FORTY-EIGHTH GENERAL REPORT

TWENTY-SEVENTH COMMITTEE

Pursuant to section 16 of the Public Works Committee Act 1962, the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works has the honour to report the proceedings of the Committee during the period 1 January to 31 December 1984.

1. Membership Members of the Twenty-Seventh Committee were appointed on 4 May 1983. They were: Senator D.J. Foreman (Chairman), Senator G.N. Jones and Senator B.F. Kilgariff, the Hon. W.C. Fife, M.P., (Vice-Chairman), Mr D.B. Cowan, M.P., Mr P.H. Drummond, M.P., Mr L.J. Keogh, M.P., Mr J. Saunderson, M.P. and Mr E.J. Lindsay, R.P.D., M.P. (awarded the Reserve Force Decoration, 16 March 1984).

2. Meetings The Committee met on 40 occasions during 1984 to take evidence at public hearings, carry out site inspections and to deal with general business. The meetings were held in Canberra (19), Sydney (7), Wagga Wagga (2), Williamstown (1), Darwin (3), Katherine (2), Brisbane (1), Hobart (1), Perth (1), Adelaide (1) and Townsville (2).

REFERENCES OF WORK AND REPORTS PRESENTED

3. At the beginning of the year there were eight references of work before the Committee which had been referred during late November and December 1983. Site inspections and public hearings associated with these references were held early in 1984 and reports were presented during March and May.

4. During the year the Committee received a further twelve references. Appendix A lists four references which the Committee was unable to report on before the House of Representatives was dissolved on 26 October 1984. However, site inspections and public hearings relating to three of these references were held before the House of Representatives was dissolved. It should be noted that section 24 of the Public Works Committee Act 1969 provides that:

Where the Committee as constituted at any time, or a Sectional Committee as constituted at any time, has taken evidence in relation to a matter but the Committee as so constituted has ceased to exist before reporting on the matter, the Committee as constituted at any subsequent time, whether during the same or another Parliament, may consider that evidence as if it had taken that evidence.

5. Two reports presented during the year arose from previous references. They were the Committee's First Report (Engine Run-up Facility at RAAF Base Darwin) and the Eleventh Report (Supplementary Report on Hydrographers Passage).

6. In all, nineteen reports were presented during the year. They are listed in Appendix B. The estimated cost of work covered by these reports is more than \$460 million, compared with \$265 million in 1983.

NON-REFERENCE OF WORK

7. Pursuant to paragraph 18(8)(b) of the Public Works Committee Act 1969 the House of Representatives may resolve not to refer a public work to the Committee on the grounds that the nature of the work is urgent. During 1984 two proposals were exempted from Committee scrutiny on the grounds of urgency. They were as follows:

(2)

- Hobart Airport, Tasmania - Upgrading of Aircraft Pavements and Terminal Facilities - estimated cost \$3 million; exempted 10 October 1984, and
- Accommodation for the National Crime Authority, Sydney - estimated cost \$3.5-4.0 million; exempted 10 October 1984.

REPETITIVE WORKS

8. Under sub-section 18(8A) of the Public Works Committee Act 1969 the Minister for Housing and Construction may, by notice published in the Commonwealth Gazette, declare a work to be a repetitive work if -

- (a) he is satisfied that the work is substantially similar to other works that have been carried out, are being carried out or are likely to be carried out from time to time by or for the Commonwealth, or by or for an authority of the Commonwealth to which the Act applies, and
- (b) the Committee has agreed to the work being so declared.

9. In April 1984 the Committee agreed to the Minister declaring the following proposal to be a repetitive work:

- Resurfacing of Aircraft Pavements, RAAF Base, Edinburgh, South Australia - estimated cost \$2.5 million (later reduced to \$2.0 million).

PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE ACT

10. The Committee's Forty-Seventh General Report referred to correspondence with the Special Minister of State concerning amendments to the Public Works Committee Act. The Minister had suggested to the Committee that under the Act the mechanism for declaring works to be urgent, paragraph 18(8)(b), is unavailable when Parliament is not sitting. The range of situations where the need for urgent work may arise has increased as a result of the 1981 amendments to the Act which brought most Commonwealth authorities within the ambit of the Committee's inquiries.

11. The Committee indicated its agreement in principle to the emergency provisions subject to the drafting of a satisfactory definition of the term 'emergency'.

12. The Committee also proposed to the Minister that the Government increase the statutory limit applicable to works. Presently, the Act stipulates that, unless otherwise resolved by the House of Representatives to be urgent or declared by the Governor-General to be for defence purposes or by the Minister for Housing and Construction to be a repetitive work, works proposals are referred to the Committee where the estimated cost exceeds two million dollars. The Committee desires the limit be raised to six million dollars, with the Committee having the discretionary power to examine works estimated to cost between two and six million dollars.

