Disorder in Committee.—Mr. Seabrook addressing the Committee, Mr. Blakeley, having risen to a Point of Order, used a certain expression which the Temporary Chairman (Mr. Watkins) ruled was out of order and must be withdrawn. Mr. Blakeley having refused to withdraw the disorderly expression, and disorder having arisen-

The Temporary Chairman forthwith suspended the proceedings of the Committee.

That the Schedule to the Customs Tariff 1921-1926 be amended as hereunder set out, and that on and after the Twenty-fifth day of November, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, reckoned according to standard time in the Territory for the Seat of Government, Duties of Customs be collected in pursuance of the Customs Tariff as so amended.

That, excepting by mutual agreement or until after six months' notice has been given to the Government of the Dominion of New Zealand, nothing in this Resolution shall affect any goods the produce or manufacture of the Dominion of New Zealand entering the Commonwealth of Australia from the Dominion of New Zealand.
