Mr. A. C. Groom presented a Petition from certain electors of Mirboo North and surrounding district, Victoria, in favour of a bonus on the production of iron.

Mr. R. Edwards presented a Petition from certain electors of Queensland praying that, in view of the recent drought and the consequent emigration of many workmen, speedy provision may be made by the House for the passage of an Iron Bonus Bill, which will give substantial encouragement to private enterprise in developing the iron industry.
