We moved to this area so as to enjoy the lifestyle and amenity that it offered. Since then, Cadia mine has become a very big part of our life as it now looms just over the rise. If and when the Turbines go in, we will be sandwiched between the two. What happened to our lifestyle choice? What is happening to our rural environment?

So much more information has come to light regarding noise and health problems in the past few years. This information needs to be validated and until such time that it is, I believe that a hold should be put on any further windfarm development. If this is impractical, at least a reasonable buffer zone of 3 plus kms should be put in place until there is an acceptable outcome.
