- The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable Norman J. O. Makin) took the Chair, and offered Prayers.
- 2. Messages from His Excellency Lord Somers, Administering the Government of the Commonwealth.—Assent to Bills.—The following Messages from His Excellency Lord Somers, Administering the Government of the Commonwealth, were received, and the same were read by Mr. Speaker:—

- 5. MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—EXPORT DUTY ON SHEEPSKINS.—Mr. Forde (Minister for Trade and Customs), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement announcing that the Government had decided to cease collecting the export duty on sheepskins, and to refund the amounts already collected.
- 6. Message from the Governor-General.—Wine Export Bounty Bill (1931).—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was presented, and the same was read by Mr. Speaker:—

Message No. 64.

In accordance with the requirements of section 56 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to amend the Wine Export Bounty Act 1930.

Canberra, 5th March, 1931.

Ordered-That the foregoing Message be taken into consideration, in Committee of the whole House, at the next sitting.

- 7. Member Named.—Mr. Speaker named the honorable Member for Oxley (Mr. Bayley) for disregarding the authority of the Chair.
  - Mr. Scullin (Prime Minister) having addressed the House, and Mr. Bayley having expressed his regret, the matter was not further proceeded with.
- 8. Speaker's Ruling.—Mr. Theodore (Treasurer) giving notice of a motion, and Mr. Gullett moving, That the Treasurer be not further heard, Mr. Speaker ruled that the motion would not be accepted as the Treasurer had already resumed his seat when the motion was made.

Dissent from Speaker's Ruling.—Mr. Gullett handed in, in writing, the following objection to the Ruling:—That the ruling of the honorable the Speaker—that he is not bound to put a motion that a Member be not further heard in the event of the said Member resuming his seat—be disagreed with.

The debate thereon was forthwith adjourned to the next day of sitting.

- 9. Want of Confidence-Notice of Motion.-Mr. Latham (Leader of the Opposition) gave notice of a motion of Want of Confidence which he proposed to move to-morrow.
- 10. ADJOURNMENT.—Mr. Scullin (Prime Minister) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Debate ensued. Question—put and passed.

And then the House, at eleven minutes to three o'clock p.m., adjourned until to-morrow at eleven o'clock