13. It is understood that both amendments are still under consideration by the Government, along with two further amendments. These other amendments relate to redefining a 'public work' and the application of the Act to Commonwealth buildings being obtained by instalment purchase.

14. A number of meetings were held during the year between interested departments to discuss the possible amendments.

15. Work is proceeding with the aim of introducing amending legislation during 1985.

DEFENCE HOUSING

16. In February the Committee inspected on-base housing at RAAF Base Darwin as part of its inquiry into a proposal for refurbishment of the houses. The Committee was unimpressed by the standard of the houses and the level of maintenance. On a number of occasions in 1983 and 1984 the Committee observed similar deficiencies in housing at Defence establishments, but certainly not on the scale of RAAF Base Darwin.

17. As a consequence of the Darwin inspection the Committee took the unusual step of requesting the Department of Defence, the Department of Finance and the Department of Housing and Construction to present a briefing on Defence Housing.

18. Housing Overview At the briefing the Committee was told that the current Defence housing situation is as follows:

- (a) 14,300 (63 per cent) of the total Defence stock of nearly 23,000 dwellings are below 1972 scales and standards of accommodation;
- (b) about 12,000 of these below standard dwellings cannot be economically upgraded and should be replaced;
- (c) the current five-year defence program provides for replacement of 1,640 (14 per cent) below standard houses, costing about \$118 million.

19. Future Plans Annual expenditure on improving and enlarging the Defence stock has been increased from \$21 million in 1982-83 to about \$34 million in 1983-84. Particular departmental objectives are as follows:

- (a) replacement of the worst of the 12,000 below standard houses as quickly as possible;
- (b) improvement of older housing where this is economic and replacement is not practicable for at least 15 years;
- (c) provision of additional houses where there are shortages and suitable rented accommodation is not available.

20. Task Force on Housing In August the Minister for Finance announced the establishment of a task force to review housing programs for the Australian Public Service and the Defence Force. The Minister for Finance reiterated the points made by departmental representatives at the briefing, namely:

- (a) the housing stock is in poor condition, inappropriately located and below reasonable standard;
- (b) various policies to provide housing assistance have been developed progressively over many years and there appears to be scope for improving co-ordination;
- (c) housing has been provided at rentals below market rentals.

21. The Minister also stated that there had been pressure from public service unions and defence force members to increase the availability of Commonwealth-owned housing, to refurbish much of the existing below standard stock and to catch up with maintenance which has been deferred from year to year. Before responding to these requests the Government would need clear advice on the most equitable and efficient way of assisting its employees who are required to move in the course of their employment.

HYDROGRAPHERS PASSAGE

22. The Committee's supplementary report on Hydrographers Passage (Eleventh Report of 1984) was critical of the Department of Housing and Construction in delaying the calling of tenders until April 1984. At the public hearing the Committee was advised that tenders would need to be called in January 1984 to enable scheduling of construction activities in accordance with likely favourable periods in the weather.

23. The Committee has since learned that tenders for fabrication, trial erection and delivery of four navigational aid structures were called on 21 January 1984.

24. Compulsory Pilotage The Committee's Report on Hydrographers Passage (Eleventh Report of 1983) concluded that the Department of Transport should pursue the matter of compulsory pilotage, with a system of exemptions, through the International Maritime Organisation (IMO). It is the Committee's view that if this matter has not been considered by the IMO by the time the navigational aids are completed, Australia should consider making a unilateral declaration for compulsory pilotage subject to a favourable opinion from the Attorney-General's Department on the legality of such a course of action. In moving the expediency motion on 8 December 1983, the Minister for Housing and Construction advised of the Government's acceptance of this recommendation.

25. The Committee has since been advised that under existing regimes compulsory pilotage is internationally acceptable only in port approaches, through canals or in other internal waters. Hydrographers Passage falls into none of these categories being partly in territorial waters and partly in the high seas.

Rights of passage through these areas are governed by the Geneva Convention on the Territorial Sea and Contiguous Zone (1958) and the Geneva Convention on the High Seas (1958). On the high seas there is absolute freedom of navigation, and in the territorial sea ships of all states enjoy the right of innocent passage (passage is innocent so long as it is not prejudicial to the peace, good order or security of the coastal state). The Territorial Sea Convention specifically prohibits the coastal state from hampering innocent passage through the territorial sea. It is generally considered that the imposition of compulsory pilotage in such circumstances would contravene the Convention. Furthermore, unilateral action of this nature might well result in retaliatory measures to the detriment of Australian ships trading overseas and would not be consistent with the Government's policy of support for internationally agreed measures under the auspices of the UN.

