasting of its proceedings, a witness who is to appear in those proceedings shall be given reasonable opportunity, before appearing in the proceedings, to object to the broadcasting of the proceedings and to state the ground of the objection. The committee shall consider any such objection, having regard to the proper protection of the witness and the public interest in the proceedings, and if the committee decides to permit broadcasting of the proceedings notwithstanding the witness' objection, the witness shall be so informed before appearing in the proceedings.

4 **Radio broadcast of parliamentary proceedings by the Australian Broadcasting Corporation – general principles**

The House adopts the following general principles agreed to by the Joint Committee on the Broadcasting of Parliamentary Proceedings on 19 March 2013:

- (a) *Allocation of the broadcast between the Senate and the House of Representatives*
The proceedings of Parliament shall be broadcast live whenever a House is sitting. The allocation of broadcasts between the Senate and the House of Representatives will be in accordance with the standing determinations made by the Joint Committee on the Broadcasting of Parliamentary Proceedings. It is anticipated that over time, the coverage of each House will be approximately equal.
- (b) *Re-broadcast of questions and answers*
At the conclusion of the live broadcast of either House, questions without notice and answers thereto from the House not allocated the broadcast shall be re-broadcast.
- (c) *Unusual or exceptional circumstances*
Nothing in these general principles shall prevent the Joint Committee on the Broadcasting of Parliamentary Proceedings from departing from them in unusual or exceptional circumstances.

- 5 This resolution shall continue in force unless and until amended or rescinded by the House in this or a subsequent Parliament.

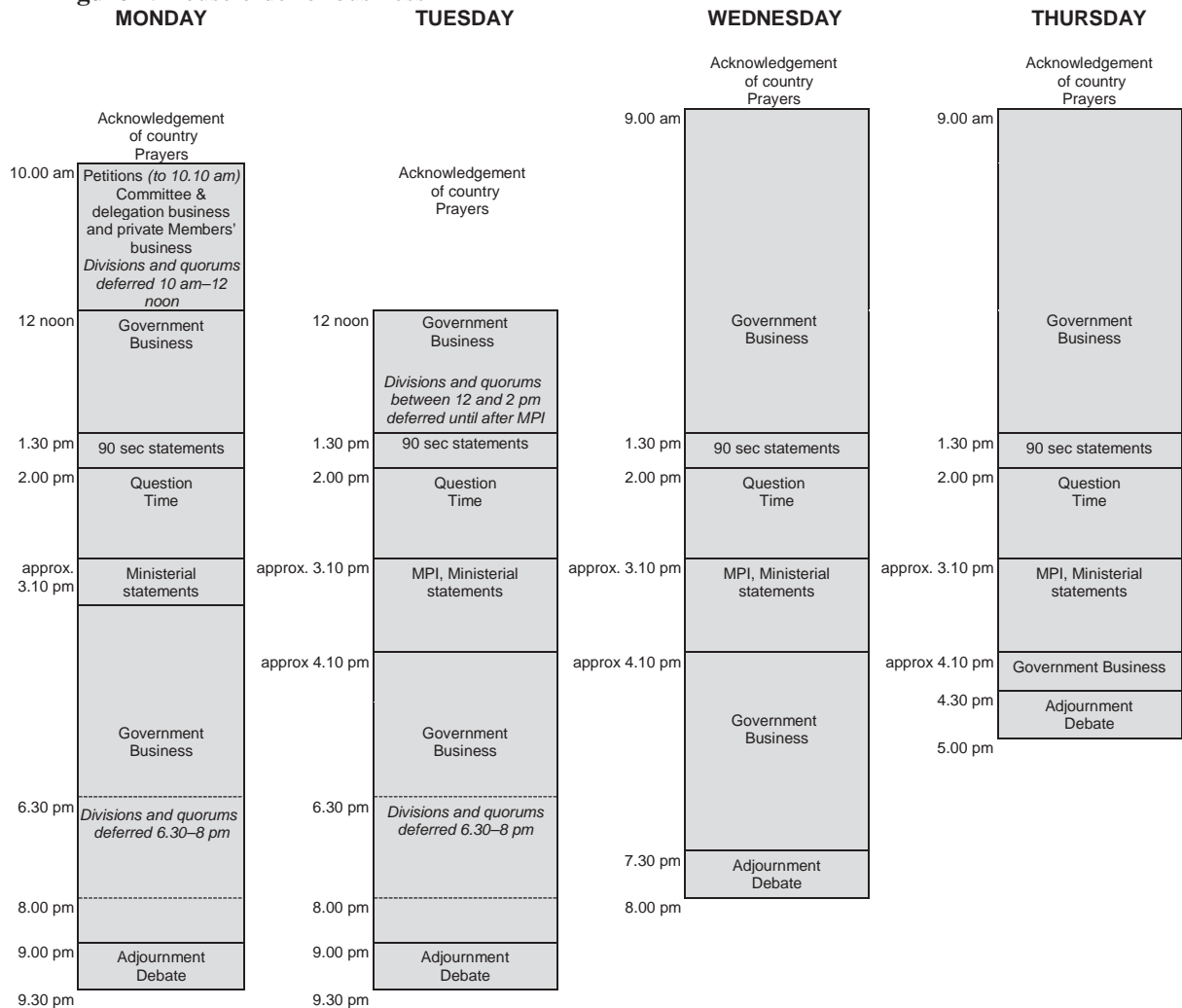

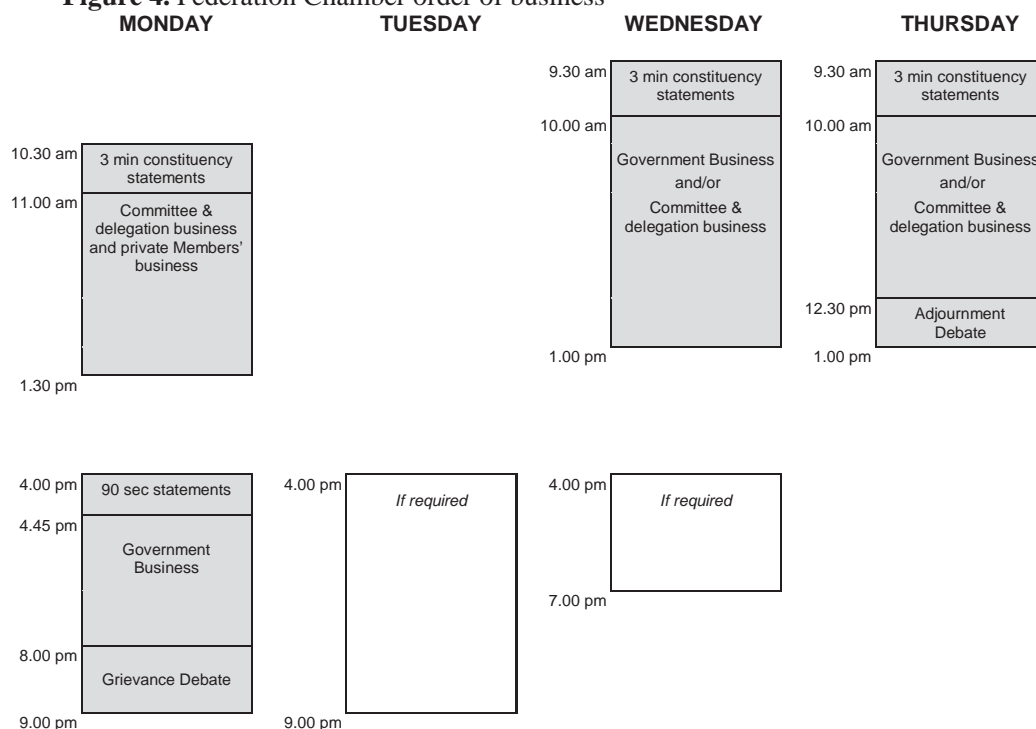

Ms Roxon noted that the inquiry remained live and, at the conclusion of the judicial proceedings, the committee would consider how it should proceed with the inquiry. That inquiry lapsed with the dissolution of the House.

The Honourable Member for Dobell also makes reference to findings of guilt in relation to Mr Thomson by the Melbourne Magistrates Court on 18 February 2014.

Deliberately misleading the House is one of the matters that can be found to be a contempt.

As I noted earlier, this matter was referred to the Committee of Privileges and Members' Interests in the last Parliament with the unanimous agreement of the House.

I have considered the principal information provided by the Honourable Member for Dobell and the background material I have already referred to.

In light of the fact that the House had referred this matter to the Committee of Privileges and Members' Interests in the last Parliament and that the proceedings were suspended and the findings of guilt by the Melbourne Magistrates Court, I give precedence for this matter to be referred to the Committee of Privileges and Members' Interests.

3 DIABETES

Mr Wyatt, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that diabetes is a serious health concern with an estimated 382 million people worldwide living with diabetes;
- (2) recognises that:
 - (a) 8 per cent of Australians are living with diabetes;
 - (b) by 2035, 14 per cent of Australians will be living with diabetes; and
 - (c) incidences of diabetes are three to four times higher in Indigenous communities;
- (3) acknowledges that the World Diabetes Congress was:
 - (a) held in Melbourne, from 2 to 6 December 2013;
 - (b) attended by 50 international parliamentarians; and
 - (c) successful in passing the Melbourne Declaration and appointing International Parliamentary Champions for Diabetes;
- (4) recognises that the International Parliamentary Champions for Diabetes will:
 - (a) exchange policy views and practical ideas for prevention and management of diabetes;
 - (b) encourage all governments to acknowledge that diabetes is a national health priority that requires a comprehensive action plan leading to action; and
 - (c) aim to improve health outcomes for people with diabetes, stop discrimination towards people with diabetes and prevent development of Type 2 diabetes;
- (5) calls on the Government, individuals, families, communities, health care services and industry, to take urgent action to:
 - (a) ensure prevention of diabetes;
 - (b) improve early diagnosis of diabetes;
 - (c) support ongoing research into treatment and medications for diabetes; and
 - (d) effectively manage and treat diabetes; and
- (6) acknowledges the Government's contribution:
 - (a) with an expert Advisory Group to consider available evidence and consult with a wide range of stakeholders to inform the development of the National Diabetes Strategy;
 - (b) to ongoing research into a cure for Type 1 diabetes with a \$35 million contribution into the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation's Clinical Research Network; and
 - (c) in providing an additional \$1.4 million for the Diabetes Insulin Pump Programme.

Debate ensued.

4 SYRIA AND HUMANITARIAN AID

7 25TH ANNIVERSARY OF CHEMICAL ATTACKS IN IRAQ

- (1) March 2013 marked the 25th anniversary of the genocidal chemical attack by the regime of Iraqi dictator Saddam Hussein on Halabja in the Kurdish region of Iraq that took at least 4,000 lives within a few minutes and displaced many thousands more, and was part of Saddam's brutal Anfal Campaign of the 1980s, targeting Kurdish and other minorities in Iraq;
- (2) some 4,000 villages, 2,000 schools and 300 hospitals were destroyed, including through the use of chemical weapons across dozens of Kurdish villages;
- (3) the Saddam regime was also responsible for the:
 - (a) deportation or forced relocation of tens of thousands of Faili Kurds on the basis that they were not considered Iraqi;
 - (b) abduction and execution of an estimated 8,000 Barzani Kurds who were subsequently buried in mass graves in southern Iraq; and
 - (c) arrest, execution and subsequent burial of up to 100,000 Iraqi Kurds in 1988, including women and children; and
- (4) the former dictator Saddam Hussein and Ali Hassan al Majid, known as Chemical Ali, were subsequently prosecuted and convicted for these and other crimes.

 - (b) that, in spite of a 44 per cent increase in education funding by the Government during the last decade, student performance has declined, which indicates that there is much more to improving educational outcomes for our children than simply increasing funding;
- (2) that the PISA 2012 survey has also revealed how critical teacher quality is to Australia's education system and to lifting student outcomes and how outcomes for students, regardless of which school they attend, are directly affected by the quality of the teaching they receive;
- (3) that the Government's response to the PISA 2012 survey emphasises the critical importance of teacher quality to Australia's education system and to lifting student outcomes, coupled with a robust curriculum, expanding autonomy for principals, and encouraging more parental engagement; and
- (4) the Government's consistent commitment to ensuring a fairer, needs based funding arrangement for schools nationally, to deliver better schools for Australian students.

“whilst not declining to give the bill a second reading the House notes that:

- (1) the Government repeatedly stated before the election ‘that if debt is the problem, more debt is not the answer’;
- (2) the 2013-14 Mid-Year Economic and Fiscal Outlook showed a \$17 billion blow-out in the 2013-14 budget deficit, which at the time represented a \$167 million budget blow-out per day since the Government took office;
- (3) 60 per cent of the predicted budget blow-out in 2013-14 was due to the decisions of the Government alone;
- (4) the Government has sought to pave the way for deep cuts to the federal budget by deliberately blowing out the budget and establishing its Commission of Audit; and
- (5) these cuts would be another example of this Government saying one thing before the election, and doing the complete opposite after it.”

Debate resumed.

Amendment negatived.

 - (a) Australia's elite netball players have opportunities to interact with parliamentarians as they prepare for the upcoming Commonwealth Games and the Netball World Cup;
 - (b) the Australian media plays an important role in highlighting the role that netball has in our cultural identity, which in turn promotes the sport and increases participation rates; and
 - (c) Netball Australia should be congratulated for its impact in boosting the profile of women in sport, providing its members with valuable leadership skills and supporting world-class athletes.

Debate ensued.

5 ABC AND SBS

Ms Parke, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that:
 - (a) since 1 July 1932 when ABC Radio first came on air, the Australian Broadcasting Corporation (ABC), created by the Australian Parliament, has played an integral and essential role in serving communities from all corners of the Australian Federation;
 - (b) the ABC and more recently, the Special Broadcasting Corporation (SBS), have played a key role in facilitating the evolution of a diverse but cohesive Australian polity, contributed significantly to the creation of a distinctive Australian identity, and been a critical guarantor of the quality and strength of Australian democracy;
 - (c) the ABC's Charter states the broadcaster shall 'contribute to a sense of national identity and inform and entertain, and reflect the diversity of the Australian community';
 - (d) public broadcasting plays an irreplaceable role in delivering a range of services that have not been provided and are not likely to be provided by private media organisations, including high-quality educational children's television, comprehensive emergency services broadcasts, non-English language and multicultural programming, and comprehensive coverage of major civic and sporting events, and democratic processes;
 - (e) the news, information, entertainment, and emergency service announcements provided by the ABC are of particular importance in regional and remote communities across Australia;
 - (f) the ABC has a longstanding and established reputation, based on public opinion data and independent analysis, as the most trusted and trustworthy source of television and radio news in Australia;
 - (g) the conservative think-tank, the Institute of Public Affairs, has called for the breakup and/or privatisation of the ABC and SBS; and
 - (h) on the day before the election, on 6 September 2013, speaking live to SBS from Penrith football stadium, the Prime Minister said, 'No cuts to education, no cuts to health, no change to pensions, no change to the GST and no cuts to the ABC or SBS'; and
- (2) calls on the Government to:
 - (a) confirm the Prime Minister's clear and unequivocal commitment that there will be no cuts to the ABC or SBS;
 - (b) cease its unwarranted, politically motivated vilification of the ABC as a news organisation, and its baseless criticism of the ABC's organisational independence and integrity;
 - (c) respect the ABC's mandate to provide innovative and comprehensive broadcasting services, which in this digital age includes many platforms and cannot be confined to radio and television; and
 - (d) uphold the ABC and SBS Acts in respect of the arm's length, merit-based, and consultative protocols used for the appointment of ABC and SBS Board members.

Debate ensued.

6 DEREGULATION

Mr Hawke, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes:
 - (a) that in April 2007, the previous government promised to lift Australia's productivity performance by implementing a 'one regulation in, one regulation out' policy, but instead, between 2007 and 2013 it added over 21,000 new regulations and repealed 105;
 - (b) the findings of the Australian Chamber of Commerce and Industry's 2012 National Red Tape Survey which showed that:

- (i) 44 per cent of businesses spend between one and five hours a week complying with government (federal, state or local) regulatory requirements (filling out forms, applying for permits, reporting business activity);
 - (ii) 72 per cent of businesses say the time they are spending on red tape has increased in the last two years; and
 - (iii) 54.3 per cent say that complying with government regulations has prevented them from making changes to grow or expand their business; and
- (c) that in 2013, Australia was ranked 128 out of 148 nations on the World Economic Forum Global Competitiveness Index in terms of its regulatory burden;
- (2) recognises:
- (a) the need for significant deregulation and the removal of burdensome red and green tape to allow businesses in the Australian economy to grow;
 - (b) that the Government has a plan to cut regulation across all areas of government, including on the Parliament's first repeal day scheduled for 26 March 2014;
 - (c) that the House Standing Committee on the Environment is currently inquiring into the impact of 'green tape' and issues related to environmental regulation and deregulation; and
 - (d) that identifying other obsolete and outdated legislative instruments and removing them from the statute books will reduce the regulatory burden on the Australian economy; and
- (3) commends the Government for undertaking this approach to deregulation to boost productivity in the Australian economy.

Debate resumed by Mr M. C. Butler who moved, as an amendment—That all the words after “That” be omitted with a view to substituting the following words:

“whilst not declining to give the bill a second reading the House notes the:

- (1) program will be deeply flawed in its design and implementation given the poor environmental record of the current Government;
- (2) bill provides insufficient protections for participants in the areas of occupational health and safety, workers compensation and rehabilitation;

- (3) Government should clarify why participants do not have employee status even though they are to be removed from the social security system and paid an equivalent training wage;

- (a) Australia's co-sponsorship of the 2012 United Nations General Assembly Human Rights Council resolution calling on the Government of Sri Lanka to implement the recommendations of the Lessons Learnt and Reconciliation Commission of Sri Lanka and to take credible and independent actions to ensure justice, equity, accountability and reconciliation for all Sri Lankans;
- (b) Australia's co-sponsorship of the 2013 United Nations General Assembly Human Rights Council resolution expressing concern at continuing reports of violations of human rights in Sri Lanka, and reiterating the call upon the Government of Sri Lanka to implement the Commission's recommendations and to fulfil its commitment to conduct an independent and credible investigation into allegations of violations of international human rights law and international humanitarian law;
- (c) reports of continuing violations of human rights in Sri Lanka, intimidation of and reprisals against human rights defenders, members of civil society and journalists, threats to judicial independence and the rule of law, and a rapid rise in violence and discrimination on the basis of religion or belief in Sri Lanka; and
- (d) the conclusion of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights that national mechanisms have consistently failed to establish the truth and achieve justice in Sri Lanka, and her recommendation that the Human Rights Council establish an international inquiry mechanism to further investigate the alleged violations of human rights law and international humanitarian law and monitor any domestic accountability processes; and

(2) calls on the Australian Government to:

 - (b) the benefits that the link will provide in reducing travel time, traffic congestion and pollution, and providing safer roads; and
 - (c) that this infrastructure will not only benefit the people of North-West Sydney and the central coast, but will have a flow on effect to all areas of Sydney.”

 - (b) clarifying that the Government expects franchisors and franchisees to act in good faith towards one another by making it a requirement under the Code;
 - (c) enhancing compliance and enforcement of the Code by providing additional tools to the Commonwealth regulator, the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission; and
 - (d) clarifying the policy intent of provisions of the Code which have caused unintentional confusion or an administrative burden without any corresponding benefit.

- (4) the Government is using these bills as a distraction from cuts to protections for seniors, consumers, workers and investors."

