## RE Wild Dog Public Debate scheduled for Albury on 18 June 2004

I would like to attend the enquiry at Lake Hume Resort as I have had some personal experience with the wild dog problem.

I am a third generation farmer who has had a big wild dog problem in the past. I have now been elected to the North East Wild Dog committee ( NEWDC ).

- 1. The wild dog is a very cunning animal and we need to be twice as cunning to control.
- 2. We need to erect electric fences to a "standard".
- 3. We need to be more scientific in our baiting program.
- 4. We need to form small Committees in Local areas to find out what is needed. (i.e. to deal with problems specific to those areas i.e. I have a survey going at the moment to find out information from farmers in my local area see attachment)
- 5. Extrusion fences electric fences need to be erected between National Parks State Forests, on a given line to protect Farms from wild dogs (and other pest and feral animals including wild pigs and Deer)
- 6. Governments, both State and Federal, need to listen to local people, and Dog Men / Trappers who have had experience with these animals.
- 7. It is only a matter of time before someone is hurt or killed by these animals
- 8. Dogs are becoming more widespread which is also impacting on our native flora and fauna.
- 9. Diseases (such as hydatids) which these dogs could be carrying may impact on people and could have serious effects on our local and export market.
- 10. Baiting needs to be done in behind electric fences (i.e. on forestry or parks side) by professional people i.e. Dog Men. / Trappers.
- 11. We need more Indians and less Chiefs!
