  - (d) Governor-General and Executive Council.
  - Department of External Affairs.
  - (f) Department of Home Affairs. (g) Department of Attorney-General.
    (h) Department of Treasurer.

Such Return to show the average per year and per month.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

- 4. Ways and Means.—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.
  - Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; Mr. Chanter reported that the Committee had reconsidered the portions of the resolutions with respect to Duties of Customs and of Excise which had been referred to it, and had agreed to the same with amendments.

Mr. Chanter also acquainted the House that he was directed to ask, That the Committee may have leave to sit again.

Resolved—That the House will, this day, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Kingston moved, by leave, That the Standing Orders be suspended so as to allow the resolutions to be again recommitted this day, and all necessary steps to be taken for introducing the necessary Bills and reading the same the first time and proceeding to the second reading this day. Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Sydney Smith moved, That the resolutions be now again recommitted to the Committee of Ways and Means for the reconsideration of Item 48, Salt.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

- Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House again resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.
- Mr. Speaker again resumed the Chair; Mr. Chanter reported that the Committee had reconsidered the portion of the resolutions with respect to Duties of Customs and of Excise which had been referred to it, and had agreed to the same with a further amendment.

5. Ways and Means.—Resolutions with respect to Duties of Customs and of Excise.—The resolutions reported from the Committee of Ways and Means with respect to Duties of Customs and of Excise, were read and are as follow:-

- 2 Duties of Excise,

be imposed as follows:-

#### THE TARIFF.

To come into operation on the 8th October, 1901, at 4 p.m. Victorian time.

All goods to be free if not included among dutiable goods.

All imitations to be dutiable at the rate chargeable on the goods they imitate, unless

such rate is less than the rate which would otherwise be chargeable on the imitations.
"Proof" or "Proof Spirit" means spirit of a strength equal to that of pure ethyl alcohol compounded with distilled water so that the resultant mixture at a temperature of 60° Fahrenheit has a specific gravity of 0.9198 as compared with that of distilled water at the same temperature.

"N.E.I." means "not elsewhere included."

"Departmental By-law" means By-law made by the Minister, and published in the Gazette.

"Proclamation" means proclamation by the Governor-General published in the Gazette.
