'38. This Act shall continue in force until six months after the end of the financial Duration of year during which the present war between His Majesty the King and Germany Act. terminates, and no longer."

On the motion of Mr. Chifley (Treasurer), the Amendment was agreed to, after debate. Resolution to be reported.

The House resumed; Mr. Prowse reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Chifley, the House adopted the Report.

Clause 4-

Page 1, after line 17 insert "' Board of Review' means a Board of Review constituted under the Income Tax Assessment Act 1936-1940;".

Page 2, lines 13-16, omit paragraph (e), insert the following paragraph:-

"(e) the exercise of a general power of appointment of property (including any judgment or order of any Court made in default of the exercise of the power by the donee thereof) in favour of any person other than the donee of the power; and ".

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Clauses 5 to 8 agreed to.

Clause 9 debated and agreed to.

Clause 10.

On the motion of Mr. Lazzarini, the following amendment was made:—
Page 4, line 41, after "Valuation Board" insert "or a Board of Review".
Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Clause 11 debated and agreed to.

Clause 12-

On the motion of Mr. Lazzarini, the following amendments were made, after debate :-

Page 5, lines 26-27, omit "or carried out

Page 5, lines 36-37, omit "or is carried out or completed".
Page 5, line 43, omit "registered", insert "lodged for registration".

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Clause 13 agreed to.

Clause 14-

On the motion of Mr. Lazzarini, the following amendments were made, after debate:-

Page 7, lines 7-40, omit paragraphs (a), (b), (c), (d), (e), and (f), insert the following paragraphs:—

- "(a) contributions by an employer to a fund established for the purpose of providing retiring allowances or pensions for his employees, or any class or classes of his employees, or their dependants;
 - (b) payments made by an employer to an employee, or the dependants of an employee, in consequence of the retirement of that employee from the service of the employer or in consequence of his death, or any gratuity or bonus paid by an employer to an employee during the continuance of the employment if the Commissioner is satisfied that the gratuity or bonus is paid in recognition of special or faithful services rendered, or any salary, wages or allowances which the employer continues to pay during any period of illness or invalidity of the employee;

(c) any moneys paid by an employer to an employee who is a member of the Defence Force or of the naval, military or air force of any other part of His Majesty's dominions, for the purpose of augmenting the employee's pay as a member of any of those forces;
(d) any gift to an institution, organization or body of persons, whether corporate or

unincorporate, not formed or carried on for the profit of any individuals;

(e) any gift to the Commonwealth or a State;

- (f) any gift which is made in the course of carrying on a business, for the purpose of obtaining any commercial benefit or by way of the writing off of a debt which is irrecoverable
 - (i) an incorporated company the shares or stock of which are or is quoted in the official list of any Stock Exchange;
 - (ii) an incorporated company the shares or stock of which are not or is not quoted in the official list of any Stock Exchange, if the Commissioner is satisfied that the donee is not a director of the company or is not connected by ties of blood or marriage with any director of the company; or

(iii) a firm or individual if the Commissioner is satisfied that the donee is not connected by ties of blood or marriage with any member of the firm or with the individual, as the case may be;

(fa) any premiums, not exceeding One hundred pounds per annum, paid by a person on a policy effected by him on his own life and expressed to be for the benefit of his wife or any of his children; ".

Page 8, lines 18-21, omit sub-clause (2.).

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Clause 15-

On the motion of Mr. Lazzarini, the following amendment was made:-

Page 8, line 23, omit "as a gift inter vivos

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Clause 16-

On the motion of Mr. Lazzarini, the following amendment was made, after debate:-

Page 8, at the end of the clause add the following sub-clause:-

"(2.) Notwithstanding anything contained in the last preceding sub-section, where the disponor's interest is by way of mortgage or charge and the mortgage or charge is wholly or partly satisfied by payment within five years of the making of the disposition, the Commissioner shall treat that payment as part of the consideration for the disposition and shall reassess the gift duty payable and make any refund which is necessary in consequence of the re-assessment.".

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Clause 17 agreed to.

Clause 18-

On the motion of Mr. Lazzarini, the following amendment was made:-

Page 9, lines 21-25, omit paragraph (d), insert the following paragraph:

"(d) where a gift includes any shares or stock in any company the shares or stock of which are not or is not quoted in the official list of any Stock Exchange, the Commissioner may, in his discretion, adopt as the value of any such shares or stock such sum as the holder thereof would receive in the event of the company being voluntarily wound up on the date when the gift was made.".

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Clause 19-

On the motion of Mr. Lazzarini, the following amendments were made, after debate:-

Page 9, line 30, omit "thirty", insert "eighteen".
Page 10, at the end of the clause add the following sub-clause:-

"(4.) For the purposes of this section, 'gift' shall not include any gift in respect of which gift duty is declared by section fourteen of this Act not to be payable.".

Clause, as amended, agreed to. Clauses 20 to 24 agreed to.

Clause 25

On the motion of Mr. Lazzarini, the following amendments were made, after debate:—
Page 10, line 42, after "gift" insert ", but any such charge shall not affect the title of a bona fide purchaser for value without notice of the charge ".

Page 11, at the end of the clause add the following sub-clause :-

"(7.) Where the donee is a trustee he shall not be personally liable for the payment of any gift duty in respect of any trust property unless the Commissioner, by notice in writing, advises him that gift duty is due and payable in respect of that trust property, and then only to the extent of the value of so much of that trust property as is held by him on the date upon which the notice is served upon him.".

