- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.-Mr. Speaker (the Honorable G. H. Mackay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. PRINTING COMMITTEE-FIRST REPORT.-Mr. E. F. Harrison, Vice-Chairman, brought up the First Report from the Printing Committee (sitting in conference with the Printing Committee of the Senate).

The Report was read by the Clerk, as follows :---

- 4. PRECEDENCE TO GOVERNMENT BUSINESS .- Mr. Lyons (Prime Minister) moved, pursuant to notice, That Government Business shall take precedence over General Business to-morrow. Question—put and passed.
- 5. COMMONWEALTH BANK BILL (1932) .-- Mr. Bruce (Assistant Treasurer), pursuant to leave given on the 6th instant, brought up a Bill intituled "A Bill for An Act to amend the 'Commonwealth Bank Act 1911-1931'", and moved, That it be now read a first time.

 - Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time. Mr. Bruce moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.
 - Mr. Bruce not having concluded his speech at the termination of the time allowed by Standing Order No. 257B-

Ordered-That the Right Honorable Member have leave to continue his speech.

Mr. Scullin moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed. Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

6. QUEENSLAND MEAT INSPECTION AGREEMENT BILL .--- The Order of the Day having been read for the second reading-Mr. Hawker (Minister for Commerce) moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to. Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed ; Mr. Malcolm Cameron reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Hawker, the House adopted the Report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

- 7. POSTPONEMENT OF ORDER OF THE DAY .- Ordered-That Order of the Day No. 2 be postponed until a later hour this day.
- 8. IMMIGRATION BILL (1932).—The Order of the Day having been read for the second reading—Mr. Parkhil (Minister for the Interior) moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr. Blakeley moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question-That the debate be now adjourned-put and passed.

Ordered-That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

- 9. ACTS INTERPRETATION BILL (1932).-The Order of the Day having been read for the second reading-Mr. Bruce (Assistant Treasurer) moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.
 - Mr. Forde moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed. Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for a later hour this day.

Suspension of Sitting.—At five minutes past five o'clock p.m., Mr. Speaker left the Chair. Resumption of Sitting.—At twelve minutes past six o'clock p.m., Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

10. MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE.—FINANCIAL AGREEMENTS ENFORCEMENT BILL (No. 4) (1932).— Mr. Speaker announced the receipt of the following Message from the Senate :—

MR. SPEAKER,

Message No. 15.

The Senate returns to the House of Representatives the Bill for "An Act to amend the 'Financial Agreements Enforcement Acts 1932'," and acquaints the House that the Senate has agreed to the Bill with the Amendments indicated by the annexed Schedule, in which Amendments the Sénate requests the concurrence of the House of Representatives.

The Committee proceeded to consider the Amendments made by the Senate, which are as follows :---

SCHEDULE OF THE AMENDMENTS MADE BY THE SENATE.

No. 1.—Page 2, clause 4, line 13, after "amended" insert "-(a)".

No. 2 .- Page 2, clause 4, at end of clause add ";

(b) by inserting after sub-section (2.) the following sub-sections :----

(2A.) The Treasurer may direct that payment of those moneys, or any part of those moneys, shall be made or tendered by bank draft, crossed cheque or money order, made payable to the person or account specified by the Treasurer, or in such other manner as is specified by him, and any payment made in accordance with the Treasurer's directions shall, to the extent of the amount actually paid, and, in the case of payment by cheque, upon the cheque being honoured, be a good discharge of the liability of the person making the payment, and any payment made otherwise than in accordance with such directions shall not be a good discharge of the liability of that person and shall be a contravention of this Act.

"(2B.) Any officer or employce of a State who refuses or fails to accept a payment made or tendered in accordance with the Treasurer's directions shall be guilty of a contravention of this Act."; and

(c) by omitting from sub-section (3.) the words "the last preceding sub-section" and inserting in their stead the words "sub-section (2.) of this section ".

No. 3. -- Page 2, clause 5, after proposed new sub-section (5c.) insert the following sub-section :-

" (5CA.) In making any refund under sub-section (5B.) of this section, the Treasurer may specify the particular fund, account or purpose in respect of which the refund is made.'

Amendment No. 1 agreed to.

Amendment No. 2-

Mr. Lyons (Prime Minister) moved, That the Amendment be agreed to.
