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Topic: Inquiry into the contribution of sport to Indigenous wellbeing and mentoring

The Chair asked:

One final question before we finish up: you say you provide \$14.6 million to the AFL and then list some programs, some of which obviously have an Indigenous focus. Can you give us a breakdown of the funding and how it targets Indigenous communities?

Answer:

The Department of Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs (FaHCSIA) submission to the Inquiry into the contribution of sport to Indigenous wellbeing and mentoring states that \$14.6 million has been provided to the AFL and AFL affiliates from 2010-11 to 2012-13. Since the submission was provided, negotiations on the 2012-13 grants have progressed, which has led to some changes to payment schedules such as the movement of \$1.4 million for the Michael Long NT Thunder Learning and Leadership Centre to 2013-14.

As a result of these changes to payment schedules, the funding that has been provided to the AFL and AFL affiliates through FaHCSIA from 2010-11 to 2012-13 has been revised to approximately \$13.2 million not \$14.6 million. Further details on this funding are outlined in the table below.

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Topic: Inquiry into the contribution of sport to Indigenous wellbeing and mentoring

The Committee Chair sought information on the evaluations of the Indigenous Australian Football League (AFL) programs that are funded through the Department of Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs (FaHCSIA).

The Chair asked:

Can you tell us about your evaluation of those programs—that would be good.

Answer:

The Department of Families, Housing, Community Service and Indigenous Affairs (FaHCSIA) has in place monitoring and reporting mechanisms to continually assess program performance against required outcomes. Since 2010, FaHCSIA has also commissioned independent evaluations of two AFL funded programs, as well as a mainstream program that provides funding to the AFL to deliver services to Indigenous communities under that program.

Program Performance

All FaHCSIA-funded AFL programs and activities are subject to standard FaHCSIA reporting and acquittal processes, which ensure accountability against achievements, agreed milestones and/or performance indicators. The AFL and its affiliates are required to provide performance reports as part of their funding agreement with FaHCSIA. These reports are assessed by FaHCSIA to determine how a project is progressing and can provide valuable information on the success of the projects in delivering on outcomes. The level of accountability depends on the size of funding, complexity of programs and projects, and the assessed risk.

Independent Evaluations

In addition to the regular reporting and monitoring arrangements, independent evaluations have been undertaken of the following programs in the last three years:

- AFL Remote Regional Development Program in Wadeye
- AFL National Partnership Agreement
- Youth in Communities Program under this program the AFL NT has received funding.
