## THURSDAY, 4TH JULY, 1946.

- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable J. S. Rosevear) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Broadcasting Committee—Thirteenth Report.—Mr. Francis, Vice-Chairman, brought up the Thirteenth Report from the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Broadcasting. Ordered-That the Paper be printed.
- 3. PIG SALES IN VICTORIA-MINISTERIAL STATEMENT.-Mr. Scully (Minister for Commerce and Agriculture), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement with reference to the appointment of an inspector to supervise pig sales in Victoria.
- Mr. McEwen, by leave, also made a Statement in connexion with the matter.
- 4. Adjournment-Motion for Purpose of Discussion.—Mr. Fadden rose in his place, and said that he proposed to move the adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance, namely, "Strikes and the calamitous effect of the Government's inaction upon production, export trade and the Australian economy generally ".

  Mr. Speaker thereupon called upon those Members who approved of the proposed discussion to rise

in their places, and more than the necessary number of Members having risen accordingly-

Mr. Morgan moved, That Mr. James be granted an extension of time.

Question—put and negatived.

Debate continued.

Tradesmen's Rights Regulation Bill 1946.—Mr. Holloway (Acting Attorney-General) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to make provision in relation to the Regulation of Tradesmen's Rights of Employment in certain Trades, and Employment of Members of the Forces in those Trades, and for other purposes. Question—put and passed.
- 13. Patents Bill 1946.—Mr. Holloway (Acting Attorney-General) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to amend the Patents Act 1903-1935, and for other purposes. Question -put and passed.

Mr. Holloway then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time. Question -put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Mr. Holloway moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr. Menzies (Leader of the Opposition) moved, That the debate be now adjourned. Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

- Ordered---That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.
- 14. Supply ["Grievance Day"].—Pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order No. 241, the Order of the Day having been read for going into the Committee of Supply—

Question proposed—That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair.

Debate ensued.

Mr. Sheehan moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question -That the debate be now adjourned---put and passed.
