- 1. The House met pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. TROOPS SUPPLIED BY STATES TO IMPERIAL FORCES IN SOUTH AFRICA.—Sir Langdon Bonython moved, pursuant to notice, That a Return be prepared and laid on the Table of this House, showing—
 - (1) The number of troops supplied by each State of the Commonwealth to the Imperial Forces in South Africa.
 - (2) The total cost to the British Government in each State of such troops, including horses, equipment, and all expenses.
 - (3) The average of such cost per man in each State.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

- 3. PAPER.—The following Paper was laid upon the Table by the Clerk :-
 - Troops supplied by States to Imperial Forces in South Africa—Part Return to the foregoing Order.
- ELECTORAL BILL.—The Order of the Day for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time, having been read—
 Debate resumed.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.—Bill read a second time.

- Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.
- Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; Mr. Chanter reported that the Committee had made progress in the Bill, and that he was directed to ask, That the Committee may have leave to sit again.

- 5. Message from the Senate.—Consolidated Revenue Bill (No. 10).—Mr. Speaker announced the receipt of the following Message from the Senate:—

The Senate returns to the House of Representatives the Bill for "An Act to grant and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund the sum of Four hundred and forty-eight thousand eight hundred and eighty-two pounds to the service of the year ending the thirtieth day of June One thousand nine hundred and two," to which it has agreed without amendment.