3 NATIONAL BROADBAND NETWORK

Ms Sudmalis, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that the recent Strategic Review of the National Broadband Network (NBN) revealed that the:
 - (a) Government's broadband plan can be completed using a mix of technologies to save \$32 billion, keep monthly bills lower and deliver the NBN to all Australians four years sooner than under Labor's plan; and

3 REGIONAL AUSTRALIA AND THE BUDGET

Ms Collins, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) recognises that the Government has turned its back on regional Australia in the budget;
- (2) acknowledges that the Government's broken promises and wrong priorities in the budget will hurt those living in regional Australia and further increase the divide between the city and the bush;
- (3) notes that this budget will hurt regional Australia by:
 - (a) slashing \$1 billion in funding to local government by cutting into the Financial Assistance Grants;
 - (b) introducing co-payments to Medicare that will discourage doctors from bulk billing, meaning there will be less choice for people to access general practitioner services in regional areas;
 - (c) cutting health which will mean fewer services in regional Australia;
 - (d) cutting education which will impact on regional schools and students with less funding available;
 - (e) increasing the fuel excise which will hurt regional Australians the most who rely on being mobile and being able to travel to work;
 - (f) cutting the ABC that regional Australians rely on for information; and
 - (g) increasing university fees that will hurt regional students and regional universities; and
- (4) calls on the Government to reconsider its broken promises and wrong priorities for regional Australia in the Budget.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

4 INFRASTRUCTURE GROWTH PACKAGE

Mr Williams, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) commends the Government on the establishment of an Infrastructure Growth Package (IGP) that will fast track investment in critical infrastructure across the country;
- (2) notes that:
 - (a) funds will be targeted at projects that grow the economy, boost productivity and create jobs;
 - (b) the fund includes \$5 billion over five years towards the Asset Recycling Initiative which will encourage the states and territories to sell assets and recycle the sale proceeds into new productivity-enhancing infrastructure; and
 - (c) the fund also includes \$3.7 billion for targeted infrastructure investments to delivery priority infrastructure projects and upgrades across the country;
- (3) acknowledges the IGP builds on the Government's existing commitment, now at more than \$50 billion, to fund key road, rail and intermodal projects; and
- (4) recognises the IGP as part of the Government's Economic Action Strategy to build a strong, prosperous economy for a safe and secure Australia.

Mr Albanese moved, as an amendment—

That all the words after "That this House" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words:

- (1) condemns the Government for failing to fulfil its promises on infrastructure investment in its budget of broken promises;
- (2) notes the Budget:
 - (a) fails to conduct cost benefit analysis for any new project funded in the Budget greater than \$100 million;
 - (b) cuts funding to projects which have been recommended by Infrastructure Australia including Brisbane's Cross River Rail and the Melbourne Metro;
 - (c) fails to provide any additional funding across the forward estimates for the Pacific Highway or the Bruce Highway;
 - (d) cuts funding for any public transport projects other than those already under construction; and
 - (e) fails to fund any new rail freight projects;
- (3) further notes the advance payment of \$1.5 billion this month for the East West project in Melbourne in direct contravention of the Government's stated policy of only making milestone payments upon construction; and
- (4) condemns the Coalition for undermining the independence of Infrastructure Australia.

Debate continued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

5 MANDATORY RENEWABLE ENERGY TARGET

Mr Conroy, pursuant to notice, moved— That this House:

- (1) recognises the importance of investment certainty for clean energy investors;

 - (a) under the Mandatory Renewable Energy Target (MRET), around 3,500 MW of new renewable energy capacity has been commissioned since 2001, with total investment to date of \$18 billion;
 - (b) the Clean Energy Council estimates that there is potential for another \$18.7 billion in clean energy investment if the MRET policy was retained in its current form;
 - (c) over 24,300 people are directly employed in the renewable energy industry;
 - (d) the Australian Energy Market Commission has found that the cost of the MRET accounted for approximately three per cent of residential retail electricity prices in Australia; and
 - (e) reducing the greenhouse gas emissions intensity of our electricity generation sector is essential if we are to reduce Australia's carbon pollution; and

- (3) calls on the Government to commit to retaining the MRET at the legislated 41,000 gigawatt hours by 2020.

6 FLOODS IN BOSNIA-HERZEGOVNIA, SERBIA AND CROATIA

- (1) recognises the tragedy of the floods in May that afflicted Bosnia-Herzegovina, Serbia and Croatia, which killed more than 40 people;
- (2) notes the:
 - (a) need for evacuation of large populations from those countries; and
 - (b) risk of undiscovered land mines from the war in the 1990s, being moved by flood waters and mudslides, increasing the risk to civilian populations; and
- (3) commends the Australian Government for pre-positioning funds with the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies through the Disaster Relief Emergency Funds to assist national Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies to respond quickly to situations such as this.

Debate ensued.

7 POLIO

Ms Parke, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) commends the Government for reaffirming Australia's support for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (the Initiative) by maintaining the \$15 million commitment for 2013-14;
- (2) notes that:
 - (a) on 13 January 2014, India passed three years without reporting a single case of polio, an achievement reports say will lead to the entire South-East Asia Region of the World Health Organisation being certified as polio-free later in 2014;
 - (b) lessons learned from India's success are now part of the *Polio Eradication and Endgame Strategic Plan 2013-2018* announced at the Global Vaccine Summit in Abu Dhabi in 2013;
 - (c) the Initiative should mobilise the polio eradication infrastructure for broader child survival efforts wherever possible, ensuring that the knowledge, capacities, processes and assets created by the Initiative contribute to reducing child deaths, accelerating the achievement of Millennium Development Goal 4;
 - (d) despite ongoing security challenges, in the three countries where polio remains endemic—Afghanistan, Pakistan and Nigeria—the proportion of children vaccinated during 2013 increased;
 - (e) in 2013 for the first time in the history of the Initiative, all cases of poliomyelitis caused by a wild virus were due to a single serotype, type 1; the most recent case due to wild poliovirus type 3 occurring on 10 November 2012 in Nigeria, while a case of poliovirus type 2 has not been detected since 1999;
 - (f) polio outbreaks in previously polio-free countries—Somalia, Syria, Cameroon—and the presence of the polio virus in Egypt and Israel are constant reminders of the need to ensure the polio program is fully funded and of the need for countries to take full ownership of the implementation of emergency plans; and
 - (g) the World Health Organisation, its Initiative partners and the GAVI Alliance have initiated a joint program of work to ensure polio eradication infrastructure systematically contributes to improving routine immunisation coverage; and
- (3) calls on the Government to continue to support polio eradication by reaffirming Australia's commitment to provide \$80 million over four years from 2015 to 2018 to the Initiative.

- (1) express its disapproval of any future deployment to Iraq of Australian combat forces;
- (2) call on the Prime Minister to make a clear public statement today ruling out any future deployment to Iraq of Australian combat forces; and
- (3) call on the Government to instigate a Royal Commission into Australia's involvement in the invasion of Iraq and subsequent 11 years of war, and in particular the conduct of the main Australian protagonists for this unmitigated foreign policy, security and humanitarian disaster, including then Prime Minister John Howard and Foreign Minister Alexander Downer.

Debate ensued.

The House divided and only Mr Wilkie, Ms McGowan and Mr Bandt voting "Aye", the Deputy Speaker (Mr B. C. Scott) declared the question resolved in the negative.

- (2) calls on the Government to:
 - (a) provide certainty to the Australian shipbuilding industry and to thousands of Australian workers by settling a short, medium and long term program of government shipbuilding projects to ensure a balanced work flow and smooth delivery of key naval assets; and
 - (b) bring forward relevant shipbuilding projects, including the Pacific patrol boat and replacement Anzac frigate projects, in a timely manner to ensure that shipyards, companies, and workers are not put at risk.

3 FUNDING OF THE NATIONAL CONGRESS OF AUSTRALIA'S FIRST PEOPLES

Mr Neumann, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that:
 - (a) the National Congress of Australia's First Peoples (Congress) is the national representative body of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples; and
 - (b) Congress:
 - (i) was established with a view to creating a new relationship with governments to reset the relationship based on partnership and genuine engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples; and
 - (ii) is owned and controlled by its membership and independent of government;
- (2) recognises:
 - (a) the important role of Congress as a leader and advocate for recognising the status and rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders as First Nations Peoples in Australia; and
 - (b) that the existence of an effective national body is essential to the Government's ability to fulfil its Closing the Gap targets;
- (3) acknowledges that:
 - (a) Congress received Deductible Gift Recipient status in July 2013, allowing it to begin to pursue income opportunities with corporate Australia and the wider community;
 - (b) the previous government committed:
 - (i) \$29.2 million over four years to establish Congress; and
 - (ii) \$15 million over three years in the 2013 budget to support Congress to continue to develop income opportunities to sustain the organisation; and
 - (c) ongoing Commonwealth funding beyond 2013 is essential to support the continued sustainability of an independent national voice for First Nation Peoples;

- (4) notes with concern that the Government plans to cut the \$15 million funding and abandon the commitment to the sustainability of Congress as the national representative body for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples; and
- (5) calls on the Government to commit to the sustainability of a strong Congress by honouring the \$15 million funding commitment.

Debate ensued.

4 AUSTRALIA AND JAPAN

 - (b) since 1980, the top 1 per cent income share has doubled, and the top 0.1 per cent income share has tripled; and
 - (c) overall, inequality in Australia is now higher than it has been in three-quarters of a century;
- (2) notes that:
 - (a) analysis by NATSEM (which the Prime Minister once described as ‘the most reputable and authoritative modelling organisation in Australia’) shows that the 2014-15 budget will redistribute income from lower-income households to higher-income households; and
 - (b) by 2017-18, NATSEM analysis suggests that the budget will cause:
 - (i) across all households, a 2.2 per cent drop in disposable incomes in the bottom quintile, and a 0.2 per cent rise in disposable incomes in the top quintile;
 - (ii) among couples with children, a 6.6 per cent drop in disposable incomes of households in the poorest quintile; and
 - (iii) among single parents, a 10.8 per cent drop in disposable incomes of households in the poorest quintile; and
- (3) calls upon the Government to rethink a budget that not only breaks promises and produces higher deficit figures than in the Pre-election Economic and Fiscal Outlook 2014, but also fails the ‘fair go test’ by hurting low and middle income families.

“(4) the committee deliver its final report and recommendations to the Parliament on or before 1 September 2014;” and

(2) a message be sent to the Senate acquainting it of this resolution and seeking its concurrence in this resolution.

3 SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS—CONSIDERATION OF BILLS

Mr Pyne (Leader of the House), pursuant to notice, moved—That, in relation to proceedings on the Public Governance, Performance and Accountability (Consequential and Transitional Provisions) Bill 2014, the Public Governance, Performance and Accountability (Consequential Modifications of Appropriation Acts (No. 1), (No. 3) and (No. 5)) Bill 2014, the Public Governance, Performance and Accountability (Consequential Modifications of Appropriation Acts (No. 2), (No. 4) and (No. 6)) Bill 2014, and the Public Governance, Performance and Accountability (Consequential Modifications of Appropriation Acts (Parliamentary Departments)) Bill 2014, so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent the following from occurring:

- (1) the resumption of debate on the second readings of the bills being called on together;
- (2) at the conclusion of the second reading debate, not including a Minister speaking in reply, or 60 minutes after the resumption of the second reading debate, whichever is the earlier, a Minister being called to sum up the second reading debate and then without delay, (a) one question being put on any amendments moved to motions for the second readings by opposition Members, (b) any necessary questions being put on amendments moved by any other Member, and (c) one question being put on the second readings of the bills together;
- (3) if the second readings of the bills have been agreed to, messages from the Governor-General recommending appropriations for the bills being announced together;
- (4) the consideration in detail stages, if required, on the bills being taken together for a period not exceeding 20 minutes at which time any questions necessary to complete the detail stage being put;
- (5) at the conclusion of the detail stage, one question being put on the third readings of the bills together; and
- (6) any variation to this arrangement to be made only by a motion moved by a Minister.

6 FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE GRANTS TO LOCAL GOVERNMENTS

Mr Albanese, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) condemns:
 - (a) the decision by the Government to freeze indexation of Financial Assistance Grants to local governments across Australia;
 - (b) the resulting cuts to local government funding of \$925 million over the next four years, affecting every council in Australia; and
 - (c) the failure of the:
 - (i) Minister for Infrastructure and Regional Development to protect this critical funding to local governments across Australia; and
 - (ii) National Party to stand up against the cuts on behalf of regional and remote councils, which are affected most by the freeze;
- (2) notes:
 - (a) Financial Assistance Grants are used by every local government in Australia to maintain local roads and deliver critical community services;
 - (b) the Government's indexation freeze represents cuts of \$925 million to local governments in every town and city over the next four years;
 - (c) regional and remote councils will be most affected by the cuts, with larger service areas and more kilometres of roads to maintain per ratepayer;
 - (d) the viability of some regional and remote councils may be compromised as a result of the cuts;
 - (e) the pressure now on councils to increase council rates or cut services due to the cuts; and
 - (f) within six years, the value of the cuts will be greater than the entire Roads to Recovery budget; and
- (3) calls upon the Government to:
 - (a) listen to local government concerns about the impact of freezing indexation of Financial Assistance Grants on local roads and community services; and
 - (b) immediately reverse the decision to freeze indexation of Financial Assistance Grants to local government over the next three years.

Debate ensued.

7 CARBON TAX

Mrs Prentice, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) understands that the carbon tax has caused a reduction in confidence and competitiveness for small business;
- (2) notes that:
 - (a) the carbon tax has seen gas and electricity prices rise by around 10 per cent;
 - (b) the former Government did not provide compensation for small businesses hit by the carbon tax;
 - (c) many small businesses are run at a very slim profit margin and are unable to pass these costs on to the consumers, forcing them to absorb the burden of the carbon tax themselves;
 - (d) with the cost of doing business increasing due to the carbon tax, small businesses lose confidence, invest less money in their business, and are forced to employ fewer staff; and
 - (e) under the former Government, too many small business jobs were lost; and
- (3) commends the Government's action to repeal the carbon tax to provide certainty to small business and restore the sector's competitiveness, viability and capacity to employ.

MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS

MONDAY, 14 JULY 2014

1 The Federation Chamber met at 10.32 am.

2 MEMBERS' CONSTITUENCY STATEMENTS

Members' constituency statements were made.

3 HUMAN RIGHTS IN MYANMAR

Ms Parke, having amended, by leave, notice No. 1, private Members' business, moved—That this House:

(1) notes that:

- (a) the sectarian unrest in parts of Burma and also in the Mandalay, Bago, and Rangoon regions, but in Rakhine state in particular where around 140,000 people have been displaced for almost two years, is of particular concern;
- (b) Human Rights Watch released two reports on the unrest in Rakhine state and the situation of Rohingya Muslims there, which raise concerns about persecution against Rohingya and outlines the dire humanitarian situation in Rakhine state;
- (c) Rohingya in Rakhine state were unable to self-identify in the national census in Burma in April 2014;
- (d) on 27 May 2014 Burma's state-run media published a draft law on religious conversions that would impose restrictions on citizens wishing to change their religion, which would encourage further repression and violence against Muslims and other religious minorities;
- (e) the Australian Government continues to assist affected people in Rakhine state through direct humanitarian assistance, and has provided almost \$10.7 million in humanitarian assistance since the violence in 2012, making Australia one of the largest humanitarian donors to Rakhine state; and
- (f) significant acts of discrimination or violence against any persons in Burma will impact on Burma's international standing and consequently harm its bilateral relationships; and

(2) calls on the Australian Government to urge the Myanmar Government to:

- (a) elevate its efforts to resolve sectarian unrest in parts of Burma and provide a safe and secure environment for aid personnel so they can continue to provide vital humanitarian assistance to people in need, including in Rakhine state;
- (b) allow the establishment of the United Nations Office of the High Commissioner of Human Rights in Burma with a full rights protection, promotion and technical assistance mandate, and permit unfettered access to all areas where sectarian violence has occurred;
- (c) permit Médecins Sans Frontières to freely enter and operate in Rakhine state, and provide humanitarian assistance to all persons needing it;

- (d) impartially investigate and bring to justice all those responsible for abuses, regardless of their status, position, or rank;
- (e) ensure the security of all persons in Rakhine state while protecting human rights, including the right to freedom of movement, maintaining proper rule of law and good governance that includes an end to all discriminatory policies against Rohingya;
- (f) take steps to remove or amend any current laws which discriminate against minority ethnic or religious groups, including Burma's 1982 Citizenship Law;
- (g) abandon the proposed law on religious conversions that would politicise religion and permit government intrusion on decisions of faith;
- (h) ensure right to fair trial to all persons held in jails in Burma;
- (i) ensure all local laws are non-discriminatory and fair to all people of Burma, and respect the rights to movement, religion, work and access to health care and education;
- (j) condemn violence and abuse inflicted on any persons, ensuring proper judicial procedures are applied;
- (k) ensure Burma security forces protect all communities equally and uphold the law of the state;
- (l) initiate appropriate investigations into incidents of violence involving minority ethnic or religious groups, such as the Du Cheer Yar Tan incident in Maungdaw township in January 2014;
- (m) support the citizenship rights of Rohingya and reconciliation of local communities;
- (n) ensure the rights of women by protecting women's right to choose whom they will marry without regard to religious faith, and permit persons the right to freely choose the size of their family;
- (o) provide appropriate humanitarian assistance, including adequate shelter and access by humanitarian organisations, to those affected by the unrest; and
- (p) ensure that any return of internally displaced peoples to their place of origin is conducted voluntarily, in safety and with dignity.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

4 AUSTRALIAN DEFENCE FORCE PERSONNEL

Ms Gambaro, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House applauds the Government for its resolute commitment to supporting the men and women of the Australian Defence Force (ADF), past and present, by:

- (1) honouring its election promise to:
 - (a) introduce from 1 January 2014, free basic health care to all eligible dependents of full-time ADF members and Reservists undertaking continuous full time service; and
 - (b) provide 'fair indexation' for military superannuants by amending the indexation arrangements for more than 57,000 Defence Forces Retirement Benefits and Defence Force Retirement and Death Benefits scheme pensioners from 1 July 2014;
- (2) officially launching Project Suakin, which introduces a range of full-time, part time and casual employment categories within the ADF that will offer members increased flexibility to match their changing personal circumstances and enable the ADF to respond to current and future workforce challenges; and
- (3) directing Defence Housing Australia to upgrade housing stock available to Defence personnel and reduce pressure on local community housing markets through programs such as the Top End Defence housing strategy which will deliver over 2,300 additional homes in Darwin.

Debate ensued.

5 ATYPICAL HAEMOLYTIC URAEMIC SYNDROME

Ms Owens, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes:
 - (a) the devastating effects of atypical Haemolytic Uraemic Syndrome (HUS) and its long term impact on the lives of the sufferer, as well as their friends and family;
 - (b) that atypical HUS is a genetic disease of excessive immune dysfunction that affects people of all ages, with symptoms including heart failure, pulmonary edema, clotting in the lungs, blurred vision and kidney failure; and
 - (c) that the current treatment regimen of plasma exchange and/or dialysis has significant risks and can result in a further reduction in the quality of life for the patient;
- (2) acknowledges the community advocacy work that has brought this condition to the attention of the House, such as the work by Ms Jeanette Daher who seeks a listing of the drug under the Government's Life Saving Drugs Program;
- (3) notes that the Pharmaceutical Benefits Advisory Committee (PBAC) is due to make a recommendation on the use of the drug Soliris (Eculizumab), which has shown to put the disease into remission; and
- (4) urges the Minister for Health to carefully consider any favourable recommendation of the PBAC as a matter of urgency.

- (1) notes the increasing instances of Australian citizens taking up arms for foreign military and extremist causes including, but not limited to, the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant, representing a threat to good order in international affairs and the safety of Australian citizens;
- (2) acknowledges:
 - (a) that by taking up arms or supporting such causes, those citizens have failed to comply with the pledge they made when they became an Australian citizen, to uphold the laws of Australia; and
 - (b) those who have taken up arms or supported such causes, and were born Australian citizens but have a second citizenship, have also repudiated their allegiance to Australia; and
- (3) urges the Government to amend the *Australian Citizenship Act 2007* to allow the revocation of the status of citizen for those who take up arms, or provide material and/or financial support for military/extremist causes, except where such action is at the direction of the Government.

7 CYPRUS

Ms Vamvakinou, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) acknowledges that 20 July 2014 marks 40 years since Cyprus was divided;
- (2) recognises the continuing support of this parliament and successive Australian governments towards achieving a just and fair resolution for the Cyprus problem;
- (3) urges the Australian Government to aid the current peace process based on relevant United Nations resolutions, including United Nations Security Council resolutions 2135 (2014) of 30 January 2014 and 1251 (1999) of 29 June 1999 and subsequent resolutions, on respecting the sovereignty, independence and territorial integrity of Cyprus;
- (4) notes that any solution to the Cyprus conflict should result in the demilitarisation and reunification of the island for the benefit and welfare of its entire people and peace in the region; and
- (5) recognises and reaffirms 50 years of continuing service by the Australian Federal Police in the United Nations peacekeeping mission in Cyprus.

