- 2. PRINTING OF PAPER.—Mr. Thomas Paterson (Minister for the Interior) moved, That the Report by the Commissioners appointed for the purpose of redistributing the State of Western Australia into Electoral Divisions, laid on the Table of the House on the 17th instant, be printed. Question-put and passed.
- 3. Member Named and Suspended.—Mr. Speaker named the honorable Member for Hunter (Mr. James) for using an objectionable expression and refusing to withdraw and apologize when called on. Mr. Earle Page (Acting Prime Minister) moved, That the honorable Member for Hunter be suspended from the service of the House.

6. ELECTORAL DIVISIONS OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA—PROPOSED REDISTRIBUTION.—Mr. Thomas Paterson (Minister for the Interior) moved, pursuant to notice, That the House of Representatives approves of the distribution of the State of Western Australia into Electoral Divisions as proposed by Messrs. R. H. Bandy, J. P. Camm and S. R. H. Roberts, the Commissioners appointed for the purpose of distributing the said State into Divisions, in their report laid before Parliament on the seventeenth day of June, 1937, and that the names of the Divisions suggested in the report be adopted.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.

7. Statute of Westminster Adoption Bill (1937).—Mr. Menzies (Attorney-General), pursuant to leave given on the 22nd instant, brought up a Bill intituled "A Bill for an Act to provide for the adoption of sections two, three, four, five and six of the Statute of Westminster, 1931, and for other purposes' and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Ordered—That the second reading be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

8. ACTS INTERPRETATION BILL (1937).-Mr. Menzies (Attorney-General), pursuant to leave given on the 22nd instant, brought up a Bill intituled "A Bill for an Act to amend the 'Acts Interpretation Act 1901-1932', to repeal the 'Acts Interpretation Act 1904-1934', and for other purposes", and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Ordered-That the second reading be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

9. PATENTS BILL (1937).—Mr. Menzies (Attorney-General), pursuant to leave given on the 22nd instant, brought up a Bill intituled "A Bill for an Act to consolidate and amend the Law relating to Patents of Inventions and for other purposes", and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Ordered—That the second reading be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

10. Message from the Governor-General.—Supply Bill (No. 1) 1937-38.—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was presented, and was read by Mr. Speaker :-

GOWRIE,

Governor-General.

Message No. 1.

In accordance with the requirements of Section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to grant and apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund for the service of the year ending the thirtieth day of June, One thousand nine hundred and thirty-eight.

Canberra, 16th June, 1937.

Mr. Menzies (Acting Treasurer) moved, That the Message be referred to the Committee of Supply forthwith.

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Mr. Forde moved, as an amendment, That all the words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof:—

"this House directs the Government—

(1) To increase the rate of invalid and old-age pensions to £1 per week and to liberalize the provisions of the *Invalid and Old-age Pensions Act*;

(2) To take whatever steps are necessary to ensure progressive reductions in the number of working hours and increases in living standards commensurate with increased powers of production due to the mechanization and speeding up of industry; and

(3) To give effect to the Prime Minister's pre-election promise made in 1934 that a great National Housing Scheme would be undertaken in conjunction with the States and local authorities.".

Debate ensued.

Mr. Garden addressing the House and not having concluded his speech at the termination of the time allowed by Standing Order No. 2578—

Ordered—That the honorable Member have leave to continue his speech.

Debate continued.

Mr. Beasley addressing the House and not having concluded his speech at the termination of the time allowed by Standing Order No. 257B—

Ordered—That the honorable Member have leave to continue his speech.

Debate continued.

Mr. Menzies (Attorney-General) addressing the House and not having concluded his speech at the termination of the time allowed by Standing Order No. 257B—

Ordered—That the Right Honorable Member have leave to continue his speech.

Debate continued.

Mr. Thomas Paterson (Minister for the Interior) addressing the House and not having concluded his speech—the House ordered that the honorable Member have leave to continue his speech when the debate is resumed.

Ordered—That the debate be now adjourned, and that the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

- 11. LIBRARY COMMITTEE.—Mr. Menzies (Attorney-General) moved, by leave, That Mr. Fadden be appointed to fill the vacancy now existing on the Library Committee.

  Question—put and passed.
- 12. ADJOURNMENT.—Mr. Menzies (Attorney-General) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Debate ensued.

  Question—put and passed.

And then the House, at three minutes past eleven o'clock p.m., adjourned until to-morrow at half-past two o'clock p.m.
