On the motion of Mr. Eric J. Harrison (Minister representing the Minister for Trade and Customs), the House adopted the Report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

ADJOURNMENT.—Mr. Eric J. Harrison (Vice-President of the Executive Council) moved, That the
House do now adjourn.
 Debate ensued.
 Question—put and passed.

And then the House, at one minute to twelve o'clock midnight, adjourned until to-morrow at half-past ten o'clock a.m.
