EXCISE TARIFF AMENDMENT (No. 2).

That the Schedule to the *Excise Tariff* 1921–1939, as proposed to be amended by the Excise Tariff Proposals introduced into the House of Representatives on the fourteenth day of November, One thousand nine hundred and forty-six, be further amended as hereinafter set out, and that on and after the fifth day of June, One thousand nine hundred and forty-seven, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, reckoned according to standard time in the Australian Capital Territory, Duties of Excise be collected in pursuance of the *Excise Tariff* 1921–1939 as so amended.

 2. By omitting the whole of sub-item (J) and inserting in its stead the following sub-item :— "(J) Spirit for fortifying Australian wine or for fortifying Australian grape must for use in the manufacture of wine, subject to Regulations per proof gallon. The dutics imposed by this sub-item apply to the spirit whether, at the time of entry for home consumption, it is or is not mixed with wine or grape must.
