TASMANIAN DEFENCE FORCES—Position of .—Mr. Hartnoll moved, pursuant to notice, That a copy of all correspondence from the Tasmanian Ministry, and copies of all reports from the State Commandant or the Senior Officer Commanding in Tasmania, relating to the exceptional proposal to place the Tasmanian Defence Forces in a position different to those in other States of the Commonwealth, be laid upon the Table of the House. Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.
- 3. Conciliation and Arbitration Bill. -The Order of the Day for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time, having been read-Debate resumed.
