- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—The Deputy Speaker (Mr. Clark) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. HIS MAJESTY KING GEORGE VI.—ADDRESS IN REPLY.—Mr. Deputy Speaker informed the House that he had received from His Excellency the Governor-General the following communication in connexion with the Address in Reply:-

MR. DEPUTY SPEAKER,

I desire to acquaint you that the Address-in-Reply at the Opening of the Second Session of the Eighteenth Parliament was duly laid before His Majesty The King, and I am commanded to convey to you and to Honourable Members His Majesty's sincere thanks for the loyal message to which your Address gives expression.

- 3. - 5. Postponement of Notice of Motion.—Ordered—That Notice of Motion No. 1, General Business, be postponed until a later hour this day.
- 6. CLAIM OF PRIVILEGE.—Mr. Fadden moved, pursuant to notice, That it is a breach of Privilege that the Right Honorable the Leader of the Country Party should be interrogated or sought to be interrogated by Security Police at the instigation of the Prime Minister and the Government in the precincts of Parliament and in his official room in respect of matters occurring in and arising out of the discharge of his public duties in this National Parliament.

Debate ensued.

Mr. Hutchinson moved, That Mr. Cameron be granted an extension of time.
