- 1. The House met, at three o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable G. H. Mackay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. PATENTS, TRADE MARKS AND DESIGNS BILL (1932) .-- Mr. Latham (Attorney-General), pursuant to leave given on the 25th instant, brought up a Bill intituled "A Bill for an Act relating to Patents, Trade Marks and Designs", and moved, That it be now read a first time.

 Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Ordered—That the second reading be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

3. ALTERATION OF HOUR OF NEXT MEETING.-Mr. Lyons (Prime Minister) moved, That the House, at its rising, adjourn until half-past ten o'clock a.m. to-morrow. Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.

4. Adjournment-Motion for Purpose of Discussion.—Mr. Makin rose in his place, and said that he proposed to move the adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance, namely, "The serious position created by the continued descent of wages and conditions with particular reference to the recent award of Judge Drake-Brockman in the Commonwealth Railways case which creates hardship to the workers concerned and loss to community and business interests".

Mr. Speaker thereupon called upon those Members who approved of the proposed discussion to rise in their places, and more than the necessary number of Members having risen accordingly-

Mr. Makin moved, That the House do now adjourn.

Debate ensued.

Member named.—Mr. Speaker named the honorable Member for Hunter (Mr. James) for disregarding

the authority of the Chair by persisting in reflecting upon a member of the Judiciary.

Mr. Parkhill (Postmaster-General) having addressed the House, and Mr. James having expressed his regret, the matter was not further proceeded with.

Debate continued.

Question—put and negatived.
