6. Message from the Senate. -Transport Workers Bill (1937).-Mr. Speaker announced the receipt of the following Message from the Senate:-

President.

The Senate has passed a Bill for "An Act to repeal section four of the Transport Workers Act 1928-1929' and to enact another section in lieu thereof and to amend section twelve of that Act' and transmits the same to the House of Representatives for its concurrence.

7. MEDICAL RESEARCH ENDOWMENT BILL.-Mr. Hughes (Minister for Health) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to constitute a Fund to be utilized for the purposes of Medical Research.

Question—put and passed.

Mr. Hughes then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Ordered—That the second reading be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

8. Message from the Governor-General.—Supply Bill (No. 1) 1937-38.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Message be referred to the Committee of Supply forthwith—And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr. Forde, viz.:—
That all the words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof:-

" this House directs the Government-

(1) To increase the rate of invalid and old-age pensions to £1 per week and to liberalize the provisions of the *Invalid and Old-age Pensions Act*;

(2) To take whatever steps are necessary to ensure progressive reductions in the number of working hours and increases in living standards commensurate with increased powers of production due to the mechanization and speeding up of industry; and

(3) To give effect to the Prime Minister's pre-election promise made in 1934 that a great National Housing Scheme would be undertaken in conjunction with the States and local authorities."-

Debate resumed.

Mr. White (Minister for Trade and Customs) addressing the House and not having concluded his speech at the termination of the time allowed by Standing Order No. 257B-

Ordered—That the honorable Member have leave to continue his speech.

Debate continued.

Mr. Frost moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered-That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

9. Adjournment.—Mr. Menzies (Attorney-General) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Debate ensued.
