1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable Norman J. O. Makin) took the Chair, and offered Prayers.
2. PAPER.—The following Paper was presented, pursuant to Statute—
Seat of Government Acceptance Act and Seat of Government (Administration) Act—Liquor Ordinance—Regulations.
3. MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE.—NATIONALITY BILL (1930).—Mr. Speaker announced the receipt of the following Message from the Senate :—

 The Senate returns to the House of Representatives the Bill for “*An Act to amend the Nationality Act 1920-1925*,” and acquaints the House that the Senate has agreed to the Bill without amendment.

4. CONCILIATION AND ARBITRATION BILL (1930).—Mr. Brennan (Attorney-General), pursuant to leave given on the 13th March last, brought up a Bill intituled “*A Bill for an Act to amend the Commonwealth Conciliation and Arbitration Act 1904-1928*,” and moved, That it be now read a first time.
 Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.
 Ordered—That the second reading be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.
5. CENSUS AND STATISTICS BILL (1930).—Mr. Blakeley (Minister for Home Affairs) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to amend the *Census and Statistics Act 1905-1920*.
 Question—put and passed.
 Mr. Blakeley then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.
 Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.
 Ordered—That the second reading be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.
6. SUPPLY [“*GRIEVANCE DAY*”].—Pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order No. 241, the Order of the Day having been read for going into the Committee of Supply—
 Question proposed—That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair.
 Debate ensued.
 Mr. Theodore (Treasurer) moved, That the debate be now adjourned.
 Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.
 Resolved—That the House will, at the next sitting, resolve itself into the said Committee.
