### WEDNESDAY, 3RD SEPTEMBER, 1902.

- 1. The House met pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Printing Committee—Report from.—Sir John Quick, Chairman, brought up a Report from the Printing Committee (sitting in conference with the Printing Committee of the Senate), together with the Proceedings of the Committees, Minutes of Evidence, and Appendices.

  The Report was read by the Clerk.
  - Ordered—That the Report, together with the Proceedings of the Committees, Minutes of Evidence, and Appendices be printed, and that the consideration of the Report be made an Order of the Day for to-morrow.
- 3. Papers.—Sir William Lyne presented, by command of His Excellency the Acting Governor-General—

Commonwealth Military Forces.—Alteration of Regulations respecting Appointments to First Commissions in the Royal Australian Artillery (Paragraph 2).

4. Message from the Senate.—Customs Tariff Bill.—Mr. Speaker announced the receipt of the following Message from the Senate:—

Mr. Speaker, Message No. 51.

The Senate returns to the House of Representatives the Bill intituled "A Bill for an Act relating to Duties of Customs," and acquaints the House of Representatives that the Senate has considered the Message of that House, dated 20th August, 1902, in reference to such Bill.

The Senate has agreed to the modifications made by the House of Representatives to Requests Nos. 6, 13, 18, 28, 57, 71, 75, and 79.

The Senate again requests the House of Representatives to make the amendments as originally requested by the Senate by their Requests Nos. 9 and 38.

The Senate does not request the House of Representatives to make the amendments originally requested by Requests Nos. 1, 2, 5, 10, 11, 12, 40, 51, 60, 61, 62, 63, 64, 72, 74, 80, 81, 82, 83, 84, 85, 88, 89 (as to part), and 92.

The Senate again requests the House of Representatives to make the amendments as requested by the Senate by Requests Nos. 4, 7, 8, 14, 15, 16, 20, 25, 29, 30, 37, 39, 41, 42, 43,

44, 45, 46, 58, 59, 66, 67, 86, and 90.

The Senate has modified Requests Nos. 26 and 36, and requests the House of Representatives to make the amendments as now modified.

The Senate has agreed to the modification as to the date from which the amendments made come into effect.

5. Point of Order.—Speaker's Ruling.—Mr. Mauger asked Mr. Speaker for a ruling as to whether the foregoing Message was in order, and could be received by the House.

Mr. Speaker said—Perceiving that a ruling might be sought from me on this point, I have carefully considered the questions arising, which are—

- (a) Whether the Message just read is one which we should receive; and
- (b) Under what authority we may deal with the Message.

Our practice in matters relating to Money Bills is controlled by sections 53, 54, 55, and 56 of the Constitution, and by our Standing Orders, which may not conflict with the Constitution.

Under section 50 of the Constitution, "Each House of The Parliament may make rules

and orders with respect to—

- (i.) The mode in which its powers, privileges, and immunities may be exercised and upheld:
- (ii.) The order and conduct of its business and proceedings either separately or jointly with the other House."

No rules or orders have been made by this House either alone or jointly with the other branch of the Legislature with respect to the order and conduct of its business and proceedings in relation to Money Bills under discussion between the two Houses.

Under certain provisions of the Constitution, e.g., the first three sub-sections of section 53, the practice laid down is so clear that I should have, even in the absence of Standing Orders, no doubt as to how I should rule in any matter arising thereunder.

Under sub-section four of the same section, however, I find that the words "the Senate may at any stage," &c. are open to at least two interpretations, and that therefore it is necessary that the two Houses should jointly by majorities make rules or orders laying down the practice to be followed in all cases arising under the provisions of the Constitution herein.

As a majority of the House would have the power to make rules or orders, it appears to me to be my duty to give no ruling which would fetter a majority of the House on this occasion in determining for itself whether it will consider the Message, or what it will do in the matters with which it deals.

I therefore rule that the question of the receiving and consideration of the Message is one

to be determined by the vote of the House.

As to the further point, I remind honorable Members of Standing Order No. 378, under which it is competent for the House, if it so pleases, to take a Message into consideration either at once or at a future time, and I rule that the Order gives all the necessary power to consider the Message, and to determine all the issues raised in it as a majority may desire

6. Customs Tariff Bill—Message from the Senate.—Mr. Deakin moved, That having regard to the fact that the public welfare demands the early enactment of a Federal Tariff, and pending the adoption of Joint Standing Orders, this House refrains from the determination of its constitutional rights or obligations in respect to this Message, and resolves to receive and consider it forthwith.

Debate ensued.
