# THURSDAY, 31st OCTOBER, 1935.

- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable G. J. Bell) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. MINISTERIAL STATEMENT-ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE.—Mr. Parkhill (Minister for Defence), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement informing the House of the reasons for the proposed transfer of the Royal Military College from Paddington, Sydney, to Duntroon, Federal Capital Territory.
- 3. Papers.—The following Papers were presented, pursuant to Statute— Customs Act -Regulations Amended-Statutory Rules 1935, No. 103. Raw Cotton Bounty Act-Regulations Amended-Statutory Rules 1935, No. 105.
- 4. Postponement of General Business.—Ordered—That General Business be postponed until Thursday, 21st November.
- 5. Message from the Governor-General.—Meat Export Control Bill.—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was presented, and was read by Mr. Speaker:-

ISAAC A. ISAACS, Governor-General.

Message No. 56.

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act relating to the Export of Meat.
