to have effect upon the thirty-first day of May, One thousand nine hundred and forty-one.

(3.) For the purposes of this section "producer" means a person carrying on business of wool-growing exclusively or as part of his business, and owning not less than one hundred sheep.

Statement by the Speaker—Privileges of the House.—Mr. Speaker said :—
