 Mr. Fadden (Prime Minister) and Mr. James, by leave, also made Statements in connexion with

the matter.

- 3. Broadcasting—Joint Committee.—Mr. Collins (Postmaster-General) moved, by leave, That the time for bringing up the Report from the Joint Committee on Wireless Broadcasting, appointed on the 3rd July, 1941, be extended for three months from the 3rd October, 1941.
