FINAL POINTS FOR SUBMISSION TO THE CONTRIBUTION TO INDIGENEOUS WELLBEING AND MENTORING

All sport is future orientated and anticipatory.. To take the sport to the indigeneous youthful population we must overcome the various problems detailed in the submissions of all of these excellent and highly motivated presenters. Some of the problems and solutions are as follows:

- The four reasons for failure have not been removed from any one sport other than in the Evashaw sports programs. If we do not remove these four reasons for failure them we will fail.
- Coaching is about <u>imparting</u> information and making certain that the player is <u>receptive</u> to that information. The players and athletes will not be receptive to any information that is not relative to their own chosen sport. To get them to play a sport that does not interest them will not be successful. Therefore a list of sports must be presented to each community. Evashaw has fifteen (15) sports from which to choose. It does not matter if a community of only 100 persons chooses ten different sports. The object is to get them into playing that sport, attending school, learning even if only about their sport which they will study.
- They can only choose that particular sport if it has a fully correlated simple training program that has pictorial as well as written instructions and diagrams so that they will be <u>receptive</u> to that information. Evashaw programs are specifically designed in simplistic fashion for beginners to also transition to junior and then to a senior level. Not one other sports training program in the world has that capability.
- Nearly every community has access to the Internet. In a remote area such as Liam Jurrahs home it is 280 Kilometers from Alice Springs yet is has the Internet, Video Conferencing and access to websites. In Kalumburu the most remote community in W.A. currently isolated until next May by floods with a population of 350 it has the Internet access and the local people have Ipads. The people must attend school to get access to the server.
- Evashaw programs are the only on line sports education programs that exist in the world today. They have instant access 24/7 to the Internet by direct input and also by Ipads and hand held computers. The points raised by Professor Tatz and others are no longer relevant. Access is instant if you attend school. Distance is now irrelevant. 100,000 players in the country can be online at the same time across Australia in any one of fifteen different sports and get access to the information regarding their sport.
- The problems associated with the absence of coaches is removed. The expensive requirement for travelling coaches to remote areas is removed. Video conferences can be held at appointed times if and when required. White boards of Questions and Answers can be pre-prepared on any sporting problem for a designated session to a designated area.
- <u>Chat Rooms</u> can be set up in every community on specific afternoons in each location at the school or in a defined area. Special speakers are designated every night of the week for each sport as decided by you. Monday A.F.L., Tuesday Netball, Wednesday Soccer, etc. This will all be at no cost as the Speakers will all by indigeneous athletes and players sponsored by their teams and rostered for these sessions. It should be voice contact rather than text and possibly in the local dialect if desireable. You can expand on all of these suggestions. You do not need a former sports champion to call in at the community one day a year and then be forgotten. These athletes can appear on the screen in person daily, weekly or monthly on a fore warned roster to attract the individual local players to meet at the school and participate.
- The regimen, the facilities however antiquated or home made or natural, can all be fitted into the infrastructiure as a beginning and expanded as results are achieved. There is no need to go further at this point with all of the possibilities of being the very first country n the world to adopt modern technology to teach ancient cultures sport at no ongoing cost to them
