What I did work out was that my 2nd child had what is called an undershot gore, which I have found out my father and grandfather also had and it was my mother who picked this up and once showing this to the Dr. they agreed that this was the problem. The good part about this story is that I have been able to help quite a few mothers now and that is very rewarding. I think the hospitals encourage mothers to give up too easily, so as they don't have to bother with the crying baby.
