James Harrison) had presented to him written statements of definite matters of urgent public importance proposed to be submitted to the House for discussion to-day. In accordance with the provisions of Standing Order No. 106A, he had given priority to the matter proposed by Mr. Keon, namely, "The urgent necessity for the Federal Government to take such steps as are necessary for the restoration of the quarterly cost of living adjustments to the basic wage in view of the recently announced heavy increase in the cost of living figures
