I have slept under them before and even ridden my horse all around them and had no problems with them.

Many farmers around the area are being made to sell their farms due to debts. One of our family friends had to sell their farm a few years back and now their son is wishing to go into farming but he doesn't have a farm to farm because his parents were unable to keep

their farm. If they had turbines they would have had an extra income and maybe they would have had a better chance of survival.

I hope that the proposed wind farms are approved in our area because it will allow many families to keep their farms, raise another generation, enjoy their lifestyles and have a set income from their farm. It would be nice to hear my father not talk about his debts that his in, it would mentally make him a lot happier having a constant income off the farm.
