1975 Bill & Ellen Green take up residence on family Early 80s Aerial baiting terminated Result: Dramatic increase in wild dog attacks on livestock 1986 Wild dog attacks escalate on Green's farm (800 lambs killed) 1987 1000 fully grown sheep killed from 1987 to 1989 1989 Aerial baiting reintroduced Result: Dramatic decline in wild dog attacks on livestock 1994 Aerial baiting terminated Result: Dramatic Increase in wild dog attacks – 200 sheep killed 1996 Greens sell remaining sheep – 6 generations of breeding lost forever. Cattle now the only option. However, cattle less profitable than sheep. 1999 Cattle attacked by wild dogs (3 calves killed) Bill Green suffers heart attack aged 47 – doctors cite stress The Greens forced to de-stock 400 acres (1/3 of their farm) of valuable grazing country next to National Parks, owing to wild dog attacks. 2003 Wild dog attacks continue - cattle being chased into barbed wire fences.

When our ewes and lambs are safe in our paddocks so are our potoroos and bandicoots safe in our bush.

Wild dog problems still exist even with trappers in place.
