

To: Australia Senate Committee on Community Affairs

Re. Inquiry into the Social & Economic Impact of Rural Wind Farms

I would like to submit the attached documents to the inquiry on rural wind farms, with, in my case, particular attention to health impacts.

I am a retired professor of History from Rutgers University (New Brunswick, New Jersey, USA), where I taught for several decades. My c.v. (single page version) is attached.

One of my specialties as a scholar was Biomedical History (I researched the physiology of Native American drinking) and the History of Disease. (Notice my undergraduate and graduate training in biology, molecular biology, and immunology.) For several years, I held a courtesy appointment at the Institute of the History of Medicine, The Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. And for some years at Rutgers I was an adjunct professor at the Center of Alcohol Studies.

I am writing because I consider Wind Turbine Syndrome to be an industrial plague worthy of scholarly attention. By that I mean, I am persuaded that scholars will one day be writing learned articles and monographs on this phenomenon.

On a more personal note, I am the husband of Nina Pierpont, MD, PhD. In addition, I run the website, www.windturbinesyndrome.com.
