To whom it may concern,

I write this letter in reference to the Bill proposed by Bob Brown to prevent a federal minister overturing laws passed in the territories of Australia, particularly those of the Australian Capital Territory. Also to my own belief that the ACT should be entitled to equal representation of that of the states of Australia.

The notion that the residents of the capital territory of any country should have less of a say of how their lives are run than a relative living less than 100km away is outrageous. Now, the fact that this is being permitted to happen in Australia, a country that prides itself on its efforts in committing to democracy and giving everyone a fair and equal say in what happens in their society, is hypocrisy.

The enacting of this bill should surely not bring as much overwhelming grievance to the Federal Parliament as it is being made out to.
