PROGRAM

Centacare's Schools Assertive Outreach Service Program (SAO), falls within the national homelessness strategy 'Turning off the Tap' and will support young people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness to maintain their connection with education. Supporting young people to establish and maintain connections with education is considered crucial to minimising the impact of homelessness both in the short and long term. The Schools Assertive Outreach Service recognises that housing instability, transience and homelessness each impact heavily upon a young person's educational opportunities and future success.

The overall aim of the National Affordable Housing Agreement (NAHA) Specialist Homelessness Services is to provide related support services to help young people who are homeless or at imminent risk of homelessness achieve the maximum possible degree of self-reliance and independence, implementing the NAHA Case Management model. Ensuring to assist access and support pathways to further education, training and employment opportunities so they can reach their full potential.

NUNGA GROUP WORK COMPONENT

Through the School Assertive Outreach Program, a specific tailored program was introduced by Mr Tuifa'asisina (Tui) Leleisiuao to work with Indigenous youth, their families and community with a holistic approach. The basis of this model is recognised and practised in New Zealand as an appropriate cultural engagement program to better address issues with youth at risk. Our specific brief is to work with Aboriginal youth and their families. A Holistic and appropriate service delivery for our Aboriginal clientele has been best supported by group work and group participation including various activities and sporting ventures into local communities.

COMMUNITY COMPONENT

Nunga Group work facilitators Tui Leleisiuao and Ross Tanimu have over the past four years successfully liaisoned and brokered with the wider community, business, institutions and clubs to enhance opportunities for Indigenous students and those who are at risk towards education, career and sporting pathways. Success of what has been achieved with Nunga Group work has allowed Tui and Ross to present the Nunga Group program and outcomes at the Australian Institute of Criminology, Newcastle University at the Family First wellbeing conference, as well as Flinders University for legal study classes and honours students.

CO-ORDINATION AND FACILITATOR FOR NUNGA TOUCH 2011/12

Ross Tanimu is engaged full time and long term in working with indigenous engagement opportunities. Ross' ongoing long term experience and educational achievements provide a solid background when working with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities and youth. Summarised biographies and recent recognition awards are attached (Attachment 1). The Nunga touch carnival represents a small but high profile part of his ongoing work.

MAJOR EVENT

Centacare Family Services have been successful in hosting an Indigenous touch football carnival for the past 4 years (Nunga Touch Carnival). In 2008, 90 students from 7 High Schools participated; this was covered on Channel 7's 'Today Tonight' program as a positive story for Indigenous youth engagement in sports. In 2009, the Nunga Touch Carnival had 12 high schools involved with 180 predominantly indigenous youth participating in a round robin sports carnival. There were fifteen community and business stakeholders who contributed with small financial donations and human resources to make this carnival a success. The 2009 Nunga touch carnival was recognised with the Charles Sturt Council 'Event of the Year'. Due to the success of this program, the 2010 Nunga Touch carnival hosted 15 high schools and in 2011, the numbers had increased to 18 high schools with 300 students participating.

AIM:

- To facilitate an interactive social Nunga Touch Carnival between high schools.
- To highlight the significance of community involvement (businesses and intuitions) enhancing inclusiveness, 'building the bigger picture'
- To expand upon the success of previous Nunga touch tournaments, with the objective of incorporating more community institutions and businesses to support and empower Indigenous youth and their community.
- To empower Indigenous youth to make positive and constructive decisions for change through the use of sports participation in the community.
- To enhance Inclusiveness.
- To enhance wellbeing through cultural unity

The 2012 Nunga touch carnival looks to expand from its inception in 2008. There has been interest generated and promises of support from various community businesses and institutions from the 2011 Nunga Touch Carnival. The primary theme for all Nunga Touch carnivals is to promote the notion of *'Community Supporting Community'*

- The Touch Carnival is a high profile event. It has previously received television coverage on channel 7's "Today Tonight". The 2011 Nunga Touch Carnival DVD has been developed to convey positive representation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander youth, emphasising the social and cultural wellbeing experienced when Community is Supporting Community. The 2011 Nunga Touch Carnival has been broadcasted by the Rural Health Education Foundation to remote localities in WA and NT, to high light as positive community event for Aboriginal youth development. http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=gl2zx6pdFml

- Enhances social, emotional, mental, physical and spiritual wellbeing.
- Empowers youth
- Enhances Inclusiveness

The associated benefits for the State Government as a major shareholder would be demonstrated by Government support towards building inclusiveness and enhancing cultural wellbeing for youth through community partnerships. 
- Promotes early intervention

Ross continues to works closely with the Nunga community in Adelaide and has been able to build rapport and understanding of Indigenous issues. Ross has just completed his BA with an Honours degree in Legal studies and his research topic for his Thesis was seen to portray the positive application of sports for Indigenous youth as an early intervention approach.
