## THURSDAY, 16TH MARCH, 1950.

- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable A. G. Cameron) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Suspension of Standing Orders.—Mr. Menzies (Prime Minister) moved, by leave, That so much of the Standing Orders be suspended as would prevent motions being moved in connexion with the introduction and first and second readings of the Commonwealth Bank Bill 1950.

- 3. Commonwealth Bank Bill 1950.—Mr. Fadden (Treasurer) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to repeal the Banking Act 1947-1948 and to amend the Commonwealth Bank Act 1945-1948.

  Question—put and passed.
- 4. Papers.—The following Paper was presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General—Air Services between Australia and Ceylon—Copy of Agreement for the Establishment, and Correspondence regarding frequency of service.

Ordered to lie on the Table.

5. Address in Reply to the Governor-General's Speech.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the following Address in Reply to the Speech of His Excellency the Governor-General be agreed to:—
