- 3. ADJOURNMENT-MOTION FOR PURPOSE OF DISCUSSION. -Mr. Garden rose in his place, and said that he proposed to move the adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance, namely, "The exclusion from Australia of Mrs. Freer."
 - Mr. Speaker thereupon called upon those Members who approved of the proposed discussion to rise in their places, and more than the necessary number of Members having risen accordingly

Mr. Garden moved, That the House do now adjourn.

Debate ensued.

Question -- put and negatived.

- 4. Constitution Alteration (Aviation) Bill .-- Mr. Menzies (Attorney-General) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to alter the Constitution with respect to Air Navigation and Aircraft.
 - Mr. Curtin (Leader of the Opposition) moved, as an amendment, That after the word "Aircraft" the words ", Trade and Commerce, Industrial Matters, Broadcasting and Television" be added.
- It being two hours after the time fixed for the meeting of the House, the Orders of the Day were called on. Ordered -That the Orders of the Day be postponed until after the resumption of the debate just interrupted.

Debate resumed.

Question -That the words proposed to be added be so added -- put.

8. Appropriation Bill 1936-37. -Mr. Casey (Treasurer) then brought up a Bill intituled "A Bill for an Act to grant and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund a sum for the service of the year ending the thirtieth day of June One thousand nine hundred and thirty-seven and to appropriate the Supplies granted by the Parliament for that year", and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Mr. Casey moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Question -- put and passed. -- Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to.

Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Prowse reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Casey, the House adopted the Report, and the Bill was read a third time.
