- 2. Papers.—The following Papers were presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General—Ports of North and North-Western Australia—Report, dated 30th April, 1926, by Sir George Buchanan, K.C.I.E.

- 3. Public Works Committee—Reference of Work—Cottages at Canberral.—Mr. Marr (Minister representing the Minister for Home and Territories) moved, pursuant to notice—
  - (1) That, in accordance with the provisions of the Commonwealth Public Works Committee Act 1913-21, the following proposed work be referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works for investigation and report, namely:—The Erection of Cottages at Camberra.
  - (2) That the Committee have leave to meet whilst the House is sitting.

Mr. Marr having laid on the Table plans, &c., in connexion with the proposed work—Debate ensued.

Question-put and passed.

4. Commonwealth Departments Building, Canberra—Approval of Work.—Mr. Marr (Minister representing the Minister for Home and Territories) moved, pursuant to notice, That, in accordance with the provisions of the Commonwealth Public Works Committee Act 1913-21, it is expedient to carry out the following proposed work, which was referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works, and on which the Committee has duly reported to this House the result of its investigations:—The Erection of a Building at Canberra for Accommodation of Commonwealth Departments.