House of Representatives statement of reasons for disagreement with certain proposed amendments

Senate Amendments (1) and (2)

The amendments passed by the Senate changes the name of the Bill to *the Encouraging Privatisation (Asset Recycling Fund) Bill 2014*.

The Government does not support amending the Bill title or the name of the Asset Recycling Fund. The proposed changes do not reflect the Bill's objective. Privatisation is only a means to an end where it is appropriate. Privatisation is not the primary objective of the Bill or the initiatives it support. The Government is keen for States to release capital from assets better managed by the private sector. It wants to encourage the States to use the proceeds of sales to build green field infrastructure.

Accordingly, the House of Representatives does not accept these amendments.

Senate Amendments (5), (6), (12), (13), (15), (33), (34) and (36)

The amendments passed by the Senate would give effect to removal of provisions to transfer of \$3.5 billion from the Education Investment Fund to the Asset Recycling Fund.

Without the proposed transfer from the Education Investment Fund to the Asset Recycling Fund the Asset Recycling Fund will not be viable for the purposes for which it is to be established.

Accordingly, the House of Representatives does not accept these amendments.

Senate Amendments (16) and (37)

The negation of the amendments moved in the Senate has the effect of removing clauses that allow for the transfer of \$3.5 billion from the Education Investment Fund to the Asset Recycling Fund.

The position adopted by the Senate prevents the transfer of necessary assets from the Education Investment Fund, without which the Asset Recycling Fund will not be viable for the purposes for which it is to be established.

Accordingly, the House of Representatives does not accept these amendments.

Senate Amendments (19), (23), (27) and (31)

The amendments passed by the Senate require cost benefit analysis and evaluations performed by Infrastructure Australia to be tabled in Parliament and made available to the public.

The amendments add red tape with no additional benefit, The Coalition has already committed to Infrastructure Australia undertaking an assessment of cost-benefit analysis for our major investment decisions that receive Commonwealth funding of over \$100 million. State Governments will undertake their own cost-benefit assessments as part of decision-making processes to privatise assets and reinvest in new infrastructure. These are rightly matters for the States. It makes no sense to duplicate cost-benefit processes.

They risk delaying the delivery of critical infrastructure that will enhance the long-term productive capacity of the economy. The amendments would introduce duplicative and disruptive parliamentary processes that stand in the way of delivering the benefits being sought.

Accordingly, the House of Representatives does not accept these amendments.

Senate Amendment (20)

The amendment passed by the Senate supports the requirement that only the Infrastructure Minister may make a recommendation for the Asset Recycling Special Account to be debited for the purposes of making a grant of financial assistance to a State or Territory.

The amendment removes flexibility for a minister other than the Infrastructure Minister to recommend that a grant be made to a State or Territory under a National Partnership Agreement. The amendment fails to recognise that the nature of infrastructure being considered for support from the Asset Recycling Fund will not always be within the portfolio responsibilities of the Infrastructure Minister (for example, telecommunications infrastructure). In such cases, it is entirely appropriate the responsible minister makes the assessment and recommendation.

Accordingly, the House of Representatives does not accept this amendment.

Senate Amendments (21) and (28)

The amendments passed by the Senate require the Government to table a disallowable legislative instrument for each and every grant of financial assistance to be provided to States and Territories under the National Partnership Agreement on Asset Recycling.

The amendments would create a disruptive and unnecessary process that would mean the States would have no confidence that the Commonwealth would make payments in accordance with already signed National Partnership Agreements. The proposal to use disallowance mechanisms against payments to the States would block or delay funding from the Asset Recycling Fund for critical infrastructure.

The Government is confident that the current Bill has robust accountability and governance arrangements.

Accordingly, the House of Representatives does not accept these amendments.

Senate Amendment (32)

The amendment passed by the Senate prevents incentives being provided for reinvestments funded by the sale of infrastructure and services.

The decision of what assets to sell to fund new infrastructure is entirely a matter for the States. State and Territory Governments are best placed to decide which infrastructure and services are most efficiently provided by the private sector. The Australian Government does not wish to dictate this, or believe it is in a position to do so.

Accordingly, the House of Representatives does not accept this amendment.

On the motion of Mr Ciobo, the reasons were adopted.

- (5) note that the Australian government has committed to work with the international community in accordance with United Nations Security Council resolution 2166 to ensure a full, thorough and independent international investigation into the crash, to identify the cause of the crash and those responsible; and
- (6) support the Australian government's cooperation with other countries in bringing the perpetrators of this barbaric crime to justice.

6 MINORITIES IN IRAQ

- (2) re-affirms the rights of the Christian and other minorities of Iraq to live in peace and freedom and calls for all steps to be taken to ensure that all members of the affected communities can live in freedom in Iraq;
- (3) calls on the Australian Government and the international community to provide humanitarian, financial and other forms of appropriate assistance to support those Christian and other minorities who have been internally displaced within Iraq;
- (4) notes the aspirations of the Assyrian and Chaldean people for the establishment of an autonomous region in the Ninevah plains and welcomes the in-principle agreement of the Iraqi Government to this request earlier this year; and
- (5) calls on the Australian Government through its seat on the United Nations Security Council and the international community to take appropriate steps to protect the rights of minorities in Iraq, including the Assyrian and Chaldean Christian people.

7 VIETNAM VETERANS AWARDS

Mr Pitt, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that:
 - (a) Vietnam Veterans Day is held on 18 August each year to commemorate the iconic Battle of Long Tan in 1966;
 - (b) on that day, 108 Australian and New Zealand soldiers in Delta Company, 6 RAR fought for hours in torrential rain to fend off a regimental assault on the Australian base by approximately 2000 regular Viet Cong and North Vietnamese Army troops;
 - (c) 18 Australians were killed and 24 were wounded, and approximately 500 enemy soldiers were killed;
 - (d) despite their victory, our veterans were treated appallingly upon their return to Australia; and

- (e) the number and degree of awards presented to Australian soldiers following the Battle of Long Tan is today widely regarded as ‘being little short of insulting in view of the heroism displayed’; and
- (2) recognises:
 - (a) the tireless efforts of retired Lieutenant Colonel Harry Smith, over almost half a century, to seek recognition for his soldiers;
 - (b) that Delta Company was awarded a Unit Citation for Gallantry in late 2009, however, two officers and ten other ranks still have not received the individual awards that were recommended in 1966, despite several reviews and inquiries naming the men; and
 - (c) that the Delta Company Commander and four Platoon Commanders, who recommended the awards in 1966, have provided supporting material to the Defence Honours and Awards Appeals Tribunal, and Part 2 of the Valour Inquiry is currently underway.

3 AUSTRALIAN RED CROSS CENTENARY

Ms Plibersek, pursuant to notice, moved—That the House:

- (1) notes that:
 - (a) 2014 is the Centenary year of Red Cross in Australia, a significant milestone in the social history of the nation and commemorating 100 years of humanitarian service to the people of Australia;
 - (b) most Australians have shared a personal connection with Red Cross, from its humanitarian role during two world wars, to preparing, responding to and recovering from natural disasters, or helping vulnerable people and communities overcome disadvantage, and through its world-class national blood service;
 - (c) for 100 years the Australian Red Cross has enjoyed a unique auxiliary status to the public authorities in the humanitarian field, working in partnership with governments of all political persuasions, in Australia and internationally, to alleviate suffering in a voluntary aid capacity whilst adhering to its principles of independence, neutrality and impartiality; and
 - (d) Australian Red Cross is part of the world's largest humanitarian movement, with tens of millions of volunteers working in 189 countries, united by the fundamental principle of preventing and alleviating human suffering, without discrimination, wherever it may be found in times of war, conflict, disaster or personal crisis;
- (2) recognises that:
 - (a) today the Australian Red Cross has a network of over one million volunteers, members, staff, donors, aid workers and supporters; and
 - (b) through this network, the Australian Red Cross mobilises the power of humanity to work right across the country in local communities in every state and territory, and further afield, to help transform the lives of vulnerable people in need, whoever they are; and
- (3) calls on all honourable members to:
 - (a) join the Australian Red Cross in celebrating the 100th anniversary of its founding on 13 August 1914, nine days after the outbreak of World War I;
 - (b) congratulate generations of Australians for their extraordinary contributions through the everyday work of Red Cross; and

- (c) continue to support the independent, neutral and impartial humanitarian mission of Red Cross to work with and assist the most vulnerable people in need, both in Australia and internationally.

- (1) recognises that the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) was established in 2012 after external inquiries in 1995, 2001, 2010, Parliamentary committee reviews, issues and discussion papers, exposure drafts and consultations with experts, and is operating efficiently and effectively, helping charities, donors and taxpayers;
- (2) acknowledges that:
 - (a) the vast majority of submissions to the Senate Economics Legislation Committee's inquiry into the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (Repeal) (No. 1) Bill 2014 speak positively of the ACNC's work and urge the Government to retain the charities commission as a one-stop shop;
 - (b) the evidence to this inquiry provided by eminent Australian, Mr Robert Fitzgerald AM, strongly supports the retention of the ACNC;
 - (c) in a survey, four out of five charities support keeping the ACNC, while only 6 per cent like the Government's idea of returning the regulation of charities to the Australian Taxation Office;
 - (d) in an open letter, more than 40 charities, including Lifeline, Justice Connect, ACOSS, Social Ventures Australia, Save the Children, St John Ambulance Australia, Community Colleges Australia, Sane Australia, the Sidney Myer Fund, the Myer Foundation, Danks Trust, the RSPCA, Youth Off the Streets, the Ted Noffs Foundation, Music Viva Australia, Wesley Mission Victoria, the RSPCA Australia, World Vision, the Australian Conservation Foundation, Odyssey House, the McGrath Foundation, the Australian Council for International Development, Changemakers Australia, Volunteering Australia, YWCA Australia, the Foundation for Alcohol Research and Education, the Consumer Health Forum of Australia, Hillsong Church, Churches of Christ Victoria and Tasmania and Wesley Mission Australia, called on the Government to keep the ACNC; and
 - (e) the Australian Capital Territory and South Australian governments are already working to reduce the paperwork burden on charities and not-for-profits by cooperating with the ACNC to reduce duplication in reporting;

- (3) notes that some of those whom the Minister for Social Services claims to have consulted with have written to the Government to make clear that they have never been consulted on the ACNC repeal; and
- (4) calls on the Government to drop its ill-considered and unpopular plan to axe the ACNC.

- (a) Australia's flag was the first in the world to be chosen in an open public competition, and this flag design competition brought forth the pride of a newly formed nation by attracting entries from 1 per cent of our population at that time;
 - (b) on 3 September 1901, Lady Hopetoun, wife of the first Governor-General of the new Commonwealth of Australia, formally opened the Commonwealth Flag and Seal Exhibition and announced the names of the successful competitors;
 - (c) the winning design was a Blue Ensign including the Union Jack, along with a Southern Cross and a six pointed star;
 - (d) this latter star (the 'Commonwealth Star') was changed to the seven pointed star we are familiar with today in 1908, to signify the Territory of Papua and future Territories; and
 - (e) the new flag represents a design by the people, for the people, and since it was first flown in 1901, has become an icon of our shared identity.

 - (b) that a number of discriminatory acts followed, chief among these being the forced repatriation of Pacific Island labourers back to their place of origin in 1906, in many cases against the will of those being repatriated;
- (3) acknowledges the considerable economic contribution of Australians of South Sea Islander descent to the establishment of the sugar industry in the state of Queensland, and other agricultural and industrial development in the north;
- (4) celebrates the contributions of so many Australians of South Sea Islander descent to Australian life in every field of endeavour, from the football field to the political sphere; and
- (5) calls for consideration of measures to ensure that Australians of South Sea Islander descent can achieve equity and assistance in this present day through:
 - (a) inclusion on the national census as a separate people group, by the simple addition of an extra question;
 - (b) access to diabetes treatment in the same way this is available to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders; and
 - (c) access to assistance in all areas of disadvantage such as health, housing, education and training.

Ms Rishworth, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (2) recognises the important work done in ensuring that students are supported to make the transition through:
 - (a) the Youth Connections program that has a proven track record in helping young people who have not completed or are at risk of not completing year 12, transition back into school or further education, training and employment;
 - (b) the School Business Community Partnership Brokers program which builds partnerships between schools and the wider community including business and charities that help young people achieve year 12 or equivalent qualifications; and
 - (c) National Career Development Strategy services that support vital links between industry, students and training options;
- (3) is extremely concerned that there is no funding in the budget for these programs past 1 January 2015; and
- (4) calls on the Government to immediately reverse its decision to no longer fund these programs past the 2014 calendar year.

Debate ensued.

5 HUMANITARIAN AID IN IRAQ

Mr Hawke, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) welcomes the Australian Government's commitment to contributing to humanitarian aid in Iraq, including through airdrops;
- (2) commends the Prime Minister, the Minister for Foreign Affairs and the Minister for Immigration and Border Protection for:
 - (a) their commitment to working with our allies towards a solution, including having reaffirmed the strong state of our bilateral defence and security co-operation with the United States;
 - (b) strengthening our national security by providing a further \$630 million over four years to boost the counter terrorism capacity of our security and intelligence organisations;
 - (c) their commitment to prosecuting those Australians who engage in terrorism-related activities and to strengthening our ability to monitor, arrest, and prosecute people who have been involved with terrorist groups abroad; and
 - (d) setting aside a minimum of 4,400 resettlement places in the 2014-15 Refugee and Humanitarian Program for ethnic and religious minorities fleeing the humanitarian crises in Iraq and Syria;
- (3) recognises that:
 - (a) Christian Assyrians, Chaldeans, Yazidis, and Mandaeans are minority religious and racial groups in Iraq, and are subject to ongoing violence, intimidation, harassment and discrimination on religious and ethnic grounds;
 - (b) hundreds of thousands of Christian Assyrians, Chaldeans, Yazidis, and Mandaeans have been forced to flee their homes in northern Iraq; and
 - (c) a growing number of Australians are travelling to Iraq and Syria and other conflict zones where their aim is to do harm and bring back deadly skills to Australia, and the threat from these extremists is real and growing;
- (4) condemns the violent and barbaric killing, intimidation, harassment and discrimination of Christian Assyrians, Chaldeans, Yazidis, and Mandaeans in Iraq at the hands of the terrorist organisation, Islamic State (also known as ISIS); and
- (5) calls upon the Australian Government to:
 - (a) continue to focus on the humanitarian aid mission; and
 - (b) work closely with our allies to ensure that more people are not exposed to the brutal zealotry of the Islamic State.

Debate ensued.

7 MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE—JOINT SELECT COMMITTEE ON THE AUSTRALIA FUND ESTABLISHMENT

Message No. 171, 4 September 2014, from the Senate was reported informing the House that the Senate had agreed to the following resolution:

- (1) That a joint select committee, to be known as the Joint Select Committee on the Australia Fund Establishment, be established to inquire into and report on:

The establishment of a fund to support rural and manufacturing industries, with particular reference to:

 - (a) the need for a fund to assist rural and manufacturing industries in crisis and support communities affected by natural disasters, including the following assistance:
 - (i) emergency or ongoing financial relief;
 - (ii) a loan to such a business;
 - (iii) act as a guarantor for all or part of a loan or proposed loan to such a business;
 - (iv) purchase all or part of an existing loan to such a business;
 - (v) capitalise or waive interest owed by such a business;
 - (vi) assume control of such a business for a particular period;
 - (vii) grant funds to an appropriate industry body; and
 - (viii) grant funds to such a business for the purpose of purchasing new technology to make it more economically viable and competitive or restructuring it; and
 - (b) whether:
 - (i) existing bankruptcy and insolvency laws should be modified or temporarily relaxed for businesses in times of crisis; and
 - (ii) any foreign bankruptcy or insolvency laws should be adopted as laws of the Commonwealth;
- (2) That the committee deliver its final report on or before 30 June 2015;
- (3) That the committee consist of 10 members, 3 members of the House of Representatives to be nominated by the Government Whip or Whips, 2 members of the House of Representatives to be nominated by the Opposition Whip or Whips, 1 member of the House of Representatives to be nominated by any minority group or independent member, 2 senators to be nominated by the Leader of the Government in the Senate, 1 senator to be nominated by the Leader of the Opposition in the Senate, and 1 senator to be nominated by any minority group or independent Senator;
- (4) That:
 - (a) participating members may be appointed to the committee on the nomination of the Leader of the Government, the Leader of the Opposition in the Senate, or any minority group or independent senator;
 - (b) participating members shall be taken to be a member of the committee for the purposes of forming a quorum if a majority of members of the committee are not present; and
 - (c) participating members may participate in hearings of evidence and deliberations of the committee and have all rights of a committee member, but may not vote on any questions before the committee;
- (5) That every nomination of a member of the committee be notified in writing to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- (6) That the committee may proceed to the dispatch of business notwithstanding that not all members have not been duly nominated and appointed and notwithstanding any vacancy;

- (7) That the members of the committee hold office as a joint select committee until presentation of the committee's final report or until the House of Representatives is dissolved or expires by effluxion of time, whichever is the earlier;
- (8) That the committee elect a Government member as its chair;
- (9) That the committee elect a non-Government member as its deputy chair who shall act as chair of the committee at any time when the chair is not present at a meeting of the committee;
- (10) That at any time when the chair and deputy chair are not present at a meeting of the committee the members shall elect another member to act as chair at that meeting;
- (11) That, in the event of an equally divided vote, the chair, or the deputy chair when acting as chair, have a casting vote;
- (12) That 5 members of the committee constitute a quorum of the committee provided that in a deliberative meeting the quorum shall include 1 Government member of either House and 1 non-Government member of either House;
- (13) That the committee have power to appoint subcommittees consisting of 3 or more of its members, and that each subcommittee shall have at least 1 Government member of either House and one non-Government member of either House;
- (14) That the committee have power to refer to any subcommittee any matter which the committee is empowered to examine;
- (15) That the committee appoint the chair of each subcommittee who shall have a casting vote only, and at any time when the chair of a subcommittee is not present at a meeting of the subcommittee, the members of the subcommittee present shall elect another member of that subcommittee to act as chair at that meeting;
- (16) That 2 members of a subcommittee constitute a quorum of that subcommittee, provided that in a deliberative meeting the quorum shall include 1 Government member of either House and 1 non-Government member of either House;
- (17) That members of the committee who are not members of a subcommittee may participate in the proceedings of that subcommittee but shall not vote, move any motion or be counted for the purpose of a quorum;
- (18) That the committee or any subcommittee have power to call for witnesses to attend and for documents to be produced;
- (19) That the committee or any subcommittee may conduct proceedings at any place it sees fit and sit in public or in private;
- (20) That the committee or any subcommittee have power to adjourn from time to time and to sit during any adjournment of the Senate and the House of Representatives;
- (21) That the committee may report from time to time;
- (22) That the committee be provided with all necessary staff, facilities and resources and be empowered to appoint persons with specialist knowledge for the purposes of the committee with the approval of the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- (23) That the committee be empowered to publish from day to day such documents and evidence as may be ordered by it, and a daily Hansard be published of such proceedings as take place in public; and
- (24) That the provisions of this resolution, so far as they are inconsistent with the standing orders, have effect notwithstanding anything contained in the standing orders.

The Senate requests the concurrence of the House in this resolution.

