SALES TAX.

(1.) That, on and after the thirteenth day of October, One thousand nine hundred and fifty, in lieu of the sales tax imposed by the Sales Tax Act (No. 1) 1930-1949, the Sales Tax Act (No. 2) 1930-1949, the Sales Tax Act (No. 3) 1930-1949, the Sales Tax Act (No. 4) 1930-1949, the Sales Tax Act (No. 5) 1930-1949, the Sales Tax Act (No. 6) 1930-1949, the Sales Tax Act (No. 7) 1930-1949, the Sales Tax Act (No. 8) 1930-1949 and the Sales Tax Act (No. 9) 1930-1949, sales tax be imposed at the following rates, but otherwise in accordance with the provisions of those Acts:--

(a) in respect of goods covered by the Second Schedule to the Sales Tax (Exemptions and

Classifications) Act—10 per centum;
(b) in respect of goods covered by the Third Schedule to the Sales Tax (Exemptions and Classifications) Act—25 per centum;

(c) in respect of goods covered by the Fourth Schedule to the Sales Tax (Exemptions and Classifications) Act-331 per centum; and

- (d) in respect of goods not covered by the Second, Third or Fourth Schedule to the Sales Tax (Exemptions and Classifications) Act and on the sale value of which it is not provided by that Act that sales tax shall not be payable—81 per centum.
- (2.) That, for the purposes of the foregoing resolution, "the Sales Tax (Exemptions and Classifications) Act" mean the Sales Tax (Exemptions and Classifications) Act 1935-1949 as proposed to be amended by the Sales Tax (Exemptions and Classifications) Bill 1950.

WOOL SALES DEDUCTION.

1. That a producer be liable to pay to the Commonwealth an amount equal to one-fifth of the sale value of wool produced by him and, on or after the twenty-eighth day of August, One thousand nine hundred and fifty, sold or otherwise disposed of by him otherwise than for delivery out of Australia.

2. That a producer be liable to pay to the Commonwealth an amount equal to one-fifth of the appraised value of wool produced by him and, on or after the twenty-eighth day of August, One thousand nine hundred and fifty, exported by him.

3. That the foregoing resolutions do not apply in relation to wool produced in the Northern

Territory of Australia.
4. That expressions used in these resolutions have the same meanings as they have in the

Wool Sales Deduction (Administration) Bill 1950.

27. Message from the Governor-General.-Loan Bill 1950.-The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was presented and was read by Mr. Deputy Speaker:

W. J. McKELL,

Governor-General.

Message No. 21.

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of moneys be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to authorize the Raising and Expending of a certain Sum of Money.

Canberra, 12th October, 1950.

Ordered-That the foregoing Message be taken into consideration, in Committee of the whole House, forthwith.

Mr. Deputy Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Mr. Fadden (Treasurer) moved, That it is expedient that an appropriation of moneys be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to authorize the Raising and Expending of a certain Sum of Money. Question—put and passed.

Resolution to be reported.

The House resumed; Mr. Ryan reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Fadden, the Resolution reported from the Committee was adopted by the House. Ordered-That Mr. Fadden and Mr. Casey do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

Mr. Fadden then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Mr. Fadden moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr. Chifley (Leader of the Opposition) moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.
Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

28. ADJOURNMENT.—Mr. Menzies (Prime Minister) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.

And then the House, at eleven minutes to eleven o'clock p.m., adjourned until Tuesday next at half-past two o'clock p.m.
