Abrahams Brothers—Income Tax Evasions.—Mr. Brennan moved, pursuant to notice, That, in the opinion of this House, the action of the Government in regard to certain notorious income tax evasions known as "the Abrahams cases", the history of which discloses improper and unprecedented bargaining on the part of the Government with self-confessed malefactors, and grave failure to safeguard the revenues of the Commonwealth, is repugnant to right practice and out of harmony with correct and settled principles governing the administration of the criminal law.
