Submission to the Senate Committee on Rural and Regional Affairs and Transport concerning the <u>Australia Council Bill 2013</u>

I wish to place on record my concerns about the omission of vital wording from the "Functions" of the Australia Council as contained in the <u>Australia Council Bill</u> <u>2013.</u>

I am an experienced professional with extensive experience as a senior public servant in state and local governments and with a background in the arts sector.

I support the Creative Australia: National Cultural Policy and believe that it delivers a strong vision for arts and culture in Australia but there is a lack of alignment between and the Australia Council Bill 2013.

My concerns particularly relate to:

- the omission of the community from the legislation,
- the lack of recognition of our First Peoples,
- the removal of the role to foster expression of national identity through the arts
- The removal of the function that the Australia Council uphold and promote the rights of persons to freedom in the practice of the arts.

I would humbly request that minor amendments be made to the legislation would see the above issues included in the core functions of the Council. As an experienced public servant I am aware of the critical importance of legislation. Inclusion of these issues would see a greater alignment between the cultural policy and the legislation and leave less important matters open to interpretation of particular administrations.
