- 2. COMMONWEALTH JUBILEE-MESSAGE FROM THE DANISH PARLIAMENT.-Mr. Speaker informed the House that he had received the following message from the President and the Speaker in the Danish Parliament :

"On the day of the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the first meeting of the Federal Parliament of the Commonwealth of Australia we, on behalf of the Danish Parliament, send our warmest congratulations and good wishes. May the future of the Commonwealth of Australia, where so many people of Danish descent are living, be peaceful and prosperous. May the bonds of descent and of democratic ideals that unite our people grow ever stronger as the years roll by." Mr. Casey (Minister for External Affairs) moved, by leave, That this House thanks the President of the Danish Senate and the Speaker of the Danish House of Commons most sincerely for their message

of congratulations and good wishes on the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of the Commonwealth Parliament and reciprocates their expressions of goodwill. It is our earnest hope that the bonds of friendship between our countries will continue to be strengthened.

Mr. Evatt (Leader of the Opposition) seconded the motion.
