#### FRIDAY, 13TH JULY, 1951.

- 1. The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.--Mr. Speaker (the Honorable A. G. Cameron) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Australian Broadcasting Commission-Appointment-Ministerial Statement. Mr. Anthony (Postmaster-General), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement announcing the appointment of the Hon. Dame Enid Lyons, G.B.E., as a member of the Australian Broadcasting Commission.
- 3. Draft Pacific Security Pact and Draft Japanese Peace Treaty—Ministerial Statement—Motion for Printing Paper.—Mr. Casey (Minister for External Affairs), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement with reference to the draft Security Treaty for the Pacific Area agreed to by Australia, New Zealand and the United States of America, and also informed the House of the agreement reached on the terms of a draft Peace Treaty with Japan.

Mr. Casey then, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, laid upon the Table the following

Paper :-

Draft Security Treaty for the Pacific Area between Australia, New Zealand and the United States of America,

and moved, That the Paper be printed.

Mr. Haylen moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Mr. Menzies moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate ensued.

Message No. 13.

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to amend the *Ministers of State Act* 1935–1947.

Canberra, 5th July, 1951.

Ordered—That the foregoing Message be taken into consideration, in Committee of the whole House, forthwith

The House resumed; Mr. Adermann reported accordingly.
On the motion of Mr. Menzies (Prime Minister), the House adopted the Report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

10. CONCILIATION AND ARBITRATION BILL (No. 2) 1951.—SENATE'S AMENDMENTS.—The Order of the Day having been read for the consideration in Committee of the whole House of the Amendments made by the Senate in this Bill-

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

The Committee proceeded to consider the Amendments, which are as follows:-

Schedule of the Amendments made by the Senate.

No. 1.—Page 2, clause 6, line 29, after "to" insert "orders or awards made by the Court under the Stevedoring Industry Act 1949 (including orders made under section thirty-four of that Act) and

No. 2.—Page 2, clause 6, lines 35 to 40, omit proposed sub-section (4.).

No. 3.—Page 5, clause 11, line 44, after "and" insert "made by the Court under any provision of the Stevedoring Industry Act 1949 (including section thirty-four of that Act) or No. 4.—Page 6, clause 11, lines 1 to 5, omit proposed sub-section (6.).

On the motion of Mr. Holt (Minister for Labour and National Service), the Amendments were agreed to, after debate.

Resolution to be reported.

The House resumed; Mr. Adermann reported accordingly. On the motion of Mr. Holt, the House adopted the Report.

12. Leave of Absence to all Members.—Mr. Eric J. Harrison (Vice-President of the Executive Council) moved, That leave of absence be given to every Member of the House of Representatives from the determination of this sitting of the House to the date of its next sitting. Question—put and passed.

13. Special Adjournment.-Mr. Eric J. Harrison (Vice-President of the Executive Council) moved, That the House, at its rising, adjourn until a date and hour to be fixed by Mr. Speaker, which time of meeting shall be notified by Mr. Speaker to each Member by telegram or letter. Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.

14. ADJOURNMENT .- Mr. Eric J. Harrison (Vice-President of the Executive Council) moved, That the House do now adjourn.
