6. Ways and Means-Estimates 1947-48.—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.

(In the Committee.)

Mr. Dedman (Minister for Defence) moved, That, towards making good the Supply granted to His Majesty for the service of the year 1947-48, there be granted out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund a sum not exceeding £93,826,000.

Question—put and passed.

Resolution to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Clark reported accordingly.

Resolved—That the House will, at a later hour this day, again resolve itself into the said Committee. The Resolution reported from the Committee was read, and, on the motion of Mr. Dedman, was adopted by the House.

Ordered-That Mr. Dedman and Mr. Scully do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing

Resolution.

7. Appropriation Bill 1947-48.—Mr. Dedman (Minister for Defence) then brought up a Bill intituled "A Bill for an Act to grant and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund a sum for the service of the year ending the thirtieth day of June, One thousand nine hundred and forty-eight, and to appropriate the Supplies granted by the Parliament for that year", and moved, That it be now read a first time. Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.
Mr. Dedman moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Limitation of Debate.—At three o'clock p.m., the Speaker having called the attention of the House to the fact that the time allotted for all stages of the Bill had expired—

Question—That the Bill be now read a second time—put and passed.—Bill read a second time. Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Bill taken as a whole, and agreed to.

Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Clark reported accordingly. On the motion of Mr. Dedman, the House adopted the Report, and the Bill was read a third time.

8. Adjournment.—Mr. Dedman (Minister for Defence) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Debate ensued. Question-put and passed.

And then the House, at twenty-four minutes to four o'clock p.m., adjourned until Tuesday next at three o'clock p.m.