8 MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE—JOINT SELECT COMMITTEE ON TRADE AND INVESTMENT GROWTH

 - (i) House of Representatives, of the Government or Opposition Whip or Whips, or any minority group or independent member; and
 - (ii) Senate, of the Leader of the Government or Opposition, or any minority group or independent senator;
 - (b) participating members shall be taken to be a member of the committee for the purposes of forming a quorum if a majority of members of the committee are not present; and
 - (c) participating members may participate in hearings of evidence and deliberations of the committee and have all rights of a committee member except that a participating member may not vote on any questions before the committee;
- (5) That every nomination of a member of the committee be notified in writing to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- (6) That the members of the committee hold office as a joint select committee until presentation of the committee's final report or until the House of Representatives is dissolved or expires by effluxion of time, whichever is the earlier;
- (7) That the committee elect a Government member as its chair;

4 SUPERANNUATION

Ms T. M. Butler, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

(1) notes that:

- (a) in the document 'Our Plan', the Liberals and Nationals promised Australians, prior to the election that: 'We will deliver greater stability and certainty on superannuation—we won't move the goalposts. ... We will ensure that no more negative unexpected changes occur to the superannuation system so that those planning for their retirement can face the future with a higher degree of predictability';
- (b) the Government has subsequently revealed, in breach of that promise, that there will be a freeze on superannuation guarantee increases until at least July 2025;
- (c) the Prime Minister has said of the changes that: 'By delaying the increase in the superannuation guarantee levy we are keeping more money in workers' pockets';
- (d) between 7 September 2013 and 2 September 2014, the Fair Work Commission received thousands of applications for approval of enterprise agreements; and
- (e) enterprise agreements' nominal expiry dates can be up to four years after the enterprise agreement is approved;

(2) recognises that:

- (a) parties negotiate the terms of enterprise agreements, including terms providing for pay increases, having regard to, among other things, the superannuation guarantee rate;
- (b) the parties who negotiated enterprise agreements for which applications for approval were made between 7 September 2013 and 2 September 2014 would have done so on the basis that the superannuation guarantee rate would increase during the life of the agreement;
- (c) employees to whom such enterprise agreements apply are generally covered by 'no further claims' provisions, so they are not at liberty to negotiate for greater pay increases; and

- (d) accordingly, any money that is not going into their superannuation fund will also not be going into their pockets, despite the Prime Minister's claim; and
- (3) accordingly, calls on the Government to:
 - (a) concede workers, whose enterprise agreements were negotiated between the election and 2 September 2014, have lost 'money in their pocket' because the negotiations were conducted on the basis there would be 'no negative change to superannuation'; and
 - (b) enable those workers to renegotiate pay increases, to compensate for the unexpected freeze on superannuation.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

7 COMMONWEALTH FUNDING TO QUEENSLAND

Mrs Prentice, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) recognises that:
 - (a) over the next four years, total annual Commonwealth funding to Queensland is increasing by around \$5.8 billion (including GST);
 - (b) despite the tight budget conditions, the Commonwealth is increasing annual funding for Queensland hospitals by 40 per cent, and schools by 47 per cent, over the next four years; and
 - (c) this represents a combined increase in funding to Queensland schools and hospitals of over 40 per cent by 2017-18, on 2013-14 funding levels;
- (2) commends the Government for investing \$13.4 billion to build the infrastructure of the 21st century for Queensland, including:
 - (a) \$6.7 billion towards fixing the Bruce Highway; and
 - (b) almost:
 - (i) \$1.3 billion towards the Toowoomba Second Range Crossing; and
 - (ii) \$1 billion towards the upgrade of the Gateway Motorway North; and
- (3) notes that the Queensland Government estimated the impact of the carbon tax to be \$148 million in its 2013-14 state budget and its repeal will help support jobs and investment.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

8 EBOLA

Ms King, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) expresses grave concern about the outbreak of the Ebola virus in, and its impact on, West Africa, in particular Liberia, Guinea, Sierra Leone, and beyond;

- (2) recognises that the peacebuilding and development gains of the most affected countries concerned could be reversed in light of the Ebola outbreak, underlining that the outbreak is undermining the stability of the most affected countries concerned and, unless contained, may lead to further instances of civil unrest, social tensions and a deterioration of the political and security climate;
- (3) determines that the unprecedented extent of the Ebola outbreak in Africa constitutes a threat to international peace and security;
- (4) expresses concern about the particular impact of the Ebola outbreak on women;
- (5) takes note of the:
 - (a) measures taken by United Nations Member States of the region, especially Liberia, Guinea and Sierra Leone, as well as Nigeria, Côte d'Ivoire and Senegal, in response to the Ebola outbreak, and recognises that the outbreak may exceed the capacity of the governments concerned to respond; and
 - (b) letter dated 29 August 2014 to the United Nations Secretary-General from the presidents of Liberia, Sierra Leone and Guinea, requesting a comprehensive response to the Ebola outbreak, including a coordinated international response to end the outbreak and to support the societies and economies affected by restrictions on trade and transportation during the outbreak;
- (6) emphasises the:
 - (a) key role of United Nations Member States, including through the Global Health Security Agenda where applicable, to provide adequate public health services to detect, prevent, respond to and mitigate outbreaks of major infectious diseases through sustainable, well-functioning and responsive public health mechanisms; and
 - (b) control of outbreaks of major infectious diseases requires urgent action and greater national, regional and international collaboration, stressing the crucial and immediate need for a coordinated international response to the Ebola outbreak;
- (7) expresses:
 - (a) deep appreciation to the first-line responders to the Ebola outbreak in West Africa, including national and international health and humanitarian relief workers contributed by the Member States of diverse regions and non-governmental organisations such as Médecins Sans Frontières and the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies; and
 - (b) appreciation of the United Nations Humanitarian Air Service for transporting humanitarian personnel and medical supplies and equipment, especially to remote locations in Guinea, Liberia and Sierra Leone, during the outbreak;
- (8) takes note of the:
 - (a) WHO Ebola Response Roadmap of 28 August 2014 that aims to stop transmission of the Ebola virus disease worldwide, while managing the consequences of any further international spread; and
 - (b) 12 Mission Critical Actions, including infection control, community mobilisation and recovery, to resolve the Ebola outbreak; and
- (9) notes the United Nations call that Member States:
 - (a) facilitate the delivery of assistance, including qualified, specialised and trained personnel to contain the outbreak to the affected countries and, expresses deep appreciation to the Government of Ghana for allowing the resumption of the air shuttle of United Nations Mission in Liberia from Monrovia to Accra, which will transport international health workers and other responders to areas affected by the Ebola outbreak in Liberia;
 - (b) provide urgent resources and assistance, including deployable medical capabilities such as field hospitals with qualified and sufficient expertise, staff and supplies, laboratory services, logistical, transport and construction support capabilities, airlift and other aviation support and aeromedical services and dedicated clinical services in Ebola treatment units and isolation units, to support the affected countries in intensifying preventive and response activities and strengthening national capacities in response to the Ebola outbreak, and to allot adequate capacity to prevent future outbreaks;

- (c) mobilise and provide immediate technical expertise and additional medical capacity, including for rapid diagnosis and training of health workers at the national and international level, to the affected countries, and those providing assistance to the affected countries and to continue to exchange expertise, lessons learned and best practices;
- (d) maximise synergies to respond effectively and immediately to the Ebola outbreak, provide essential resources, supplies and coordinated assistance to the affected countries and implementing partners, and encourage all relevant actors to cooperate closely with the Secretary-General on response assistance efforts; and
- (e) commend the continued contribution and commitment of international health and humanitarian relief workers to respond urgently to the Ebola outbreak and seek all relevant actors to put in place the necessary repatriation and financial arrangements, including medical evacuation capacities and treatment and transport provisions, to facilitate their immediate and unhindered deployment to the affected countries.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for private Members' business having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

Yesterday, the Manager of Opposition Business raised with me, as a potential matter of privilege, whether the Hansard record of an answer provided by the Minister for Agriculture, last week on 20 October, had been changed in a way that amounted to ‘misconduct’. The Manager of Opposition Business asked whether such changes might relate to “deliberately misleading the House, conspiracy to deceive, falsified documents or disobedience to the rule or orders of the House”.

For this to be considered it is necessary for there to be evidence of a prima facie case that the alleged misconduct is conduct which, and I quote section 4 of the *Parliamentary Privileges Act 1987*, “amounts, or is intended or likely to amount, to an improper interference with the free exercise by a House or committee of its authority or functions, or with the free performance by a member of the member’s duties as a member”.

I note that the Minister for Agriculture attended in the House shortly after the matter was raised with me, and explained to the House the circumstances around the changes made to the Hansard record of his answer in the House including that he had counselled his staff about their actions and requested the Hansard record to be corrected. Given the Minister’s explanation I have not reviewed the tapes. In light of the Minister’s explanation, it does not appear that a prima facie case as intimated above has been made out and I consider that the matter is now closed.

AMENDING ACTS 1970 TO 1979 REPEAL BILL 2014
STATUTE LAW REVISION BILL (NO. 2) 2014**

In accordance with the resolution agreed to earlier this sitting—

The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the bills be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr A. S. Burke who moved, as an amendment to the Omnibus Repeal Day (Spring 2014) Bill 2014—That all the words after “That” be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: “whilst not declining to give the bill a second reading the House notes that:

- (1) repealing spent and redundant acts and regulations is part of the ordinary, routine function of any government and the former Labor Government repealed 16,794 acts and regulations during its time in office;
- (2) the former Labor Government had a strong record of deregulation reform which significantly improved the competitiveness and productivity of the Australian economy and, in particular, the former Labor Government through its Seamless National Economy reforms was delivering significant cost savings to businesses – just 17 of these reforms were estimated to lower business costs by \$4 billion per year with the full reforms to increase Australia’s productivity and deliver a \$6 billion boost to GDP per year;
- (3) the three bills being debated together provide claimed deregulatory savings of \$1,855,000, or just 0.1 per cent of the figure claimed by the Government, with a vast majority of the changes in this bill having no impact in terms of costs or regulatory burden on businesses, individuals and the community sector in Australia; and
- (4) the commitment to deregulation should not be used as a cover for threatening fairness, workplace safety, or the protections of our environment.”

 - (b) East West Link will never happen under a Labor Government—state Labor opposes the project despite estimates that the cost of Melbourne's road congestion will grow to \$5 billion per annum by 2021 and \$7.2 billion by 2031, more than double current levels; and
 - (c) Victorian Leader of the Opposition has described the East West Link as a 'grand hoax' and has threatened to rip up any contracts that are signed in respect of the project and in doing so, has shown contempt for the people of Victoria.

 - (a) provide an important service to Australia's agricultural sector; and
 - (b) act as a biological solution that assists in fly control and enhances livestock health;
- (2) the work of dung beetles acts to enhance and improve the nutrients in soil, leading to natural fertilisation and reducing nutrient runoff;
- (3) greater recognition by industry of the beetles' importance may lead to further widespread adoption;

- (4) investigation and research into the introduction of two new species of beetles from France and Spain may provide opportunities to expand the beneficial impacts of dung beetles by increased activity during the spring months, and this could bridge the existing activity gap prior to the activity of native beetles in the summer months; and
- (5) agricultural research and development organisations could provide important support in researching the benefits and quarantine implications associated with importing these two new species.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

6 EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

Ms Ellis, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes the:
 - (a) importance of quality early childhood education in preparing children for school, and the overwhelming evidence of the positive impact that access to kindergarten and preschool has on life outcomes; and
 - (b) growing evidence of the enormous social and economic returns that are generated by investment in quality early childhood education;
- (2) recognises the progress that has been made in increasing access to kindergarten and preschool since the National Partnership Agreement on Early Childhood Education was introduced in 2008, including:
 - (a) an increase in the proportion of Australian children who attend 15 hours of quality early childhood education in the year before school from just 12 per cent in 2008, to over 56 per cent in 2012; and
 - (b) evidence that Australian children who access quality early education for 15 hours a week go on to score significantly better in Year Three NAPLAN tests and achieve higher results in Year Four reading, maths and science;
- (3) notes the uncertainty surrounding future funding for kindergarten and preschool and understands the impact this has on the sector, teachers, educators and parents balancing work and family; and
- (4) calls on the Government to provide certainty of funding for kindergartens and preschools, with the continued goal of ensuring every child receives 15 hours of quality early education a week in the year before school.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

7 GREAT BARRIER REEF MARINE PARK

Mr Entsch, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) acknowledges that Marine National Park (Green) Zones as defined in the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Zoning Plan 2003 serve to better protect the biodiversity within the Marine Park and help to ensure:
 - (a) the continued existence of the unique marine animals, plants and habitats that are found only in the Great Barrier Reef and provide additional protection for threatened species such as dugong and marine turtles;
 - (b) those industries that rely on the health of the Marine Park are able to continue, providing social and economic benefits to local communities and the wider economy;
 - (c) a diverse range of other benefits and values of the Marine Park, including recreational, cultural, educational and scientific values, are protected;
 - (d) that future generations are able to continue to use and enjoy the Marine Park;
 - (e) the Great Barrier Reef World Heritage values are protected; and

- (f) the ecologically sustainable use of marine resources by traditional owners consistent with their traditional practices, are provided for;
- (2) accepts that Marine National Park (Green) Zones can be beneficial in:
 - (a) protecting spawning areas and nursery grounds;
 - (b) minimising damage to important habitats;
 - (c) providing refuge for protected species, such as turtles and dugongs;
 - (d) boosting species numbers, which helps the food web as a whole;
 - (e) increasing the abundance of fish; and
 - (f) building the resilience of the reef against threats such as climate change and water pollution;
- (3) affirms the *Native Title Act 1993* which recognises the right of certain traditional owners to hunt and gather in their sea country and that native title holders may undertake traditional use of marine resources;
- (4) recognises that the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority is working with traditional owners for the protection of the Great Barrier Reef, by expanding the Traditional Use of the Marine Resources Agreement program and strengthening communications between local communities, managers and reef stakeholders;
- (5) acknowledges the value of the Ranger Program in providing job opportunities for Indigenous people to care for their country, take on important skills, develop career pathways, protect dugongs and turtles and manage environmental threats stemming from feral animals, among other benefits;
- (6) calls on the:
 - (a) Australian Labor Party and the Greens to pass the Environment Legislation Amendment Bill 2013 which will enable a tripling of penalties for those poaching turtles and/or dugongs; and
 - (b) relevant parties to work, as a priority, with traditional owners to progressively increase the protections afforded to threatened species, such as turtle and dugong, through traditional use marine resource agreements and other appropriate means, seeking to:
 - (i) where traditional rights under the *Native Title Act 1993* apply, seek agreement with traditional owners to prohibit the capture and killing of any species from designated Green Zones within the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park area;
 - (ii) continue to allow certain activities to take place with a permit, such as research and management programs for fauna and flora where they pose a threat to humans or the environment, as per existing regulations; and
 - (iii) introduce legislation to prohibit the taking of marine species, including seabirds, in designated Green Zones within the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Area, where other efforts have proven to be inadequate;
- (7) in the interest of supporting the policing of turtle and dugong product that is transported for commercial purposes, prohibit the movement of native species taken under the *Native Title Act 1993*, outside the area in which it is caught; and
- (8) recognises that these initiatives would complement a range of measures already being implemented under the Government's Turtle and Dugong Protection Plan and Community Management Plans, which will enhance the protection of marine turtles and dugongs in Far North Queensland and the Torres Strait.

3 CYCLONE TRACY AND DARWIN

Mrs Griggs, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) acknowledges that 24 December marks 40 years since Cyclone Tracy devastated Darwin, killing 71 people and destroying 70 per cent of buildings, including 80 per cent of residential homes, leaving homeless 41,000 of the 47,000 people living in Darwin;
- (2) recognises the enormous Commonwealth contribution in providing extensive resources to perform the rescue and evacuation of survivors and for the rebuild of Darwin, including:
 - (a) the Royal Australian Navy undertaking its largest peacetime relief operations with HMA Ships *Balikpapan*, *Betano*, *Brunei*, *Hobart*, *Melbourne*, *Stalwart*, *Stuart*, *Supply*, *Tarakan*, *Vendetta* and *Wewak* berthing in early January 1975 to join HMA Ships *Brisbane* and *Flinders*;
 - (b) naval personnel spending 17,979 man days ashore during January 1975, with up to 1,200 onshore at the peak of operations working to re-build Darwin; and
 - (c) the evacuation of approximately 30,000 of the 45,000 Darwin residents in the days after the disaster thanks to the Royal Australian Air Force and Qantas; and
- (3) notes that:
 - (a) the estimated damage to Darwin was \$837 million dollars in 1974 dollars;
 - (b) the resilience of Territorians is remarkable;
 - (c) Cyclone Tracy was a defining moment in the history of Darwin—a city that had already been rebuilt after the 1942 Japanese bombings and natural disasters in the years preceding World War II; and
 - (d) today Darwin is a thriving city and is looking forward to maximising future opportunities, particularly around Developing Northern Australia.

 - (c) his failure to listen to the Senate which voted against the Prime Minister's \$100,000 degree proposal only last night; and
- (3) calls on the Prime Minister to immediately bring the Higher Education and Research Reform Bill on for debate, if the Government is determined to introduce the bill, so that this Parliament can again comprehensively reject the Prime Minister's plans for \$100,000 degrees.

2 SUSPENSION OF STANDING AND SESSIONAL ORDERS—TIME AND ORDER OF BUSINESS

Mr Pyne (Leader of the House), by leave, moved—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent the order of business for today in the House and the Federation Chamber being as follows:

(1) In the House:

- (a) presentation of petitions and Private Members' Business as determined by the Selection Committee, to be interrupted at approximately 11 am;
- (b) the Prime Minister to move a motion relating to the Martin Place siege and the Leader of the Opposition to reply for an equal period of time;
- (c) at the adjournment of debate on the motion, Private Members' Business to be resumed and to continue until concluded;
- (d) the provisions of standing orders 55(b) and 133(a) in relation to deferred quorums and divisions to apply until the conclusion of Private Members' Business;
- (e) any divisions or quorums called for between 4.15 pm and 5.45 pm to be deferred until 5.45 pm; and
- (f) the order of business for the remainder of the sitting to be as provided for in the standing orders;

(2) In the Federation Chamber:

- (a) Members' three minute constituency statements;
- (b) the meeting to be suspended at approximately 11 am for the duration of the debate on the Prime Minister's motion in the House;
- (c) on resumption, Private Members' Business in the order determined by the Selection Committee, until 1.30 pm;
- (d) at 4 pm, 90 second statements and government business as provided for, until 5.45 pm;
- (e) at 5.45 pm, Private Members' Business to be resumed and to continue until concluded; and
- (f) the order of business for the remainder of the sitting to be as provided for in the standing orders; and

(3) Any variation to this arrangement to be made only by a motion moved by a Minister.

Question—put and passed.

3 PETITIONS—STANDING COMMITTEE—PRESENTATION OF A PETITION AND MINISTERS' RESPONSES—STATEMENT BY MEMBER

Dr Jensen (Chair) presented a petition and Ministers' responses to petitions previously presented to the House.

Dr Jensen made a statement in connection with petitions.

4 CHINA-AUSTRALIA FREE TRADE AGREEMENT

Ms F. M. Scott, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that:
 - (a) the University of Western Sydney (UWS) and the Beijing University of Chinese Medicine (BUCM) signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) as part of the landmark China-Australia Free Trade Agreement, and the forged relationship will provide:
 - (i) broader and improved healthcare options as a result of the clinical and research trials conducted by the UWS's National Institute of Complementary Medicine and the BUCM to validate and translate Chinese medicines into an integrated healthcare setting;
 - (ii) the international framework for Australia to become the leading western accreditor of the \$170 billion dollar global traditional Chinese medicine market; and
 - (iii) formalised connections with the internationally regarded researchers at the BUCM which will further enhance the reputation of the UWS as a leading centre of research excellence that delivers practical social and economic outcomes for the residents of Western Sydney;
 - (b) the MOU between these two universities was among 14 commercial agreements signed between Australia and China, and will secure unprecedented levels of market access to the world's second largest economy, with a population of 1.36 billion and a rapidly growing middle class; and
 - (c) households and businesses will also reap the benefits of cheaper goods and components imported from China, placing downward pressure on the cost of living and the cost of doing business; and
- (2) commends the Government on its approach to securing a historic free trade agreement between Australia and China.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

5 SYRIAN REFUGEES

Ms Parke, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that:
 - (a) the Syrian conflict which began in March 2011 has:
 - (i) developed into one of the worst humanitarian disasters of our time; and
 - (ii) caused widespread damage to infrastructure across Syria, with basic necessities such as food, water and medical care difficult or impossible to access;
 - (b) serious human rights violations remain a common occurrence in Syria;
 - (c) it is estimated that more than 190,000 people have lost their lives in the Syrian conflict so far;
 - (d) in the three and a half years since the beginning of the Syrian conflict, more than 3.5 million refugees have fled their homes and crossed into neighbouring countries, while the United Nations estimates a further 6.5 million are displaced within Syria itself, representing an increase of 2 million in just six months;

- (e) hosting the Syrian refugees has put enormous pressure on the infrastructure, services, utilities and local populations of the host countries of Jordan, Lebanon and Turkey, with Syrian refugees in Lebanon now constituting approximately one-third of the population, and unemployment among poor Lebanese rising significantly;
 - (f) the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) has encouraged the international community to share the burden of supporting Syrian refugees, having a target for resettlement of 130,000 by the end of 2016, but has received a minimal response to date with less than 2 per cent of the registered refugee population having secured a resettlement place;
 - (g) while the regional response to the crisis should be commended, the global response has been relatively weak;
 - (h) the United Nations issued its largest appeal in relation to a single crisis in December 2013, stating that \$6.5 billion was vital to adequately support Syrians inside and outside of the conflict-ravaged nation, but to date the appeal has only raised 62 per cent of that target; and
 - (i) in December 2014 the United Nations World Food Programme announced that it was suspending its food aid program for Syrian refugees for lack of funding, leaving 1.7 million refugees to go hungry during winter, and has called for US\$64 million in immediate assistance to allow the recommencement of this essential aid; and
- (2) calls on the Australian Government to:
- (a) reconsider the level of Australia's existing humanitarian support and funding to assist those affected by the Syrian crisis with a view to making a significantly larger contribution;
 - (b) offer direct support to neighbouring countries, including through funding and arrangements to receive additional refugees in Australia by expanding the existing quota of asylum seekers and focusing resettlement on those Syrian refugees recommended by the UNHCR on the basis of vulnerability; and
 - (c) take an active role in all relevant multilateral fora in calling for a more substantial and better coordinated global response, including a 'fair share' approach to the resettlement of refugees.

