

Dear Sirs,

Impact of Ageing Population on Health, Aged Care and Aged Pensions.

I understand 36% of the population will be over 55 in 2042 and actions need to be put in place <u>now</u> to meet the needs of older people by that time.

## Health

- ◆ All employees should pay into a Fund (as in the U.S.) to ensure they are covered for the cost of subsidised drugs and hospital care. There is no such thing as a *free lunch* you only get what you pay for.
- ◆ Reduced prescription costs should be available to all over 65 regardless of income as all have contributed by paying taxes over many years. Surely, this is only fair and reasonable.

## Aged Care

◆ People should be encouraged to stay in their own homes, rather than specific homes for the elderly. Encourage carers financially—possibly retired at 55 – to assist the aged. This would take pressure off the "homes for the elderly" and provide a better quality of life. The slogan could be "Adopt an Oldie"

◆ All forms of gambling should be taxed at a far higher rate than is currently the case.

## **Aged Pensions**

- ♦ Currently Superannuation and Company levies are useful, but far too low to provide a meaningful nest egg to provide independence. Suggest slashing/removing taxes on Superannuation Funds.
- ◆ Allowing less than the official minimum annual withdrawal of 6% from a fund which makes a loss in order to preserve capital for more favourable periods.
- Paying a basic pension to <u>all</u> residents surviving 75 years.
- ◆ If someone has saved during their working life, they deserve recognition and not to be treated as a cash cow.
- Non payment of pensions to people choosing to live overseas.

Australians must choose between the Cargo-Cult (the government will pay for everything including alleged disabilities) People should be encouraged to take responsibility for their own actions. Retirement at 55 is a poor choice.

Let us hope that plans for the future – palatable or unpalatable are not fobbed off to a committee or future government. We need a long term vision and action now.
