- The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable J. S. Rosevear) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. CANADIAN MUTUAL AID AGREEMENT—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—MOTION FOR PRINTING PAPER.—
 Mr. Evatt (Minister for External Affairs), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement with reference
 to the Agreement signed at Ottawa on the 9th March, 1944, between the Governments of Canada
 and the Commonwealth of Australia, relating to the provision by Canada of Canadian war supplies
 to Australia as aid in the present war. Mr. Evatt stated Australia's general policy in relation to
 international economic collaboration, and by command of His Excellency the Governor-General,
 laid upon the Table the following Paper:—

Canadian Mutual Aid Agreement—Ministerial Statement, 17th March, 1944, together with telegraphic text of the Agreement—

and moved, That the Paper be printed.

Mr. Menzies (Leader of the Opposition) moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question-That the debate be now adjourned-put and passed.

Ordered-That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

- 3. Paper.—The following Paper was presented pursuant to Statute—
 National Security Act—National Security (War Damage to Property) Regulations—War
 Damage Commission—Report for 1943.
- 4. Proposed Adjournment-Motion for Purpose of Discussion.—Mr. Fadden proposed to move the adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance, namely, "The conduct of the business of this Parliament."

Speaker's Ruling.—Mr. Speaker ruled that such a motion would not be in order as the matter was not definite.

Suspension of Standing Orders Moved.—Mr. Fadden moved, That so much of the Standing Orders
be suspended as would enable a debate upon the accuracy of the records of the Votes and Proceedings
No. 28.

Point of Order.—A Point of Order having been raised that a motion for the suspension of the Standing Orders should be related to business which had been placed before the House—

Speaker's Ruling.—Mr. Speaker ruled that the motion was in order.

Question—put.

And then the House, at twenty minutes to four o'clock p.m., adjourned until Tuesday next at three o'clock p.m.