Debate ensued.

Mr Thistlethwaite addressing the House—

In accordance with the resolution agreed to this sitting, the debate was adjourned, Mr Thistlethwaite was granted leave to continue his speech when the debate is resumed, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

6 MARTIN PLACE SIEGE

Mr Abbott (Prime Minister) referred to the Martin Place siege, and moved—That this House:

- (1) recognise the tragic events around the siege of the Lindt Cafe in Martin Place, Sydney on 15 and 16 December, 2014;
- (2) extend its deepest and heartfelt sympathies to the family and friends of Katrina Dawson and Tori Johnson for their loss;
- (3) honour the courage and fortitude shown by those held in the Lindt Cafe;
- (4) acknowledge the response of the law enforcement and security agencies and emergency services personnel to a difficult and dangerous situation;
- (5) recognise the calm and steadfast response of the people of Sydney, as well as the wholehearted support of the Australian people for the people held inside the Lindt Cafe and their families both during and after the siege;
- (6) thank the leaders and people of other nations who stood with Australia during this testing time;
- (7) note with sadness that other countries have recently suffered at the hands of terrorists, including France, Canada, Iraq, Egypt, Nigeria, Japan and Jordan;
- (8) declare our deep repugnance of terrorism in all forms; and
- (9) affirm the unity and resolve of this Parliament to protect our citizens and our democratic freedoms.

Mr Shorten (Leader of the Opposition) having seconded the motion and Ms Plibersek having addressed the House in support thereof—

Debate adjourned (Mr Pyne—Leader of the House), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- (2) commends the recent joint announcement by the Minister for Health and Assistant Minister for Health to undertake a review of medicines and medical devices regulations;

MONDAY, 9 FEBRUARY 2015

1 The Federation Chamber met at 10.29 am.

2 MEMBERS' CONSTITUENCY STATEMENTS

Members' constituency statements were made.

Suspension of meeting

At 10.57 am, in accordance with the resolution agreed to this sitting, the Deputy Speaker left the Chair.

Resumption of meeting

At 11.31 am, the Deputy Speaker resumed the Chair.

3 OVARIAN CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

Ms Hall, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that:
 - (a) February is Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month, which aims to raise awareness among Australian women of the symptoms of ovarian cancer; and
 - (b) each year 1,400 Australian women are diagnosed with ovarian cancer, and more than 1,000 will die from the disease—that is one woman every 8 hours;
- (2) notes with concern that the prognosis for women diagnosed with ovarian cancer is generally poor due to the advanced stage of most ovarian cancers at the time of diagnosis;
- (3) acknowledges that there is no screening program or detection test for ovarian cancer, and that the Pap smear will not detect the disease;
- (4) recognises that:
 - (a) ovarian cancer is not a silent disease and that all women experience symptoms, even in the early stages of the cancer; and
 - (b) the four most common symptoms are:
 - (i) abdominal or pelvic pain;
 - (ii) increased abdominal size or persistent abdominal bloating;
 - (iii) needing to urinate often or urgently; and
 - (iv) difficulty eating or feeling full quickly;
- (5) understands that every Australian woman needs to know the symptoms of ovarian cancer; and
- (6) notes the need for greater focus on education and additional research funding to help Australian scientists to find early detection markers and more effective treatments for this disease.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

4 GREAT BARRIER REEF MARINE PARK

The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the motion of Mr Entsch—
That this House:

- (1) acknowledges that Marine National Park (Green) Zones as defined in the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Zoning Plan 2003 serve to better protect the biodiversity within the Marine Park and help to ensure:
 - (a) the continued existence of the unique marine animals, plants and habitats that are found only in the Great Barrier Reef and provide additional protection for threatened species such as dugong and marine turtles;
 - (b) those industries that rely on the health of the Marine Park are able to continue, providing social and economic benefits to local communities and the wider economy;
 - (c) a diverse range of other benefits and values of the Marine Park, including recreational, cultural, educational and scientific values, are protected;
 - (d) that future generations are able to continue to use and enjoy the Marine Park;
 - (e) the Great Barrier Reef World Heritage values are protected; and
 - (f) the ecologically sustainable use of marine resources by traditional owners consistent with their traditional practices, are provided for;
- (2) accepts that Marine National Park (Green) Zones can be beneficial in:
 - (a) protecting spawning areas and nursery grounds;
 - (b) minimising damage to important habitats;
 - (c) providing refuge for protected species, such as turtles and dugongs;
 - (d) boosting species numbers, which helps the food web as a whole;
 - (e) increasing the abundance of fish; and
 - (f) building the resilience of the reef against threats such as climate change and water pollution;
- (3) affirms the *Native Title Act 1993* which recognises the right of certain traditional owners to hunt and gather in their sea country and that native title holders may undertake traditional use of marine resources;
- (4) recognises that the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority is working with traditional owners for the protection of the Great Barrier Reef, by expanding the Traditional Use of the Marine Resources Agreement program and strengthening communications between local communities, managers and reef stakeholders;
- (5) acknowledges the value of the Ranger Program in providing job opportunities for Indigenous people to care for their country, take on important skills, develop career pathways, protect dugongs and turtles and manage environmental threats stemming from feral animals, among other benefits;
- (6) calls on the:
 - (a) Australian Labor Party and the Greens to pass the Environment Legislation Amendment Bill 2013 which will enable a tripling of penalties for those poaching turtles and/or dugongs; and
 - (b) relevant parties to work, as a priority, with traditional owners to progressively increase the protections afforded to threatened species, such as turtle and dugong, through traditional use marine resource agreements and other appropriate means, seeking to:
 - (i) where traditional rights under the *Native Title Act 1993* apply, seek agreement with traditional owners to prohibit the capture and killing of any species from designated Green Zones within the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park area;
 - (ii) continue to allow certain activities to take place with a permit, such as research and management programs for fauna and flora where they pose a threat to humans or the environment, as per existing regulations; and

- (iii) introduce legislation to prohibit the taking of marine species, including seabirds, in designated Green Zones within the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Area, where other efforts have proven to be inadequate;
- (7) in the interest of supporting the policing of turtle and dugong product that is transported for commercial purposes, prohibit the movement of native species, taken under the *Native Title Act 1993* outside the area in which it is caught; and
- (8) recognises that these initiatives would complement a range of measures already being implemented under the Government's Turtle and Dugong Protection Plan and Community Management Plans, which will enhance the protection of marine turtles and dugongs in Far North Queensland and the Torres Strait.

Debate resumed.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

5 RECLINK NATIONAL PROGRAM FUNDING

Mr Danby, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes:
 - (a) that the Reclink National Program (RNP) has delivered over 100,000 participation opportunities to thousands of people experiencing disadvantage across Australia, in partnership with over 450 community organisations;
 - (b) that there is no other organisation in Australia with the expertise, capacity and capability of effectively and efficiently providing over 100,000 participation opportunities every year to the most disenfranchised, disadvantaged and forgotten Australians; and
 - (c) widespread community concern at the diminishing resources to support people experiencing disadvantage, many of whom have relied upon the RNP for social participation and social inclusion through engagement with sport and recreation programs; and
- (2) calls on the Government to reinstate funding to the RNP.

Debate ensued.

Debate adjourned, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

6 CANNED HUNTING

Mr Wood, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) condemns:
 - (a) 'canned hunting' where animals are raised in captivity for the purpose of being killed in the name of trophy kills; and
 - (b) the importation of any species (body or part) in the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES) appendixes I, II or III as a result of a canned hunt;
- (2) congratulates the Australian Government for introducing new measures to tighten controls on the trade of rhinoceros to tackle illegal trade of this threatened species;
- (3) welcomes Australian Government consideration of actions to improve the protection of African lions by preventing imports of lion trophies obtained through illegal hunting; and
- (4) notes that:
 - (a) the CITES lays down guidelines on the importation of all trophy kills, and the Department of Environment uses this information as its guide in Australia;
 - (b) although CITES is legally binding on the parties, it does not take the place of national laws; and
 - (c) as a signatory to CITES, the Australian Government is committed to the protection of wildlife that may be adversely affected by trade.

2 MEMBERS' CONSTITUENCY STATEMENTS

Members' constituency statements were made.

3 AUSCHWITZ MEMORIAL

Mr Danby, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that:
 - (a) 27 January 2015 marked the 70th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz by the allies;
 - (b) over a million Jews and 150,000 non-Jews were murdered in the Auschwitz death camp; and
 - (c) 27 January has since become International Holocaust Day, and is marked by ceremonies around the world acknowledging the horrific nature of the official policy of genocide against Jews that was manifested in the Holocaust and that claimed 6 million lives;
- (2) calls on all Australians to remember these crimes against humanity in order to ensure Australia's continuing condemnation of any attempts to repeat such horrors; and
- (3) in light of Australia having one of the largest groups of Holocaust survivors and the bipartisan support for the previous government's legacy to the maintenance of the memorial of the camp, calls on Australia to keep a representative on the international committee that supervises the maintenance of the memorial at Auschwitz.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

4 COMPLEMENTARY MEDICINES AND PRACTICES

Mr Matheson, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes:
 - (a) the importance of complementary medicines and practices, including traditional Chinese medicines, to the international healthcare landscape;
 - (b) that the Australian complementary medicines industry is worth over \$3.8 billion; and
 - (c) that Australia is the first western nation to nationally regulate Chinese medicine practitioners; and
- (2) acknowledges:
 - (a) the National Institute of Complementary Medicine (NICM), hosted by the University of Western Sydney, as Australia's premier research facility in complementary medicine, being the only Australian complementary medicine research centre to receive the top ranking of five in the Commonwealth Excellence in Research for Australia scheme; and

- (b) the role of the NICM in fostering collaboration and engagement with Chinese hospitals, research centres and universities to provide trade, research and investment opportunities in Australia.

Debate ensued.

5 MULTINATIONAL TAX AVOIDANCE

Dr Leigh, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) recognises:
 - (a) the Government's failure to tackle multinational profit shifting in Australia;
 - (b) every dollar that is avoided by multinational companies must be paid for by Australian taxpayers and businesses, or by cutting services; and
 - (c) that unfair tax arrangements distort investment decisions and put local companies at a disadvantage against international conglomerates;
- (2) acknowledges:
 - (a) the \$1.1 billion of multinational tax measures that the Government has handed back to large multinationals, including:
 - (i) \$280 million in reforms to the offshore banking unit regime;
 - (ii) \$113 million in legislative elements to improve tax compliance;
 - (iii) \$140 million from not proceeding with changes to rules applying to multiple entry consolidated groups; and
 - (iv) \$600 million from the abolition of section 25-90 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*;
 - (b) the Treasurer's laggard implementation of the new G20 reporting standard behind the group of 40 'early adopters';
 - (c) the \$200 million and thousands of staff cuts from the Australian Taxation Office which severely limit its compliance and investigative power; and
 - (d) the significant gap between this Government's rhetoric and its actions when it comes to ensuring multinationals pay their fair share of tax; and
- (3) calls on the Treasurer to bring the same zeal to stopping multinational tax avoidance that he brings to his budget cuts on Australia's least well off.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

6 DEMOCRATIC PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF KOREA AND HUMAN RIGHTS

Mr C. A. Laundy, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House notes that the:

- (1) United Nations commission of inquiry on human rights in the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) released its report in March 2014;
- (2) report found that 'systemic, widespread and gross human rights violations have been and are being committed by the DPRK, its institutions and officials' against its own people, including:
 - (a) violations of the:
 - (i) freedoms of thought, expression and religion;
 - (ii) freedom of movement and residence; and
 - (iii) right to food and related aspects of the right to life;
 - (b) discrimination;
 - (c) arbitrary detention, torture, executions and prison camps; and
 - (d) abductions and enforced disappearances from other countries;

- (3) report found that crimes against humanity have been committed in the DPRK ‘pursuant to policies established at the highest level of the State’; and
- (4) Government:
 - (a) welcomes the United Nations Security Council’s decision on 23 December 2014 to include a standing agenda item on the situation in the DPRK under which it can continue to consider the dire human rights situation; and
 - (b) continues to call on the DPRK to:
 - (i) treat its citizens in accordance with human rights standards; and
 - (ii) create the conditions for meaningful inter-Korean dialogue and Six Party Talks, including honouring DPRK commitments to denuclearise and demonstrating good faith, such as participating in inter-Korean family reunions.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

7 PROTECTION OF CIVILIANS

Mr Thomson, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) stresses the superiority of collective security through the United Nations over unilateral action or ‘coalition of the willing’ type adventurism, and strongly supports the ‘responsibility to protect’ principle as a vehicle to protect civilians; and
- (2) urges the Government to:
 - (a) encourage the United Nations to establish peacekeeping forces in the world’s trouble spots to protect civilians and to extinguish conflicts before they escalate in ways which potentially draw in Australia; and
 - (b) implement the recommendations of the Joint Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade regarding the establishment of a mediation unit within the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade to assist in resolving intrastate and interstate disputes before they develop into open conflict (similar to the Norwegian model).

- (3) acknowledges and commends the Speak Greek in March campaign;
- (4) acknowledges that the Speak Greek in March campaign aims to encourage the greater use of the Greek language at home, in the month of March; and
- (5) in collaboration with relevant organisations of the Greek community, undertakes a campaign to establish March as the month during which individuals and organisations endeavour to conduct most of their communications at home and in public in the Greek language.

- (4) melanoma is:
 - (a) the most common cancer in young Australians aged 15 to 39 and those diagnosed with advanced melanoma have a median survival of only 8 to 9 months;
 - (b) estimated to be the third most commonly diagnosed cancer in Australian males in 2014 (7,440 cases), after prostate and colorectal cancer; and
 - (c) also estimated to be the third most commonly diagnosed cancer in Australian females (5,210 cases), after breast and colorectal cancer; and

(5) advanced melanoma costs hundreds of millions of dollars each year.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

25 CYCLONE PAM

Mr Thistlethwaite, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) acknowledges the devastation caused by Cyclone Pam on the people of Vanuatu, Tuvalu and Kiribati;
- (2) recognises the enormous destructive force of Cyclone Pam and notes the loss of life and destruction caused including:
 - (a) damage to 90 per cent of Port Vila homes and entire villages across the archipelago;

- (5) calls on the Australian Government to monitor the situation closely and to work with the governments of Vanuatu, Tuvalu and Kiribati to provide timely and appropriate further assistance as needed.

1 In accordance with the resolution agreed to on 23 March 2015, the Federation Chamber met at 4.02 pm.

2 MEMBERS' CONSTITUENCY STATEMENTS

Members' constituency statements were made.

3 DEREGULATION

Mr Irons, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

(1) notes that:

- (a) the previous Labor Government introduced more than 21,000 additional regulations in five and a half years and as a consequence, Australia:
 - (i) ranked 128th out of 148 countries for burden of government regulation according to the 2013 World Economic Forum Global Competitiveness Index; and
 - (ii) came second last in a 2012 ranking of productivity growth by the Economist Intelligence Unit;
 - (b) the Government has a deregulation agenda to cut \$1 billion in green and red tape each year; and
 - (c) on 26 March 2014 the Government held the first ever red tape repeal day, removing over 10,000 pieces and 50,000 pages of legislation and regulation saving over \$700 million in compliance costs; and
- (2) commends the Parliamentary Secretary to the Prime Minister for his effective management of the Government's deregulation agenda.

Debate ensued.

4 BRAIN INJURY

Ms Hall, having amended, by leave, notice No. 2, private Members' business, moved—That this House:

- (1) recognises:
 - (a) that Brain Injury Awareness Week will be held from 9 to 15 March 2015;
 - (b) that over 700,000 Australians live with a brain injury; and
 - (c) the work done by the Bouverie Centre in conjunction with the Victorian Department of Human Services to improve services provided to people with acquired brain injury;
- (2) calls on the Government to:
 - (a) provide more services to accommodate people with a brain injury; and
 - (b) develop a national scale partnership similar to the partnership seen in Victoria which helps people with a brain injury, and their family members;
- (3) further recognises that Acquired Brain Injuries (ABI) can be acquired in many varied and different ways, e.g. as a result of an accident, a stroke, drug and alcohol abuse, tumours, poisoning, and disorders such as Parkinson's disease, Multiple Sclerosis, and Alzheimers disease; and
- (4) calls on the Government to:
 - (a) work with Brain Injury Australia to establish a nation-wide policy which will reflect the needs of people with an ABI, as well as the needs of their families;
 - (b) undertake a public awareness campaign to inform the public about ABI, its causes, prevention and management; and
 - (c) provide more funding for research into ABI.

Debate ensued.

Debate adjourned, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

5 TUBERCULOSIS

Mrs Prentice, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that:
 - (a) 24 March is World Tuberculosis Day (WTD);
 - (b) WTD is a designated WHO global public health campaign and is an annual event that marks the anniversary of the 1882 discovery by German Nobel Laureate, Dr Robert Koch, of the bacterium that causes tuberculosis;
 - (c) tuberculosis is contagious and airborne—it ranks as the world's second leading cause of death from a single infectious agent and left untreated, each person with active tuberculosis disease will infect on average 10 to 15 people every year;
 - (d) the theme for WTD in 2015 is 'Reach, Treat, Cure Everyone';
 - (e) in 2013, 1.5 million people died from tuberculosis worldwide with 40 per cent of deaths occurring in countries in the Indo Pacific region;
 - (f) Papua New Guinea has the highest rate of tuberculosis infection in the Pacific, with an estimated 39,000 total cases and 25,000 infections each year;
 - (g) the prevalence of multidrug-resistant tuberculosis continues to increase worldwide—rising from 450,000 cases in 2012 to 480,000 cases in 2013, with more than half of multidrug-resistant tuberculosis cases found in our region; and
 - (h) tuberculosis is:
 - (i) the leading cause of death among HIV positive people—HIV weakens the immune system and is lethal in combination with tuberculosis, each contributing to the other's progress; and
 - (ii) considered to be a preventable and treatable disease, however current treatment tools, drugs, diagnostics and vaccines are outdated and ineffective; and

- (2) recognises:
- (a) Australia's resolve to continue to work towards combatting the challenge of tuberculosis in the region and the need for discovery, development and rapid uptake of new tools, interventions and strategies as recognised in the WHO End TB Strategy;
 - (b) the WHO End TB Strategy was endorsed by all member states at the 2014 World Health Assembly and aims to end the tuberculosis epidemic by 2035;
 - (c) the Australian Government funding of health and medical research is helping to bring new medicines, diagnostic tests and vaccines to market for tuberculosis and other neglected diseases; and
 - (d) the ongoing support for research and development of new simple and affordable treatment tools for tuberculosis and multidrug-resistant tuberculosis is essential if the WHO End TB Strategy goal is to be met.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

6 RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

Mr Zappia, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) congratulates the Australian researchers at Monash University and Amaero Engineering Pty Ltd who created the world's first 3D printed jet engine;
- (2) recognises that:
 - (a) Australia has a history of punching above its weight when it comes to research and development; and
 - (b) huge opportunities are available to create new advanced manufacturing jobs and industries with the right government support for our science, research and manufacturing sectors; and
- (3) condemns the Government's shortsighted approach to science, research and industry policy, where it has:
 - (a) cut \$878 million from science and research, including \$115 million from the CSIRO;
 - (b) recklessly undermined the Australian auto manufacturing sector, risking the loss of millions of dollars annually of investment in research and development;
 - (c) failed to support the shipbuilding industry by refusing to guarantee that the 12 future submarines will be built in Australia which would lead to millions of dollars of investment in research and innovation; and
 - (d) introduced enormous uncertainty for innovative businesses conducting Australian research and development, with retrograde changes to the Research & Development Tax Incentive that sees the removal of the benefit for expenditure over \$100 million and a reduction in the rate of the offset by 1.5 percentage points for all firms across the board.

