- 1. The House met, at eleven o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable G. H. Mackay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. MINISTERIAL STATEMENT -MILITARY CLOTHING FOR UNEMPLOYED. -Mr. Josiah Francis (Assistant Minister for Defence), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement announcing the extent and method of the distribution of part-worn and surplus military clothing to the unemployed.
- 3. Papers.—The following Papers were presented, pursuant to Statute---

Arbitration (Public Service) Act—Determination by the Arbitrator, &c.—No. 1 of 1932—Federated Public Service Assistants' Association.

Defence Act—Regulations Amended—Statutory Rules 1932, No. 28.

Naval Defence Act—Regulations Amended—Statutory Rules 1932, No. 29.

Norfolk Island Act—Ordinance of 1932—No. 1—Adoption of Children.

Public Service Act—Regulations Amended—Statutory Rules 1932, No. 27.

4. Australian Broadcasting Commission Bill.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time——Debate resumed.

Mr. Thomas Paterson moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered-That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

7. Leave of Absence to all Members.—Mr. Lyons (Prime Minister) moved, by leave, That leave of absence be given to every Member of the House of Representatives from the determination of this sitting of the House to the date of its next sitting.

8. LANDS Acquisition Bill (1932).—The Order of the Day having been read for the second reading—Mr. Marr (Minister for Works and Railways) moved, That the Bill be now read a second time. Debate ensued.

Question- put and passed.—Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to. Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Bell reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Marr, the House adopted the Report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

The Senate returns to the House of Representatives the Bill for "An Act to amend sections thirty-one, thirty-six, and forty-three of the 'War Service Homes Act 1918-1929'," and acquaints the House that the Senate has agreed to the Bill with the Amendment indicated by the annexed Schedule, in which Amendment the Senate requests the concurrence of the House of Representatives.

13. Ways and Means [Customs Tariff Amendment (No. 2)].—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.

(In the Committee.)

Mr. Gullett (Minister for Trade and Customs) moved--

That the Schedule to the Customs Tariff 1921-1930 as proposed to be amended by Customs Tariff Proposals introduced into the House of Representatives on the twenty-fifth day of February, One thousand nine hundred and thirty-two, be further amended as hereunder set out, and that on and after the eighteenth day of March, One thousand nine hundred and thirty-two, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, reckoned according to standard time in the Territory for the Seat of Government, Duties of Customs be collected in pursuance of the Customs Tariff 1921-1930 as so amended.

That, excepting by mutual agreement or until after six months' notice has been given to the Government of the Dominion of New Zealand, nothing in this Resolution shall affect any goods the produce or manufacture of the Dominion of New Zealand entering the Commonwealth of Australia from the Dominion of New Zealand.
