- 1. The House met, at three o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable W. M. Nairn) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Invasion of Russia by Germany-Ministerial Statement.-Mr. Menzies (Prime Minister), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement informing the House of the latest developments in Europe through the violation of treaties and the invasion of Russia by Germany, and announced that the Commonwealth Government was in agreement with the statement of the Prime Minister of Great Britain regarding the relationship between Great Britain and the Soviet.

Mr. Curtin (Leader of the Opposition), by leave, also made a Statement on the subject.

3. Papers.—The following Papers were presented, pursuant to Statute—

Lands Acquisition Act—Land acquired for Defence purposes—

Geraldton, Western Australia.

Glossop, South Australia.

War-time (Company) Tax Assessment Act—Regulations—Statutory Rules 1941, No. 130.

4. Supply Bill (No. 1) 1941-42.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time-Debate resumed.

Mr. Riordan moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for a later hour this Day.

5. Message from the Governor-General.—Ministers of State Bill 1941.—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was presented, and was read by Mr. Speaker :-GOWRIE,

Governor-General.

Message No. 32.

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to amend the Ministers of State Act 1935-1938.

Canberra, 19th June, 1941.

Ordered-That the foregoing Message be taken into consideration, in Committee of the whole House, forthwith.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Mr. Menzies (Prime Minister) moved, That it is expedient that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to amend the Ministers of State Act 1935-1938. Question—put and passed.

Resolution to be reported.

The House resumed; Mr. Prowse reported accordingly.

Mr. Menzies moved, pursuant to contingent notice, That so much of the Standing Orders be suspended as would prevent the remaining stages being passed without delay.

Question—put and passed. The Resolution reported from the Committee was read, and, on the motion of Mr. Menzies, was adopted by the House.

Ordered—That Mr. Menzies and Mr. Fadden do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

Mr. Menzies then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time. Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Mr. Menzies moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr. Curtin (Leader of the Opposition) moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

6. Supply Bill (No. 1) 1941-42.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time-Debate resumed.

Mr. Marwick moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

7. ADJOURNMENT.—Mr. Anthony (Assistant Minister) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Question—put and passed.

And then the House, at twenty-four minutes past ten o'clock p.m., adjourned until to-morrow at half-past two o'clock p.m.