Mr Porter presented reasons, which were circulated, and are as follows:

Reasons of the House of Representatives for disagreeing to the amendments of the Senate

Senate Amendment Numbers (1), (2), (3) and (4)

These amendments would propose retaining the Product Stewardship Advisory Group (PSAG), the Oil Stewardship Advisory Council (OSAC) and the Fuel Standards Consultative Committee (FSCC) and disallowed an alternative public consultation process that applied with respect to the grant and variation of approvals.

The repeal of these bodies would not prevent the Department of the Environment from consulting and engaging with industry experts on an as-needs basis without the need for costly permanent structures. The proposed abolitions would not preclude the Department of the Environment from seeking views from a broader range of organisations, experts and the community in a more flexible and targeted way. A statutory process is not required to facilitate this engagement.

Accordingly, the House of Representatives does not accept these Amendments.

Senate Amendment Numbers (5) and (6)

These amendments would disallow the removal of the requirement to publish certain notices under the *Fuel Quality Standards Act 2000* and the *Hazardous Waste (Regulation of Exports and Imports) Act 1989* in the Commonwealth Government Gazette and instead allow the publication of the same information on the Department of the Environment's website.

These measures do not remove the publication requirements from those Acts; rather they require the information to be published in a more accessible location (on the Department of Environment website, rather than the Commonwealth Government Gazette). As a result, the measures enhance transparency and community participation in the policy development and decision-making process.

These amendments would also disallow a number of measures to the *Hazardous Waste (Regulation of Exports and Imports) Act 1989* (HW Act) including:

- the removal of requirement to specify particulars of an application in the Regulations before a permit decision can be made;
- the clarification of requirement to hold an Australian Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) transit permit. Currently, a person proposing to transit hazardous waste through Australia is required to hold an Australian-OECD transit permit. When deciding to grant a transit permit, the Minister must be satisfied that carrying out the transit proposal will not pose a significant risk of injury or damage to human beings or the environment (amongst other things). The requirement to hold an Australian-OECD permit is additional to the requirement that Australia provide consent to the exporting country for the movement to transit through Australia. There is also a requirement for the person proposing to carry out the transit to hold an import and export permit issued by the importing and exporting countries;
- the clarification of matters to be included in Basel import and export permits;
- the clarification of the period of appointment for members of the Hazardous Waste Technical Working Group; and
- to enable the Minister for the Environment to delegate his or her functions and powers under the *Hazardous Waste (Regulation of Exports and Imports) Act 1989* to an APS employee who holds, or is acting in, an Executive Level 2 (or equivalent) position.

Publication requirements for regulations have not been removed; rather they require the information to be published in a more accessible location (on the Department of Environment website, rather than the Commonwealth Government Gazette). As a result, the measures enhance transparency and community participation in the policy development and decision-making process.

The requirement that a person hold an Australian-OECD transit permit, where the transit is from one OECD country to another and the Minister is satisfied that the transit proposal does not pose a significant risk of injury or damage to human beings or the environment is unnecessarily duplicative. The current requirement to hold an Australian transit permit is effectively duplicative of the requirement that Australia provide consent (as required by the relevant OECD Decision) to the exporting country for the movement to transit through Australia. The measures would not lessen the environmental protections as the Minister for the Environment would need to be satisfied that the transit does not pose a significant risk of injury or damage to human beings or the environment in order to exempt a person from a requirement to hold an Australian-OECD transit permit.

The requirement to specify the level of detail in Basil import and export permits currently required by the HW Act has resulted in situations where permit holders are required to apply for a variation to their permit as a result of changes that occur after the permit is issued that do not substantially change the nature of the proposal. For example, because the HW Act currently requires the place of import/export to be specified, a change in the port to which the hazardous waste is to be shipped due to changes in shipping routes would require a variation to the permit. Clarifying these matters will reduce the cost to business arising from the need to apply for a permit variation when details of a movement change. The environmental protections are not lessened by these measures as:

- the matters that the decision-maker must have regard to when deciding whether to grant the permit are not changed; and

- the HW Act will still enable the Minister for the Environment to include such other information in the permit as the Minister considers appropriate. For example, if the method of transport is a material factor in the decision to grant a permit, the Minister is not prevented from including particulars of this in the permit.

The Hazardous Waste Technical Working Group is being retained as it advises the Minister on technical matters that have commercial implications (for example, whether a particular type of waste is hazardous and therefore subject to the hazardous waste regime). The measure clarifies the maximum period of a member's appointment to the Working Group is three years. As members are appointed based on their expertise on matters relating to the management of hazardous waste, clarifying the period of appointment ensures that the members' expertise and experience remains current. The Minister would not be prevented from reappointing a member for a further period of three years if the Minister is satisfied that the member's expertise remains current.

The measure to enable the Minister for the Environment to delegate his or her functions and powers under the HW Act to an APS employee who holds, or is acting in, an Executive Level 2 (or equivalent) position will enable Executive Level 2 officers to exercise the Minister's functions and powers where administrative necessity dictates that decisions be made at this level. This may include:

- providing notifications and acknowledgements under the HW Act where response times are short (i.e. 3 days following receipt of an application) and do not require decisions to be made; and
- the making of non-controversial permit decisions where the application is of a routine nature and the applicant has an established history under the HW Act.

Delegating functions and powers to Executive Level 2 officers is consistent with other legislation which contain permit regimes, including the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999* which enables the Minister to delegate any or all of his or her powers and functions to an officer or employee in the Department. The Australian Administrative Law Guide also provides that it may be appropriate for junior officers to make decisions involving a limited exercise of discretion, or under provisions which will give rise to a high volume of decisions. The delegation of these powers to an Executive Level 2 employee would not prevent significant decisions being made by more senior officers or the Minister for the Environment personally.

Accordingly, the House of Representatives does not accept these Amendments.

Senate Amendment Number (7)

The amendment proposes amendments to the Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act (PGPA Act). These amendments would prescribe the process for entering into a contract for the design and building of a submarine, or a substantial part of a submarine, as part of the future submarine project (SEA 1000 in the Defence Capability Plan as in force on 1 December 2014).

In-line with advice from the Department of Defence, the Government is pursuing a competitive evaluation process as part of the acquisition strategy for the Future Submarine programme. This process is consistent with the PGPA Act (specifically the Commonwealth Procurement Rules issued under Section 101) and the Defence Procurement Policy Manual.

Accordingly, the House of Representatives does not accept these Amendments.

On the motion of Mr Porter, the reasons were adopted.

10 PRIVATE HEALTH INSURANCE AMENDMENT BILL (NO. 2) 2014

The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Ms King who moved, as an amendment—That all words after “That” be omitted with a view to substituting the following words:

“whilst not declining to give the bill a second reading the House calls on the government to reinstate the:

- (1) provision for the subject of a complaint to ask the Ombudsman for additional time to respond to a complaint;
- (2) provision for the Minister for Health to intervene where the Ombudsman decides not to investigate a complaint;
- (3) provision enabling the Minister for Health to request the Ombudsman to undertake investigations;
- (4) capacity of the Ombudsman to investigate complaints, produce high quality reports, and protect the rights of private health insurance consumers; and
- (5) penalty for failing to participate in mediation.”

As I understand it, towards the end of his speech on his motion on the cruise liner industry the Member for Bowman picked up one of two bottles he had brought into the Chamber, purporting to contain bunker fuel. He then proceeded to pour some of the contents, a thick black fuel, onto his hand, spilling onto the desk and floor of the Federation Chamber. In his remarks, the Member himself acknowledged the dangerous nature of the material. Setting aside the Members' offence in making use of props, it is highly disorderly to bring dangerous and flammable substances into either of the Chambers.

I consider the Member's actions to be totally disorderly, disrespectful of the House and the Federation Chamber and potentially dangerous to the health and safety of Members and staff in the Federation Chamber. I understand there has been damage to the Federation Chamber which we are endeavouring to repair.

Standing Order 187 provides that action pursuant to Standing Order 94 can only be taken against a member in the House. This includes under provisions 94(a) and 94(b).

Accordingly, I ask the Member to apologise to the House for his reckless and highly disorderly actions.

Mr Laming apologised to the House.

Member named and suspended

The Speaker named the Member for Bowman (Mr Laming) for serious and disorderly behaviour.

Mr Pyne (Leader of the House) moved—That the Member for Bowman be suspended from the service of the House.

Question—put and passed.

The Member was, therefore, suspended at 2.08 pm for 24 hours under standing order 94, and he accordingly left the Chamber.

20 LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORFOLK ISLAND—SELF GOVERNMENT

The Speaker informed the House that she had received the following Remonstrance passed by the Legislative Assembly of Norfolk Island on 20 May 2015 relating to self government—

The Legislative Assembly for Norfolk Island respectfully addresses itself to—

The Honourable the President of the Senate and the Members of the Senate,

The Honourable the Speaker of the House of Representatives and Members of the House of Representatives in Parliament assembled.

PREAMBLE

The passage in the Commonwealth Parliament of the *Norfolk Island Act 1979* conferred on Norfolk Island a limited grant of self governing powers with its own legislature (the Legislative Assembly of Norfolk Island) with a plenary grant of legislative powers to legislate for the peace, order and good government of the Territory established, with its own body politic under the Crown with a wide grant of executive powers and with its own judicial system.

The Legislative Assembly for Norfolk Island is constituted of 9 representatives of the people of Norfolk Island; duly and democratically elected pursuant to the *Legislative Assembly Act 1979*.

The Norfolk Island Legislation Amendment Bill 2015 passed by the Commonwealth Parliament in May 2015 removes the self government powers of Norfolk Island. It has been passed without genuine consultation and negotiation with the Norfolk Island Government, the Legislative Assembly of Norfolk Island or the people of Norfolk Island.

The Statement of Compatibility with Human Rights contained within the Explanatory Memorandum for the Norfolk Island Legislation Amendment Bill 2015 asserted that the proposal to remove self-government powers from Norfolk Island was the result of an extensive consultation process that found significant support for change within the Norfolk Island community.

Norfolk Island voters in a referendum conducted on 8 May 2015 under the *Referendum Act 1964* voted by a 68% majority that the people of Norfolk Island should have the right to freely determine their political status, their economic, social and cultural development and be consulted at referendum or plebiscite on the future model of governance for Norfolk Island before such changes are acted on by the Australian Parliament.

GRIEVANCES

The Legislative Assembly of Norfolk Island presents its grievances to the Commonwealth Parliament.

These are that:

- (1) The people of Norfolk Island having been granted self governing powers, the duly elected representatives of the people of Norfolk Island are aggrieved that self government should be removed without genuine consultation and negotiation.
- (2) The removal of self government in Norfolk Island breaches one of the conventions of self-government in the Westminster tradition that once self government is granted to a political entity, it should not thereafter be taken away except in the most extreme circumstances, for example, war or civil disturbance. See submission of the Commonwealth Attorney-General's Department to the Joint Parliamentary Committee on the Northern Territory, page 8 of Parliamentary Paper No. 281 of 1974 where it also states that it would be politically unthinkable to take away such powers after they had been granted.

PETITION

The Legislative Assembly of Norfolk Island and its democratically elected Members respectfully request that the Commonwealth Parliament affirm the rights of the people of Norfolk Island to self-government by re-examining those aspects of the Norfolk Island Legislation Amendment Bill 2015 that result in the removal of the Norfolk Island Legislative Assembly and call on the Prime Minister to confer on the people of Norfolk Island the right to freely determine their political status, their economic, social and cultural development and be consulted at referendum or plebiscite on the future model of governance for Norfolk Island before such changes are acted on by the Australian Parliament.

On 20 May 2015 the above Remonstrance was introduced by the Hon Robin E Adams MLA into the Fourteenth Legislative Assembly of Norfolk Island and was passed on the same day. The Legislative Assembly requested the Remonstrance be delivered by the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly to the Speaker of the House of Representatives and to the President of the Senate.

1 The Federation Chamber met at 10.30 am.

2 MEMBERS' CONSTITUENCY STATEMENTS

Members' constituency statements were made.

3 TERRORISM

Mr Nikolic, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) recognises the:
 - (a) need to destroy, degrade or contain terrorism in all its forms in source or origin countries;
 - (b) clear and present threat posed by transnational terrorism in our region;
 - (c) sustained efforts of both the Australian Defence Force (ADF) and our civilian national security agencies to identify, attack and degrade foreign or 'source nation' terrorist threats at the very earliest opportunity, most notably since the 2002 Bali bombings (which claimed the lives of 202 people, including 88 innocent Australians, and injured a further 209);
 - (d) unique geo-political circumstances of Australia which will continue to emphasise the need for cooperative and heightened security vigilance and activity with, by and from our key regional partners and allies, over the long term;
 - (e) potential for Australian security forces, both civil and military, to continue to act as effective, practical agents to reinforce, bolster and continually invigorate critical regional partnerships and engagements, toward a stable and prosperous long term regional future, and one which is mutually beneficial to all national participants;
 - (f) potential offered by the Government's holistic approach to home-grown terrorism, to constitute a working model for consideration, adaptation as appropriate, and possible implementation, by equally determined Governments and nations, throughout our region;
 - (g) need for sustained vigilance and regional engagement by all like-minded nations in our region;
 - (h) need to maintain and support both ADF and civilian security agency capabilities, at the very forefront of counter-terrorist operational capacity and capability;
 - (i) need for sustained border protection regimes and procedures; and
 - (j) importance of maintaining and sustaining Australia's traditional defence alliance and treaty arrangements;
- (2) acknowledges:
 - (a) the Government's active and constructive efforts to do all within its powers to halt terrorism at its source, or points of origin;

- (b) that the Attorney-General's Department has led and implemented a diverse array of constructive initiatives and measures in support of community safety and resilience, which will further complement 'offshore' counter-terrorist initiatives and endeavours;
 - (c) that Australian Government actions are in lockstep with sensible international responses to this global trend and challenges; and
 - (d) the importance of secure information-sharing with traditional allies and regional partners, to achieve the negation of potentially diverse terrorist threats; and
- (3) endorses and lends ongoing support to the Government's longstanding efforts to diminish the current and future terrorist threat to all Australians, including the removal of Australian citizenship status from dual citizens who are involved in terrorism in Australia or abroad.

Debate ensued.

4 INBORN ERROR OF METABOLISM (IEM) PROGRAMME FUNDING

Ms Hall, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) condemns the Government's decision to cut, without any warning and consultation, all funding from the Inborn Error of Metabolism (IEM) Programme that provides for families and carers with children who suffer from Phenylketonuria (PKU);
- (2) acknowledges that sufferers of PKU require a vital expensive medically prescribed diet, supplemented by the funding, to avoid brain damage, seizures, liver failure, coma and in some cases death; and
- (3) calls on the Government to reinstate the funding to the IEM program.

Debate ensued.

5 TASMANIAN FRUIT AND VEGETABLE INDUSTRIES

Mr Hutchinson, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) recognises that:
 - (a) the Coalition's Economic Growth Plan for Tasmania dated 15 August 2013, committed the Government to creating a Tasmanian Fruit and Vegetable Industry Taskforce focusing on the growth of the fruit and vegetable sectors in Tasmania;
 - (b) the Taskforce will develop an industry-led plan to promote competitiveness, investment and jobs growth in these sectors; and
 - (c) the terms of reference prescribing the scope of the Taskforce included reviewing existing work, drawing conclusions and developing a unified and agreed plan for the Tasmanian fruit and vegetable industries to:
 - (i) increase grower returns and reduce their costs;
 - (ii) increase competitiveness, investment and jobs growth across the supply chain; and
 - (iii) develop domestic and export markets;
- (2) acknowledges:
 - (a) the vital importance of the agriculture sector to Tasmania, and for all Tasmanians;
 - (b) that Tasmania is an important producer of fruit and vegetables, mainly potatoes, onions, carrots, cherries and other stone fruit, pomefruit and berries;
 - (c) that in 2011-12, the gross value production of fruit and nuts in Tasmania was \$100.8 million, vegetables \$213.4 million, and nursery production (nurseries, cut flowers and cultivated turf) \$28.4 million, with Tasmania also being an important producer of the special poppy and pyrethrum crops;

- (d) that in contrast to other states, exporting and direct sales to processors are the predominant sales channels for fresh produce, for example in 2011-12, an estimated 70 per cent of Tasmanian vegetable growers sold their produce directly to a processor (this includes the manufacturing of canned, bottled, preserved, quick frozen or dried vegetable products, dehydrated vegetable products, soups, sauces, pickles and mixed meat and vegetable cereal products, processing and packaging of fresh salads and pan-ready vegetables, as well as bulk packaged and cleaned vegetables) and approximately 10 per cent sold their produce for export, which compares with the national averages of 26 per cent and 4 per cent, respectively;
 - (e) that in 2011-12 only 5 per cent of Tasmanian vegetable farms reported selling direct to state capital wholesale, compared to the national average of 62 per cent;
 - (f) that Tasmania exports significant volumes of onions and cherries, for example:
 - (i) in the 12 months to June 2013, it exported \$44 million of fresh fruit and vegetables, 6.7 per cent of the total value of national exports of fresh fruit and vegetables, and of this, 98 per cent of the fruit were cherries and 94 per cent of the vegetables were onions;
 - (ii) Tasmania accounted for 52 per cent of all cherries and 86 per cent of all onions exported from Australia in 2012-13; and
 - (iii) in 2012 the Australian exports of fresh onions and fresh cherries accounted for 0.9 per cent and 0.4 per cent, respectively, of global exports of these products;
 - (g) that an independent assessment of the economic development potential of sectors of the Tasmanian economy found that the wine, dairy and aquaculture sectors had the greatest economic development potential;
 - (h) that horticulture also presents opportunities for growth in employment, though not as great as those in the wine, dairy and aquaculture sectors;
 - (i) that the challenges and opportunities faced by Tasmania's fruit and vegetable industry have been well documented and the industry has been subject to many reviews and planning processes; and
 - (j) that, to assist the deliberations of the Taskforce, the Commonwealth Department of Agriculture, as the secretariat to the Taskforce, has identified and summarised a collection of previous work and in so doing, is mindful that individual Taskforce members would be familiar with a number of these documents, in some cases contributing directly to their production; and
- (3) notes the continuing importance of investment in the Tasmanian agriculture sector, as a traditional and ongoing source of economic development, including employment, in that state, and one which continues to enjoy a relatively high national and international profile for the reliability and quality of its primary food production.

Debate ensued.

