

Dear Senators,

Regarding the Wind Farm inquiry I wish to make the following points:

1. Australia has many areas where it is windy enough to produce wind powered electricity, and as it is a renewable energy source which benefits the whole community, and even globally by greatly reducing greenhouse gas emissions, it is highly important to have wind farms in the mix of renewable energy sources.
2. The suffering and losses from extreme weather events needs to be considered in this context too. We must change from emitting GHGs from polluting coal-fired power stations. We thought this was a great benefit to farmers who might be struggling financially.
4. I have also seen many wind farms in beautiful Austria recently, and the Austrians were very proud of the amount of renewable energy they produced, and without going nuclear. I believe governments have an obligation to promote the benefits of all renewable electricity sources, and educate people into being pleased with the progress towards reducing our very large carbon dioxide emissions.
