 Taxation—Seventeenth Report of the Commissioner of Taxation, year 1933-34 and part 1934-35.
- 3. WANT OF CONFIDENCE IN THE GOVERNMENT.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the following motion of Mr. Forde:—That this House strongly condemns the Government for
 - (1) Its flagrant neglect of its duty to the people by failing to call Parliament together for more than 39 days in twelve months.
 - (2) Not having met Parliament earlier, thereby prejudicing Parliamentary control over taxation and expenditure by necessitating the passage of a further Supply Bill before the Budget can be passed.
 - (3) Its failure to provide and put into effect a bold, progressive policy to deal with the unemployment problem on a national basis.
 - (4) Its irresponsible attitude to the drift that is taking place in the overseas trade balance.
 - (5) Its failure to formulate a permanent plan for the relief of the primary producers—

In accordance with the requirements of section 56 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to provide for the Payment of an Annuity to the Widow of the late Senator the Honourable Sir Walter Kingsmill.

The House resumed; Mr. Prowse reported accordingly.

Resolved -That the House will, at the next sitting, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

9. Adjournment.—Mr. Parkhill (Minister for Defence) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Question—put and passed.