 - (e) implications of relevant recommendations of the Financial System Inquiry, particularly recommendations 34 and 36 relating to non-monetary conditions of default and the external administration regime respectively;
 - (f) extent to which borrowers are given an opportunity to rectify any genuine default event and the time period typically provided for them to do so;
 - (g) provision of reasonable written notice to a borrower when a loan is required to be repaid;
 - (h) appropriateness of the loan to value ratio as a mechanism to default a loan during the period of the loan; and
 - (i) conditions and requirements to be met prior to the appointment of an external administrator; and
- (2) in undertaking this inquiry, the Committee take evidence on:
 - (a) the incidence and history of:
 - (i) loan impairments; and
 - (ii) the forced sale of property;
 - (b) the effect of the forced sale of property in depressed market conditions and drought;
 - (c) comparisons between valuations and sale price;

- (d) the adequacy of the legal obligations on lenders and external administrators (including s420A of the *Corporations Act 2001*) to obtain fair market value for the forced sale of property; and

 - (b) in 2013-14 Australians started more than 280,000 small businesses;
 - (c) the Coalition Government has developed and started to deliver as part of the budget, the largest small business package in the nation's history—the Jobs and Small Business Package—worth \$5.5 billion; and
 - (d) as part of the Jobs and Small Business Package, all small businesses will get an immediate tax deduction for each asset they buy costing less than \$20,000; and
- (2) acknowledges the work of the Prime Minister, the Treasurer and the Minister for Small Business in putting together a package that will deliver for small businesses now and into the future.

Debate ensued.

4 UNEMPLOYMENT

Mr Conroy, pursuant to notice, moved—That the House:

- (1) recognises that alongside national defence, there is no higher obligation on a Commonwealth government than to support and promote the employment prospects of its citizens;
- (2) condemns the record of the Government which has seen:
 - (a) an unemployment rate at a 12 year high;
 - (b) more than 81,000 Australians added to the unemployment queue since the election of the Government;
 - (c) a record underemployment rate of 8.6 per cent;
 - (d) a youth unemployment rate of over 15 per cent;
 - (e) 190,000 people long term unemployed, more than any time since records began; and

- (f) one in four unemployed people being long term unemployed;
- (3) recognises that while support for small businesses is important to stimulating jobs growth, more is needed; and
- (4) calls on the Government to invest more in education, training, industry and innovation policies to rectify this jobs crisis.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

5 FREE TRADE AGREEMENTS

Mr Nikolic, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) recognises:
 - (a) the importance of Australia's Free Trade Agreements (FTAs), which now include nations in three continents—North America, South America and Asia;
 - (b) Australia's three most recent FTAs negotiated and signed in 2014 with Japan, South Korea and China and the positive security, stability and economic prosperity which will result from each of these mutually constructive agreements;
 - (c) the Government's intention to continue to enhance current and future trade and investment opportunities for the long term advantage of all Australian citizens; and
 - (d) the significant personal contribution made by the Minister for Trade and Investment in securing FTAs with Japan, South Korea and China in 2014;
- (2) acknowledges the following advantages of FTAs to Australia as being:
 - (a) removing potentially billions of dollars of tariff imposts for foreign produced consumer goods (including, clothes, shoes, car components, cars and electronics);
 - (b) enhancing capital flows into Australian agriculture, finance, tourism, infrastructure and mining as a result of streamlined approval procedures for foreign state owned investors;
 - (c) improving primary agriculture, particularly dairy, beef, lamb, wine and horticulture as a result of overseas tariffs being phased out over time;
 - (d) streamlining licensing and reducing restrictions on Australian services firms, including banks, insurance companies, financial fund managers, as well as law, architecture and engineering firms; and
 - (e) providing cheaper and more streamlined visa approval procedures, making it easier to undertake reciprocal travel, work and study in Australia and relevant trade partner nations; and
- (3) notes the continuing importance of trade between nations and of Australian formal FTAs in supporting both global and regional stability, as well as Australian long term economic prosperity, all of which are emphasised by Australia's unique geopolitics.

MONDAY, 15 JUNE 2015

1 The Federation Chamber met at 10.30 am.

2 MEMBERS' CONSTITUENCY STATEMENTS

Members' constituency statements were made.

3 BOWEL CANCER

Mrs McNamara, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that:
 - (a) Bowel Cancer Australia ran an initiative throughout the month of February titled 'Prevent Bowel Cancer' to raise awareness of bowel cancer and encourage more Australians to screen for the disease with the tagline 'Don't Wait Until It's Too Late';
 - (b) bowel cancer:
 - (i) is the second most common type of newly diagnosed cancer in Australia affecting both men and women almost equally;
 - (ii) is Australia's second biggest cancer killer after lung cancer with more than 15,000 Australians diagnosed each year; and
 - (iii) claims nearly 4,000 lives every year; and
 - (c) when found early 90 per cent of bowel cancer cases can be successfully treated;
- (2) acknowledges the Government's free National Bowel Cancer Screening Program initiative and the inclusion of people turning the ages of 70 and 74 in the program; and
- (3) notes the requirement for greater awareness and promotion of available bowel cancer screening tests and the need for people from age 50 to undertake regular screening to prevent this disease.

Ms Hall moved, as an amendment—That the following words be added to the motion:

- “(4) notes that:
- (a) June is Bowel Cancer Awareness Month (BCAM), during which Bowel Cancer Australia seeks to raise awareness of a disease that claims the lives of 77 Australians every week;
 - (b) BCAM has a positive message—saving lives through early detection—as bowel cancer is one of the most curable types of cancer if found early; and
 - (c) in 2014, about 16,980 Australians were diagnosed with bowel cancer (9,250 in men and 7,730 in women), and an estimated 19,960 are expected to be diagnosed in 2020;
- (5) recognises that:
- (a) bowel cancer can develop without any early warning signs;
 - (b) if bowel cancer is detected before it has spread beyond the bowel there is a 90 per cent chance of surviving more than five years;

- (c) regular screening every two years for people aged 50 and over can reduce the risk of dying from bowel cancer by up to 33 per cent; and
- (d) more than 12,000 suspected or confirmed cancers will be detected through free screening, saving between 300 and 500 lives each year; and
- (6) encourages Members to continue to support efforts to raise awareness of the importance of early detection as well as the signs and symptoms of bowel cancer.”

Debate continued.

- (3) remember the brave soldiers of Great Britain, France, India and Newfoundland who fought alongside the ANZACS 100 years ago;
- (4) note that on the 25th of April, solemn services of remembrance were conducted at Anzac Cove and at Lone Pine in Turkey, attended by some 8,000 Australians, including the widows of Australian veterans;
- (5) extend its thanks to the people and the Government of Turkey for their support of the centenary commemorations and their ongoing and faithful care of the Gallipoli battlefields; and
- (6) note that on Anzac Day, millions of our fellow Australians gathered to remember the ANZACS and all those who have worn our uniform and served in the name of Australia, and that the people of every electorate represented in this Parliament have honoured this milestone, the Centenary of the landings at Gallipoli.

- (3) fact that the Abbott Government's legislative program needs to be viewed as a whole to examine the Government's attempts to return to Workchoices;
- (4) fact that the Government has launched an all-encompassing Productivity Commission review of the Fair Work Act 2009;
- (5) fact the Government is using taxpayers' money to fund a Royal Commission ostensibly to inquire into registered associations recognised under the Fair Work (Registered Organisations) Act, but actually targeting their political opponents; and
- (6) Government's attempt to undermine industrial relations in this country by pitting worker against union, worker against employer and union against employer instead of seeking to create cooperative relationships that improve workplace conditions and productivity at the same time.”

 - (v) support local strategies to enhance treatment of gastrointestinal disorders in rural and remote areas and in Indigenous populations.

 - (c) current and new teachers should also welcome this report, which will further enable and support both individual teachers and school communities as a whole, in both the foreseeable future, and over the longer term;
 - (d) overall, this report will affect constructively, the lives of a majority of Australians, including most particularly teachers, parents and students;
 - (e) the impact of this report will be impartial in nature, being blind to both the demographic and economic circumstances of teachers, parents and students, alike;
 - (f) this report:
 - (i) is underpinned by both balance and merit, for example, it readily acknowledges the existence of both current high performing teacher performance and contribution, as well as identifying the need and scope for other performance to be significantly improved, together with a range of mechanisms and strategies to achieve this key objective; and
 - (ii) will act to further affirm the significance and centrality of school education within Australian society;
 - (g) by improving overall teacher performance, this report will likely support the retention of more students at school for longer, including most desirably, the completion of Year 12 by as many students as possible; and
 - (h) this report:
 - (i) will exert a long term and positive impact on current and future Australian workplaces and work performance; and
 - (ii) signals the intended ongoing future emphasis which the Government will continue to give to education and education related matters, for the benefit of all Australians, in an increasingly competitive region and world; and
- (3) calls on the Parliament to endorse the Government’s strong response to implementing this report as both a key milestone and critical policy initiative in shaping Australian school education and performance (for both teachers and students) for the early 21st century.

 - (d) the findings of the Ombudsman are damning of the governance and employment practices of Baiada; and
 - (e) that these reports and the employment practices of Baiada have caused significant community concern which must be addressed; and
- (2) calls on the management of Baiada to immediately address the findings of the Ombudsman and bring its employment practices up to community expectations.

Constitutional significance of Senate amendments—Statement by Speaker

The Speaker made the following statement: It is my duty to draw to the attention of the House, the fact that the Senate amendments conveyed by this message include a proposed amendment which raises an important point of constitutional principle.

Amendment (1) proposes to amend the definition of medical innovation to expand the purposes for which amounts may be paid, from the Medical Research Future Fund Special Account. This account is established by clause 14 of the bill, with payments being made out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund (under a standing appropriation, in section 80 of the *Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act 2013*).

There is doubt that the Senate may proceed in such circumstances by way of amendment, because of the requirements of sections 53 and 56 of the Constitution. The matter for consideration is not so much one of the privileges and rights between the two Houses, but observance of the requirements of the Constitution concerning the appropriation of revenue. I am advised that the view has been taken, where there is an expansion of the purposes for which money may be drawn from a standing appropriation, section 56 of the Constitution requires that the proposed appropriation be recommended by a message from the Governor-General. I understand that such a message has been obtained in this case.

If the House wishes to entertain the proposal reflected in the Senate's proposed amendment, the House may choose to proceed by alternative means.

Ms Ley (Minister for Health), moved—That the House endorse the statement of the Speaker in relation to the constitutional questions raised by Message No. 343 transmitted by the Senate in relation to the Medical Research Future Fund Bill 2015.

- (5) notes that the Australian Government has contributed funding of \$2 million over four years towards this worthy project.

- (6) note that on Anzac Day, millions of our fellow Australians gathered to remember the ANZACS and all those who have worn our uniform and served in the name of Australia, and that the people of every electorate represented in this Parliament have honoured this milestone, the Centenary of the landings at Gallipoli.

3 SMALL BUSINESSES AND INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENT

The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the motion of Mr C. A. Laundry—That this House:

- (1) acknowledges that:
 - (a) small and medium businesses are the engine room of the Australian economy and employment;
 - (b) an effective infrastructure network is essential for small businesses to survive and flourish; and
 - (c) investment in improved infrastructure benefits small businesses through economic growth and job creation, and provides a boost to local and regional economies; and
- (2) supports the Government in prioritising infrastructure investment to help small businesses grow and continue their vital contribution to the Australian economy.

5 FREE TRADE AGREEMENTS

 - (a) the importance of Australia's Free Trade Agreements (FTAs), which now include nations in three continents—North America, South America and Asia;
 - (b) Australia's three most recent FTAs negotiated and signed in 2014 with Japan, South Korea and China and the positive security, stability and economic prosperity which will result from each of these mutually constructive agreements;
 - (c) the Government's intention to continue to enhance current and future trade and investment opportunities for the long term advantage of all Australian citizens; and
 - (d) the significant personal contribution made by the Minister for Trade and Investment in securing FTAs with Japan, South Korea and China in 2014;
- (2) acknowledges the following advantages of FTAs to Australia as:
 - (a) removing potentially billions of dollars of tariff imposts for foreign produced consumer goods (including, clothes, shoes, car components, cars and electronics);
 - (b) enhancing capital flows into Australian agriculture, finance, tourism, infrastructure and mining as a result of streamlined approval procedures for foreign state owned investors;
 - (c) improving primary agriculture, particularly dairy, beef, lamb, wine and horticulture as a result of overseas tariffs being phased out over time;
 - (d) streamlining licensing and reducing restrictions on Australian services firms, including banks, insurance companies, financial fund managers, as well as law, architecture and engineering firms; and
 - (e) providing cheaper and more streamlined visa approval procedures, making it easier to undertake reciprocal travel, work and study in Australia and relevant trade partner nations; and
- (3) notes the continuing importance of trade between nations and of Australian formal FTAs in supporting both global and regional stability, as well as Australian long term economic prosperity, all of which are emphasised by Australia's unique geopolitics.

 - (a) established in 2010, the Indigenous Marathon Project (IMP) plays a valuable role in promoting healthy lifestyles in Indigenous communities, creating Indigenous role models and inspiring Indigenous people;
 - (b) the IMP is part of the Indigenous Marathon Foundation (IMF), a health promotion charity that changes lives through running and that celebrates and showcases incredible Indigenous achievement and resilience;
 - (c) through the IMP, young Indigenous men and women aged from 18 to 30 are given the opportunity to unearth their own sense of self-worth and pride by completing a full marathon;
 - (d) participants in the IMP mostly train in their communities, attending four one-week training and education camps, and must complete a Certificate III in Fitness, acquire a Sports Aid Certificate and attain both Level I and II Accreditation in Recreational Running Coaching with Athletics Australia;

- (e) the capstone achievement of the IMP is for participants to represent their families and communities and complete the biggest marathon in the world, in the biggest city in the world, the famous New York City Marathon held each November;
 - (f) in the last five years, the IMP has successfully graduated 43 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island men and women with 11 more enrolled in this year's program, coming from remote communities, regional towns and major cities;
 - (g) most of these IMP graduates had never run before, but in just six months, had all run a full 42.2 kilometre marathon, with the motto 'the harder the struggle, the greater the reward', which builds self-worth and self-belief by setting difficult goals and achieving them; and
 - (h) in communities around Australia, graduates of the IMP have continued to run, established running and walking groups and organised hundreds of 'Deadly Fun Runs' each year that encourage local communities to lead active lifestyles and help reduce the incidence of disease and social dysfunction; and
- (2) commends the work of Rob de Castella and his team in helping to change lives through the IMF and the IMP.

 - (d) recognise that supporting students with disability is a long term investment that pays dividends for students and Australia.

 - (g) the Australian Paralympic Team is one of Australia's most important sporting teams, helping shape community attitudes towards disability and assisting Australians with a disability to participate in sport to the level of their choice;

- (a) the Australian Paralympic Committee and relevant national sporting organisations on their preparation for the Paralympic Games so far; and
 - (b) all potential Australian team members for their dedication to their chosen Paralympic sport; and
- (3) calls on all Members of Parliament to support the Australian Paralympic Team in its preparations for the Rio 2016 Paralympic Games.

1 The House met, at 12 noon, pursuant to adjournment. The Speaker (the Honourable A. D. H. Smith) took the Chair, made an acknowledgement of country and read Prayers.

2 **SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDER 133 (DEFERRED DIVISIONS ON MONDAYS AND TUESDAYS)**

Mr Pyne (Leader of the House) moved—That standing order 133 (deferred divisions on Mondays and Tuesdays) be suspended until 2 pm.

Question—put and passed, with the concurrence of an absolute majority.

3 **SUSPENSION OF STANDING AND SESSIONAL ORDERS MOVED**

Mr Albanese moved—That so much of the standing and sessional orders be suspended as would prevent the Member for Grayndler from moving the following motion—That the House:

- (1) censures the Deputy Prime Minister for misleading the House in Question Time on Monday, 7 September when he:
 - (a) stated that reports that senior officials from his Department advised Bill Milby of North Star Cruises to reflag his vessel to a foreign nation, sack his 50 Australian workers and hire foreign crew to compete, were “inaccurate”; and
 - (b) told the House that such advice “is not possible under the proposed legislation before Parliament”;
- (2) notes the evidence before the Senate Rural and Regional Affairs and Transport Legislation Committee where Mr Milby confirmed his written evidence contained in his submission that he was advised by officials to “consider taking our ship True North off the Australian Shipping Register, re register the ship in a foreign country, lay off our Australian crew and hire a cheaper foreign crew” under his proposed laws;
- (3) notes that last night Judith Zielke, Executive Director, Surface Transport Policy Division and Michael Sutton, General Manager, Maritime and Shipping Branch both gave evidence that they did give advice to Mr Milby about the reflagging option;
- (4) further notes last night’s comment from Mr Milby that “I don’t have an issue with the people who gave that advice because if you read the legislation and the explanatory memo, they were telling me the truth”;
- (5) notes the evidence from the government’s official economic modelling for the bill assumed that the displaced Australian seafarers would “get other jobs”;
- (6) also notes the evidence from Tasmanian freight operator Searoad, North Star Cruises and Maritime Industry Australia Limited, that investment in shipbuilding and local job creation is threatened by this flawed legislation; and
- (7) accordingly, calls for:
 - (a) the Deputy Prime Minister to immediately correct the record following his misleading answer in Question Time yesterday;

- (b) the Prime Minister to apologise to Mr Bill Milby of North Star Cruises in Western Australia for questioning his honesty and integrity; and
- (c) the Government to withdraw its Shipping Legislation before the Parliament and to enter into a proper consultation process with the maritime sector about any future proposed changes to maritime legislation.

6 BOMBER COMMAND—CREATION OF SERVICE MEDAL

- (3) properly resource the Anti-Dumping Commission so that it can get on with the job of identifying and prosecuting cases of dumping, including subsidised steel;

- (6) locate entrepreneur advisers in the Illawarra to help local businesses in improving their competitiveness and allow retrenched workers and contractors from the steelworks to qualify for higher level job seeker assistance; and
- (7) support the #IllawarraDigital strategy and facilitate a Digital Enterprise programme so that small to medium businesses and young entrepreneurs can train and seek advice on taking advantage of high speed broadband.

 - (a) 96 per cent of all of Australian businesses are small businesses, employing more than 4.5 million people and producing more than \$330 billion of the nation's economic output;
 - (b) in 2013-14 Australians started more than 280,000 small businesses;
 - (c) the Coalition Government has developed and started to deliver as part of the budget, the largest small business package in the nation's history—the Jobs and Small Business Package—worth \$5.5 billion; and
 - (d) as part of the Jobs and Small Business Package, all small businesses will get an immediate tax deduction for each asset they buy costing less than \$20,000; and
- (2) acknowledges the work of the Prime Minister, the Treasurer and the Minister for Small Business in putting together a package that will deliver for small businesses now and into the future.

- (3) acknowledges that the Government is:
 - (a) delivering on its promised Industry Innovation and Competitiveness Agenda; and
 - (b) putting science at the centre of industry.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

7 PAYDAY LENDING AND CONSUMER LEASES

Ms Parke, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that:
 - (a) there is considerable evidence that payday lending and consumer leases are not properly regulated and that both financial practices are causing serious harm to low income Australians;
 - (b) irresponsible and immoral lending is endemic in the payday lending industry, which is growing rapidly and developing new online opportunities to encourage people to borrow with insufficient consideration of their capacity to bear the exorbitant and poorly regulated interest costs that payday lending involves;
 - (c) the Australian Securities and Investment Commission review of payday lending found that 24 per cent of loans were taken out by Centrelink customers and 54 per cent were taken out by customers who had two or more payday loans in the previous 90 days, a clear indication that they are caught in a cycle of repeat borrowing;
 - (d) consumer leases can involve an effective annualised interest rate of 240 per cent, and generally mean that vulnerable consumers pay three or four times the value of basic household items like refrigerators or washing machines;
 - (e) consumer leases operate with lower consumer protection standards under the National Credit Code, though such agreements are not materially different in effect from credit contracts;
 - (f) in 2013-14 nearly half of Radio Rentals' \$197 million revenue was received through the Centrepay system which allows payments to be directly debited from a consumer's Centrelink account; and
 - (g) Senator Cameron has brought a private Senators' bill that seeks to remove consumer leases from access to the Centrepay system; and
- (2) calls on the Government to:
 - (a) ensure that the recently announced review into the 2013 reforms to payday lending focuses on securing the wellbeing and protection of low income Australians irrespective of the effect this has on the profits of companies that practice this kind of often predatory lending;
 - (b) act quickly to stop consumer leases being used to prey on vulnerable and low income Australian households by ensuring that consumer leases are subject to the same standards and controls as credit contracts, and by introducing stricter controls on the currently outrageous and indefensible costs involved in such arrangements, including the requirement to prominently disclose the total cost of all contracts; and
 - (c) support Senator Cameron's initiative in removing access to Centrepay for consumer lease companies and amend section 123TC of the *Social Security (Administration) Act 1999* to include a definition of consumer leases for this purpose.

