No. 2.—Sugar Bonus Bill—Re-committal—Clause 2—

2. There shall be paid out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, which is hereby appropriated accordingly, to every grower of sugar-cane or beet within the Commonwealth, in the production of which sugar-cane or beet white labour only has been employed, after the twenty-eighth day of February One thousand nine hundred and two, a bonus, at the rates provided by this Act, on all such sugar-cane or beet delivered for manufacture after the commencement of this Act and before the first day of January One thousand nine hundred and seven.

Amendment proposed.—That the words "for a period of twelve months immediately preceding the delivery thereof for manufacture" be inserted after the word "employed," in line 3.
