- 2. OBSERVANCE OF ANZAC DAY AND MAY DAY-MINISTERIAL STATEMENT.-Mr. Curtin (Prime Minister), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement regarding the observance in certain States of Anzac Day and May Day, and informed the House of the terms of the request made by the Commonwealth Government to the State Governments with reference to street marches and large assemblies of people.
- 3. WAR EXPENDITURE-JOINT COMMITTEE.-Mr. Curtin (Prime Minister) moved, by leave-
 - (1) That Mr. Beck be discharged from attendance on the Joint Committee on War Expenditure.
 - (2) That the foregoing Resolution be communicated to the Senate by Message. Question -- put and passed.
- 4. IMMOBILIZATION OF SMALL CRAFT-MINISTERIAL STATEMENT. -Mr. Forde (Minister for the Army), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement advising the House of the appointment of a committee to inquire into matters concerning the immobilization of small craft.
- 5. Mr. Chifley moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr. Holt moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question-That the debate be now adjourned-put and passed.

Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

- 11. REGULATIONS—MOTION FOR DISALLOWANCE.—Mr. Harrison moved, pursuant to notice, That the National Security (Values for Land Tax) Regulations under the National Security Act, made by Statutory Rules 1942, No. 128, be disallowed.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and negatived.

12. REGULATIONS-MOTION FOR DISALLOWANCE.-Mr. Spooner moved, pursuant to notice, That the Amendments of the National Security (Supplementary) Regulations made by Statutory Rules 1942, No. 111, be disallowed.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and negatived.

- 13. Lapse of Notice of Motion.—Upon Notice of Motion No. 3, General Business, being called on and not being moved, it was, under Standing Order No. 102, withdrawn from the Notice Paper.
- 14. ADJOURNMENT.—Mr. Curtin (Prime Minister) moved, That the House do now adjourn.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.