Debate ensued.

 - (i) what amounts were acquired from each source,
 - (ii) the circumstances of the donation or contribution,
 - (iii) whether third parties were involved in the donations or contributions, and
 - (iv) what influence those sources had on the political process;
- (e) the current level of public funding provided to:
 - (i) political parties or associated entities,
 - (ii) third parties,
 - (iii) candidates, and
 - (iv) Senate groups;
- (f) how public funds are allocated to electoral activities, and whether the current levels of such funds should be increased or decreased or allocated differently;
- (g) whether the status of the political donations as tax deductions should be maintained;
- (h) whether any comparable democracies:
 - (i) regulate electoral contributions from private donors, or particular classes of private donors, or
 - (ii) have absolute limits on private funding on electoral activities, and, if so, what policy objectives underlie the regulation and whether those objectives are achieved;
- (i) how the regulation of electoral funding is achieved in comparative democracies, and whether it is applicable in the Commonwealth sphere; and
- (j) any other related matter.

 - (c) order RTOs to refund the course fee to the Government and have the student’s VET FEE-HELP fee waived in cases where the course fees have been paid by the Government and the student has accrued a VET FEE-HELP debt; and
- (2) support Labor’s call for the Auditor-General to conduct an audit on the use of VET FEE-HELP”.

Mr Morrison presented reasons, which were circulated, and are as follows:

Reasons of the House of Representatives for disagreeing to the amendments of the Senate

The House of Representatives does not support the Senate amendments to the Tax Laws Amendment (Combating Multinational Tax Avoidance) Bill 2015.

The Bill that was passed by the House of Representatives is an important piece of legislation. It builds on the work the Government led in the G20 and OECD to ensure that multinationals pay their fair share.

The Bill will:

- ensure that multinational companies with significant activities in Australia that use artificial arrangements to book their revenue offshore pay the right amount of tax in Australia on their Australian activities;
- increase penalties for tax avoidance and profit shifting by large multinational companies; and
- ensure that the ATO has access to detailed information on large multinationals to undertake targeted assessments of transfer pricing risk.

The Senate has made three amendments to the Bill. These amendments have been made without thorough consultation, and without any detailed analysis of how many companies will be affected.

These amendments are made without input from Treasury and the Australian Taxation Office, without proper analysis of the regulatory burden they will impose, and without consideration of whether they can be sensibly administered by the Australian Taxation Office.

Amendments (1) and (3)

These amendments repeal the *Tax and Superannuation Laws Amendment (Better Targeting the Income Tax Transparency Laws) Act 2015*, which was passed by both Houses of Parliament last month. The amendments instead provide the Australian Taxation Office with a discretion to prevent the disclosure of the tax information of large Australian-owned private companies if it considers that the release of such information would be prejudicial to that entity's commercial negotiations.

The intention of this Bill is similar to the intent of the House of Representatives in passing the *Tax and Superannuation Laws Amendment (Better Targeting the Income Tax Transparency Laws) Act 2015*. That is, to balance the need for greater public transparency in the tax affairs of large companies while not jeopardising the privacy and competitiveness of Australian owned private companies.

However, requiring the Commissioner of Taxation to assess whether the release of tax information may be prejudicial to an entity's commercial negotiations is inappropriate. The Tax Office is not equipped with the expertise to assess the commercial sensitivities of company negotiations. The Senate amendment would require the ATO to divert resources away from its core activities, which is not in the public interest.

Amendment (2)

This amendment requires large companies to prepare and lodge with the Australian Taxation Office general purpose financial reports. The Australian Taxation Office would be required to provide these reports to the Australian Securities and Investment Commission.

These changes result in a blunt one size fits all burden on affected companies and is likely to impose costs and excessive compliance without any tangible benefit to what was originally proposed in the Bill.

The Bill that the House of Representatives proposed will ensure that the Commissioner of Taxation has access to detailed information to undertake targeted assessments of transfer pricing risk. These requirements have been tailor-made by the OECD to provide the best possible foundation for tax authorities to identify companies that are shifting profits and take action. This information would supplement the extensive information already collected by the ATO in tax returns and related disclosures. Beyond this, the Commissioner has broad powers to collect any further information that would assist in tax administration.

In contrast, much of the information required to be provided to the ATO under the Senate amendments would be irrelevant for tax compliance purposes, imposing an unnecessary cost burden on business. Such costs would be imposed on businesses that the ATO considers do not pose a significant tax risk.

For these reasons, the House of Representatives does not support the Senate's amendments to the Tax Laws Amendment (Combating Multinational Tax Avoidance) Bill 2015.

 - (c) 2009 plot to storm the Holsworthy Barracks in Sydney;
- (5) praises the Prime Minister for his statement in response to the recent terrorism incident in Parramatta, that it is not compulsory to live in Australia and if one finds Australian values unpalatable then 'there's a big wide world out there and people have got freedom of movement'; and
- (6) calls for continued action in countering violent extremism and in particular, radical Islam within Australia in order to prevent further acts of terrorism within our borders.

1 The Federation Chamber met at 10.30 am.

2 MEMBERS' CONSTITUENCY STATEMENTS

Members' constituency statements were made.

3 PALESTINIAN REFUGEES FROM SYRIA

Ms Vamvakinou, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) acknowledges that:
 - (a) 29 November is International Day of Solidarity with the Palestinian People as observed by the United Nations (resolution 23/40 B);
 - (b) following the 1948 Arab-Israeli conflict, the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA) was established to carry out direct relief and works programs for Palestinian refugees who had fled to West Bank, Gaza, Jordan, Lebanon and Syria;
 - (c) UNRWA services are available to all those living in its areas of operations—West Bank, Gaza, Jordan, Lebanon and Syria—who are registered and who need assistance;
 - (d) Palestinians registered with the UNRWA are unable to register with the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) and additionally cannot be referred for resettlement by the UNHCR;
 - (e) Palestinian refugees from Syria are a vulnerable minority, who are currently fleeing for the same reasons as other genuine refugees and persecuted minorities; and
 - (f) whilst not a legislative requirement, the UNHCR registration is a determining factor in the Australian Department of Immigration and Border Protection's consideration of refugee and humanitarian visa applications; and
- (2) calls on the Government to:
 - (a) recognise that the Palestinian refugees from Syria who are registered with the UNRWA are unable to register with the UNHCR irrespective of meeting the criteria for refugee status in the United Nations 1951 Refugee Convention; and
 - (b) work with the UNHCR to consider Palestinians fleeing Syria and registered with the UNRWA as eligible to apply for the Government's recently announced intake of 12,000 refugees from the Syrian conflict.

Debate ensued.

Debate adjourned, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

4 ADOPTION

Mr Buchholz, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that National Adoption Awareness Week was recently celebrated, a week dedicated to raising awareness around the challenges faced by families and children navigating complex inter country and domestic adoption processes in Australia;
- (2) is made aware of the fact that the rate of adoption in Australia is the lowest in the developed world, with only 317 children adopted in 2013-14;
- (3) recognises that 15,000 children in Australia have been in out of home care for over two years and over 12 million children are officially registered overseas awaiting adoption;
- (4) acknowledges the need for continued adoption reform, especially in the area of local adoption;
- (5) notes that:
 - (a) children who experience abuse and neglect in the home, followed by instability in out of home care, are much more likely to experience poor life outcomes;
 - (b) in adolescence, out of home carers are unable to maintain the necessary level of care for children with complex needs and they are often placed in residential care; and
 - (c) on an average day in 2013-14 there were 1,157 children in residential care and on 30 June 2014 there were 2,258 children in residential care; and
- (6) calls on the Government to present this issue to the COAG in order to create a national strategy that will dramatically increase the rate of local adoption in Australia.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

5 GLOBAL FUND TO FIGHT AIDS, TUBERCULOSIS AND MALARIA

Mr Thistlethwaite, by leave, for Ms Claydon, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that:
 - (a) three diseases—HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis and malaria—still account for the deaths of more than 2.7 million people each year;
 - (b) since 2000, increased action by national governments and international donors on prevention and detection of and treatment for these diseases has led to significant reductions in cases of and deaths from each disease;
 - (c) the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria (Global Fund) has played a significant role in this progress, and has supported programs with the following outcomes:
 - (i) increasing the number of people with HIV with access to antiretroviral therapy to 8.1 million;
 - (ii) making available testing and treatment for tuberculosis to 13.2 million people; and
 - (iii) supporting the distribution of 548 million insecticide treated bed nets to prevent malaria; and
 - (d) the Global Fund contributes more than \$US4 billion to combat the three diseases each year, and accounts for more than 20 per cent of international funding for HIV, half of international funding for malaria and three quarters of funding for tuberculosis;
- (2) recognises:
 - (a) the proposed Sustainable Development Goals include a target to end the epidemics of AIDS, tuberculosis and malaria by 2030;
 - (b) achieving this target will require increased investment by national governments, national aid agencies and multilateral agencies such as the Global Fund; and
 - (c) increased investment in addressing these diseases now will reduce the risk of much greater costs, especially from drug resistance, in the future; and
- (3) calls on the Government to continue and consider increasing its support for the Global Fund for the next replenishment period, 2017 to 2019.

Debate ensued.

Debate adjourned, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

6 ICE EPIDEMIC

Mrs McNamara, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that the drug ‘ice’ is at epidemic proportions and having a huge impact on our communities;
- (2) acknowledges the Government has:
 - (a) identified the ferocity of the ice epidemic across Australia;
 - (b) put in place the National Ice Taskforce (NIT) to begin implementing positive programs and changes to help stop the scourge of ice; and
 - (c) announced \$1 million in funding has been made available to Crime Stoppers to roll out a national Dob in a Dealer campaign to help combat Australia’s ice scourge; and
- (3) notes that the NIT final report was recently delivered to the Government with identified actions on how local, state and federal governments can work with communities to take a systematic, comprehensive and coordinated approach to Australia’s ice scourge.

Debate ensued.

Mr S. P. Jones moved, as an amendment—That all words in paragraph (3) be omitted with a view to substituting the following words:

“notes that it has been 511 days since the Government received the Review of Drug and Alcohol Prevention and Treatment Services Sector Report and calls on the Minister to immediately release this report and the report of the National Ice Taskforce”.

7 DIABETES

Ms Hall, by leave, for Mr Perrett, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) recognises that 14 November is World Diabetes Day;
- (2) acknowledges that:
 - (a) there are 1.1 million diagnosed cases of diabetes in Australia and they are rising by 100,000 a year;
 - (b) Diabetes Australia estimates that:
 - (i) diabetes currently costs the Australian economy around \$14.6 billion per annum; and
 - (ii) the cost of diabetes to the Australian economy is forecast to increase to \$30 billion by 2025;
 - (c) Australia needs a stronger response to the challenge of diabetes;
 - (d) there is evidence that:
 - (i) the onset of type 2 diabetes can be successfully prevented; and
 - (ii) serious complications and hospitalisations from diabetes can be prevented; and
- (3) commits to working towards reducing the impact of diabetes on the lives of Australians.

Debate ensued.

- (3) censures the Prime Minister for his:
 - (a) atrocious judgement in appointing the Member for Fisher as a Minister with responsibility for Government integrity; and
 - (b) complete and utter failure to show leadership and sack or even stand aside the Special Minister of State from his ministerial responsibilities.

- (2) resolves that in making this statement, the Prime Minister ignored numerous new developments, namely the:
 - (a) Australian Federal Police conducting a raid on the Special Minister of State's home in relation to the Minister's involvement in the Ashby affair; and
 - (b) Special Minister of State misleading the Parliament on three separate occasions this week on:
 - (i) Tuesday in Question Time when the Special Minister of State was asked about statements he had made in relation to the Ashby affair, the Minister said "In relation to the 60 Minutes interview, what was put to air was not the full question", but on Channel Nine Television News on Tuesday, in a story by journalist Laurie Oakes, the original version of the 60 Minutes interview was played and makes in clear that there were no words omitted which could in any way be considered part of the question the Minister was asked;
 - (ii) Wednesday, the Special Minister of State made a statement on indulgence in the House in which he claimed during his interview on 60 Minutes, he was answering a different part of the question which prompted his admission when there was clearly only one question asked; and
 - (iii) Wednesday in Question Time when the Special Minister of State was asked the exact same question that he was asked on 60 Minutes, he changed his answer from "Yes, I did" and said "No", this was notwithstanding the subsequent questions in the 60 Minutes interview which clearly affirmed his statement "Yes, I did"; and
- (3) therefore censures the Prime Minister for failing to enforce his own criteria for taking action and sacking the Special Minister of State for repeatedly misleading the Parliament and breaching the Prime Minister's own Statement of Ministerial Standards.

On the last day of sittings for 2015, the Manager of Opposition Business raised as a matter of privilege the statements in the House of the Special Minister of State in relation to matters concerning Mr James Ashby and the former Speaker Peter Slipper. He presented to the House various material to which he had referred.

The Manager of Opposition Business asked me to consider giving precedence to a motion to refer to the Committee of Privileges and Members' Interests whether the minister's statements in the House from 23 November to 3 December 2015 have deliberately misled the House such as to constitute an offence of improper interference with the free exercise of the House of its authority or functions.

I have been able to speak to the Manager of Opposition Business about these matters, but I should also report back to the House on them.

Deliberately misleading the House is one of the matters that can be found to be a contempt. While claims that members have deliberately misled the House have been raised as matters of privilege or contempt on a number of occasions, to date no Speaker of the House has found that a prima facie case has been made out. However, the House has agreed to refer to the Committee such a matter in relation to the former Member for Dobell.

I have told the Manager of Opposition Business that on the information available to me, the circumstances of the matters which he has raised would not justify a departure from the position that has been taken by my predecessors.

 - (d) exploitation by employers has been identified in various industries including but not limited to construction, hospitality, cleaning, food processing, agriculture, the marketing and promotions sector, privately owned childcare centres and kindergartens, shopping trolley collectors and postal service contractors;
 - (e) many of these workers are low paid and low skilled, and are on Temporary Work (Skilled) visas (subclass 457), Working Holiday visas (subclass 417) or student visas; and
 - (f) this unconscionable conduct is widespread and is creating a sub class of workers that does not just hurt the employees; it puts at risk the pay and working conditions of all Australians;
- (2) acknowledges the:
 - (a) recent hard work of the FWO to monitor, investigate, and expose potential breaches of the work visa program and Australian workplace laws; and
 - (b) proactive role the Australian union movement has played to highlight and expose unconscionable conduct by some employers and industries exploiting temporary visa workers;
- (3) condemns the Government's:
 - (a) inaction to immediately address and implement the findings of recent FWO reports in relation to this matter; and
 - (b) recent moves to relax regulations for bringing in temporary visa workers, instead of toughening the rules; and
- (4) calls on the Government to:
 - (a) immediately strengthen the work visa safeguards it has deliberately relaxed to make it easier for companies to hire overseas workers; and
 - (b) ensure that Australia's work visa program has robust safeguards in place to protect all workers and is not being used as a back door avenue to source cheap labour.

Mr Billson, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) recognises the importance of changing the national culture to make disrespecting women un-Australian;
- (2) welcomes the Government's \$100 million Women's Safety Package to combat domestic violence;
- (3) supports efforts at the upcoming Council of Australian Governments meeting to engage all levels of government and the broader community on this shared national endeavour;
- (4) places on record its deep concern about the use of new technology and in particular smart phone tracking applications by family violence perpetrators to obtain and monitor the location of their victims; and
- (5) calls on all governments to consider this as part of their strategy to combat domestic violence and technology facilitated abuse.

 - (vi) poor visual gestalt/coding (orthographic coding);

- (2) acknowledges:
 - (a) the hard work of support groups, educators and families in raising awareness of dyslexia;
 - (b) the many programs and services helping students to achieve their best every day; and
 - (c) dyslexia as a disability through the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992*; and
- (3) calls upon the Government to consider:
 - (a) continuing to work with the states and territories to complete the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability program and implement the disability loading recommended in the Gonski report;
 - (b) developing a national program which encompasses accreditation and development of schools which specialise in dyslexia, including early identification, teacher training, school autonomy, assessment and examination;
 - (c) adopting models such as the United Kingdom model for dyslexia, the Education, Health and Care Plan; and
 - (d) Dyslexia Aware School accreditation education programs in South Australian schools.

Debate ensued.

5 VETERANS OF THE VIETNAM WAR

Mrs Prentice, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- (1) notes that Vietnam Veterans Day:

 - (c) consider federal measures and encourage Australian states and territories to consider measures to ensure that trafficking of human organs is addressed;
 - (d) urge the Chinese Government to immediately cease the practice of harvesting organs from prisoners;

- (e) support and encourage universal adoption and implementation of the World Health Organization Guiding Principles on Human Organ Transplantation regarding protection of donors, transparency and the implementation of quality systems including vigilance and traceability; and
- (f) urge the Chinese Government to increase efforts to set up an organised and efficient national register of organ donation and distribution, and to cooperate with requests from the United Nations Special Rapporteurs and other international bodies and governments for investigations into the system.

 - (b) the Minister himself has stated in the House that his visit to China was in a “personal capacity”;
 - (c) except where the Prime Minister has given permission to continue an interest in a family business, the Prime Minister’s own Statement of Ministerial Standards puts a blanket ban on Ministers providing assistance to companies in a personal capacity; and
 - (d) the Minister repeatedly answers each question asked in the House by referring to his earlier statement even where it bears no relevance to the question being asked; and
- (2) calls on the Minister for Human Services to immediately attend the House to:
 - (a) give a full and comprehensive account of his activities during his trip to China, including full accounts of his itinerary, program, meetings and speeches; and
 - (b) explain to the House and to the people of Australia why he has not yet resigned for breaching the Prime Minister’s Statement of Ministerial Standards.

Reasons of the House of Representatives for disagreeing to the amendment of the Senate

Senate Amendment (1)

The amendment proposes to insert a new section 98AA into the *National Broadband Network Companies Act 2011* (NBN Companies Act). The proposed section would require the Board of NBN Co, within 60 days, to prepare, provide to the Minister and publish on its website a report setting out NBN Co's financial and deployment forecasts for the period 1 July 2015 to 30 June 2022. The Minister would be required to table the report in each House of the Parliament within five sitting days of receipt.

The amendment proposed is not related to the matters dealt with by the Communications Legislation Amendment (Deregulation and Other Measures) Bill 2015 (Bill). That Bill as introduced does not seek to amend the NBN Companies Act. The amendment proposed to the Bill is in fact inconsistent with the underlying purpose of the Bill, being to streamline regulatory processes and reduce the compliance burden faced by the broadcasting and telecommunications sectors.

Accordingly, the House of Representatives does not accept this amendment.

 - (c) the agency advised the Senate Economics References Committee, for its inquiry into non-conforming building products, that building products containing asbestos are being imported to Australia, contrary to Australian law;
- (2) acknowledges that:
 - (a) Australia has one of the highest rates of asbestos related death and injury in the world; we know that 33,000 people have already lost their lives to asbestos; and
 - (b) around 700 Australians die each year from asbestos related diseases, and without proper management experts worry that tens of thousands of Australians could be diagnosed with asbestos related diseases in coming decades;
- (3) condemns the Government's inaction and silence on the dangers of asbestos, despite warnings provided to the Senate Economics References Committee; and
- (4) calls on the Government to give greater importance to stopping asbestos importers at the border and immediately increase the penalties for illegal asbestos contamination on Australian building sites.

Debate ensued.

4 INFLAMMATORY BOWEL DISEASE

Mrs McNamara, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House notes that:

- (6) the Government has acknowledged the need to improve the quality and consistency of IBD care in Australia and has announced an historic \$500,000 matched funding agreement to kick start the Crohn's & Colitis Australia programme.

- (2) calls on the Prime Minister to be the Prime Minister that Australians hoped he would be and allow a free vote in the Parliament on marriage equality; and
- (3) suspends so much of the standing and sessional orders as would prevent private Members' business order of the day No. 1 in the Federation Chamber relating to the Marriage Legislation Amendment Bill 2015, being returned to the House for further consideration, being called on immediately and being given priority over all other business for passage through all stages by no later than 6.30 pm on Wednesday, 2 March 2016, with the question on the second reading being put immediately.

 - respect the intelligence of the Australian people;