26. The Department intends to submit a proposal in July 1985 seeking an IMO resolution recommending pilotage in Hydrographers Passage and other specified areas of the Great Barrier Reef region. If accepted the recommendation would carry considerable weight with international shipping interests. However, acceptance by IMO of Australia's proposal is by no means assured in view of international sensitivities at even the slightest hint of restricting freedom of shipping on the high seas. Notwithstanding this possibility, in the Department's opinion, the utilization of the pilotage service scheme in Hydrographers Passage will be high whether or not an IMO Resolution is forthcoming.

27. Risk Analysis The Committee's Report also recommended that a risk analysis should be undertaken, concurrent with the development of Hydrographers Passage, to assess the likely impact of long term shipping operations in the passage. The Department of Transport provided copies of a report entitled - 'Risk Analysis of Ship Navigation through Hydrographers Passage'. The following conclusions can be drawn from the report:

- a low accident rate is expected to be achieved.
- the ship accident risk per transit through Hydrographers Passage is not significantly different from other comparable waterways.
- the cargo and bunker fuel spill risks are considered acceptable.

28. The Department's Consultant proposed six control measures which the Consultant assessed would, if implemented, reduce the risk of shipping accidents by 50 per cent compared to what would have been achieved without such measures. The control measures are set out below:

1. Queensland Coast and Torres Strait Pilot Service be used for all transits.
2. No transit should be undertaken in wind force greater than 7, i.e., wind speed above 35 knots.
3. The outer Passage between Bond and White Tip Reefs should not be entered during periods of maximum spring tidal flows.
4. No transit should be undertaken in poor visibility, defined as visibility less than 3/4 nautical mile.
5. No transit should be undertaken for vessels with "defective radar equipment".
6. Onboard practices appropriate for navigation in confined waters should be complied with.

29. Summary The Committee was advised that even without the six additional measures the level of risk indicated by the Consultants is well within what are normally considered to be acceptable limits in analysis of this nature.

NON REFERENCE OF DEFENCE WORKS

30. There were no references for defence purposes exempted by the Governor-General-in-Council pursuant to paragraph 18(8) (c) of the Public Works Committee Act 1969.

WORKS EXCEEDING PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE REFERENCE LIMIT
OF \$2 MILLION DURING DOCUMENTATION/TENDERING STAGE

31. The Committee has been advised by the Department of Housing and Construction that during the report period there were no projects which at the Limit-of-Cost Estimate stage were below \$2.0 million and subsequently exceeded \$2.0 million due to cost increases.

PROGRESS OF PROPOSALS PREVIOUSLY REFERRED

32. Appendix C contains a tabulated summary of progress on works on which the Committee reported during the period 1978 to 1983. The information was provided by the Department of Housing and Construction and provides detailed information relating to major project activities listed in its annual report.

APPRECIATION

33. During the year the Committee's inquiries were assisted by many organisations and individuals and hearing venues were willingly provided by local government authorities. The submissions and evidence prepared by private organisations and concerned citizens presented to the Committee were of a

high standard. The Committee gratefully acknowledges this assistance and also extends its appreciation to the Government Printer, the House of Representatives Transport Section and the Parliamentary Reporting Staff whose services and courteous co-operation was provided, often at short notice. Officers of the Department of Housing and Construction once again demonstrated their professional competence in preparing submissions and presenting evidence at public hearings.

STAFF

34. The Committee Secretariat throughout the period comprised Mr R.B. Fenton, Secretary, Mr M.M.H. Fetter, Assistant Secretary, and Mrs Audrey Crisp, Steno-Secretary. The following changes took place in respect of the Committee's Project Officer and Clerical Assistant. Mr C.J. Simpson was promoted to the Department of Transport. He was succeeded by Mr M.M. Kiermaier as Project Officer in June 1984. Mrs J.R. Thompson, Clerical Assistant, and former Steno-Secretary, transferred to the Department of the Senate after completing more than 17 years with the Secretariat. The Committee congratulates Mrs Thompson on her long and outstanding service. Mr W.J.G. Ricketson joined the staff as Clerical Assistant.

35. The practice, established in the latter half of 1983, of officers from executive departments being seconded to the Secretariat, continued during the year. The following officers completed periods of secondment during 1984:

36. All officers made significant contributions to the Committee's inquiries. The Committee gratefully acknowledges the assistance of the three departments for providing the officers. It is intended that the practice of seconding officers from executive departments will continue.