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Clauses 26 to 30 agreed to.

Clause 31-

On the motion of Mr. Lazzarini, the following amendment was made:-

Page 12, lines 6-9, omit paragraph (a), insert the following paragraph:—

(a) in writing, request the Commissioner-

(i) to refer so much of the decision as relates to the value assigned to any property included in the gift to a Valuation Board for review of that value; or

(ii) to refer so much of the decision as does not relate to the value assigned to any property included in the gift to a Board of Review for a review of that decision; or".

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Clause 32-

On the motion of Mr. Lazzarini, the following amendments were made:—
Page 12, lines 18-46, before the word "Board" (wherever occurring) and before the word
"Board's" (wherever occurring) insert the word "Valuation".
Page 12, lines 21-46, omit "real" (wherever occurring).

Page 12, lines 35-39, omit sub-clause (6.), insert the following sub-clause :-

"(6.) The objector may, within thirty days after the Valuation Board's decision, request the Commissioner, in writing, to refer his objection, so far as it relates to grounds not dealt with by the Valuation Board, to a Board of Review or to the High Court or the Supreme Court of a State or Territory of the Commonwealth.".

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Clause 33-

On the motion of Mr. Lazzarini, the following amendment was made:—

Page 13, lines 1-3, omit "sub-section (4.) of section thirty-one of this Act or sub-section (6.) of the last preceding section ", insert " the provisions of this Part".

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Clauses 34 to 44 agreed to.

New clauses—

On the motion of Mr. Lazzarini, the following new clauses were inserted in the Bill, after debate :-

"32A.—(1.) Where the objector has, in accordance with section thirty-one of Reference to this Act, requested the Commissioner to refer a decision to a Board of Review, the Review. Commissioner shall, if the objector's request is accompanied by a deposit of One pound,

refer the decision to a Board of Review not later than sixty days after the receipt of the request.

(2.) The objector shall be limited on the review to the grounds which he has stated in his objection.

(3.) If the assessment has been reduced by the Commissioner after considering the objection, the reduced assessment shall be the assessment dealt with by the Board of Review under the next succeeding sub-section.

(4.) Subject to the next succeeding sub-section, the Board of Review shall give a decision and may either confirm, reduce, increase or vary the assessment.

(5.) In default of the appearance of the objector before the Board of Review, for the purpose of review, the Board of Review shall confirm the assessment:

Provided that upon good cause shown, the Board of Review may, within the prescribed

time, re-open the matter and review the assessment.

(6.) For the purposes of reviewing the assessment, a Board of Review shall have all the powers and functions of the Commissioner in making assessments, determinations and decisions under this Act, and such assessments, determinations and decisions of a Board of Review and its decisions upon review, shall for all purposes (except for the purpose of objections thereto and review thereof and appeals therefrom) be deemed to be assessments, determinations or decisions of the Commissioner:

Provided that a Board of Review shall not reduce or increase any value assigned in the assessment to any property, but shall accept as final the value assigned to the property by the Commissioner, or, where the value has been reduced or increased by a Valuation Board, by the Valuation Board.

(7.) The objector may, within thirty days after the decision of the Board of Review, request the Commissioner, in writing, to refer his objection, so far as it relates to the value assigned to any property in the assessment, to a Valuation Board.

(8.) Where a Board of Review has reviewed any assessment and given any decision thereon and the value assigned to any property in that assessment is subsequently reduced or increased by a Valuation Board, the Commissioner shall vary the assessment to give effect to the decision

of the Valuation Board.

(9.) The Commissioner or the objector may, within thirty days after the decision of a Board of Review, appeal to the High Court from any decision of the Board of Review in this connexion which, in the opinion of the High Court, involves a question of law, and the Board shall refer to the High Court any question of law arising before the Board of Review, and the decision of the High Court shall be final and conclusive.".

"38a. The provisions of section fifty-two a of the Commonwealth Inscribed Stock Schmonwealth Act 1911-1940 shall not apply to exempt from gift duty assessed under this Act the Inscribed Stock disposition of any property to which that section applies.".

Act not to apply.

"38B. Where any disposition of property is subject to gift duty under this Act Rebate in case and also under the law of any country outside Australia, and the Commissioner is satisfied of double gift that the law of that country makes provision for the rebate of gift duty similar to the provision contained in this section, the Commissioner may allow a rebate of the gift duty payable under this Act of an amount equal to one-half of the gift duty payable under this Act or under the law of that country, whichever is the lesser amount."

5. This Act shall continue in operation until a date to be fixed by Proclamation, Duration and no longer, but in any event not longer than six months after His Majesty ceases of Act to be engaged in war.".

Reasons of the House of Representatives for disagreeing to Amendments Nos. 2, 4 and 5 of the Senate.

- 1. The proposal of the House contained substantially the tax concession at pre-war rates. 2. Deducting calls on shares in mining companies up to £50, irrespective of the income of the investor, would have the effect in some cases of subsidizing the investment up to £50 by 83 per
- 3. The increased rate of tax is purely for war purposes and should not be used to give in war time approximately three times the rate of concession that was granted in peace time.

4. With full sense of responsibility of the importance of conducting a successful war,

this House cannot accept the amendment which involves a serious loss of revenue.

5. The excessive concession which (having regard to war taxation) the Senate amendment would involve is illustrated by the attached table.
